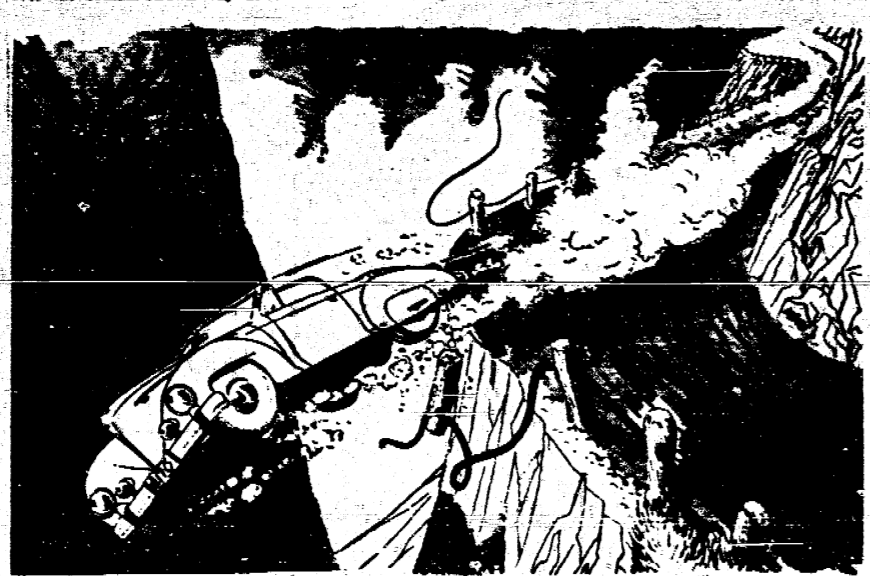

"When will food prices come down? When all the elements of cost come down. If we wish to send vast quantities of food to the rest of the world... and I assume we do, then we must accept the fact that we must have higher prices. If we want lower prices, the farmer, the manufacturer, the working man, the distributor, the transport industry and the government must put their heads together and see what each is doing which may be eliminated, what each is charging which may be reduced."

It is really very simple to figure out why food prices are still comparatively high. The quick answer is that the demand is greater than the supply. There are more dollars than there is food. Who is? Listen to Paul S. Willis, president of the Grocery Manufacturers of America, Inc. We heard him recently at a newspaper advertising convention in Chicago. Here is an excerpt worthy of careful consideration today, even though there appears to be some current trends toward lower prices.

"When will food prices come down? When all the elements of cost come down. If we wish to send vast quantities of food to the rest of the world... and I assume we do, then we must accept the fact that we must have higher prices. If we want lower prices, the farmer, the manufacturer, the working man, the distributor, the transport industry and the government must put their heads together and see what each is doing which may be eliminated, what each is charging which may be reduced."

It is really very simple to figure out why food prices are still comparatively high. The quick answer is that the demand is greater than the supply. There are more dollars than there is food. Our people are bidding for the supply while the whole world is bidding against them. That always makes high prices.

Another answer is this: Food starts on the farm but before it reaches the homemaker, it passes through many hands and processes. First the manufacturer must buy from the farmer. 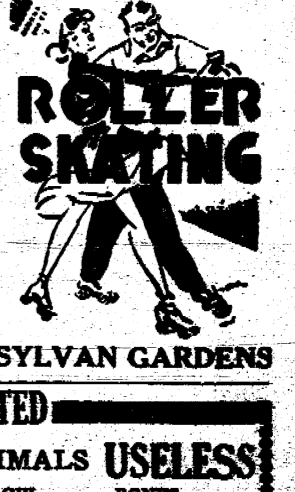
