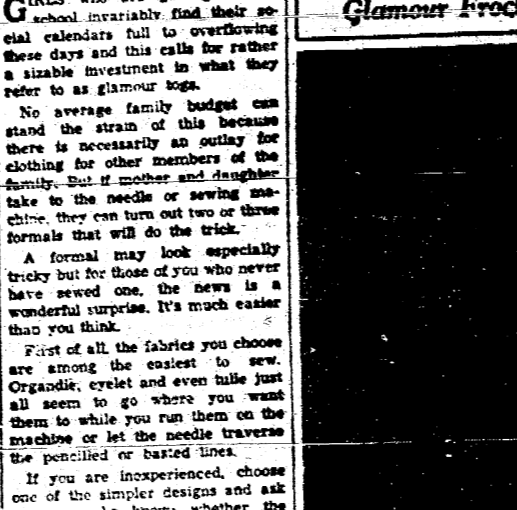

Check Shrubbery Before You Buy

There are over 4000 handlers of nursery stock in Michigan handling all types of nursery stock, native trees and plants, grasses, C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Michigan Department of Agriculture.

During the average sale season over 9000 calls are made by his staff of inspectors checking over the condition of the nursery stock offered to the public. Much of the stock offered is in a sound healthy condition ready for planting. Some that started from the original nursery in that condition, is displayed under adverse conditions for a number of days, and becomes seriously weakened by dryness, excessive heat or cold, that when planted, it has no possible chance of growing. Some nursery stock is sold in coming weeks in its dormant state, and if planted, may die for some time and spread disease to other plants.

Milk Supply At New Low

Milk production in Michigan continues to lag far behind last year, and while the present supply is sufficient to care for Michigan's needs, the consumption of bottled milk increased five per cent. While the supply of milk will undoubtedly be sufficient for immediate needs during the coming flush season, it is doubtful if storage stocks of butter, cheese and canned milk products will approach the

normal average, stated Simmons. This he said, means a shortage is imminent for fall and early winter unless some unforeseen factor enters into the picture to encourage farmers to increase their herds.

Check Shrubbery Before You Buy

Each year many thousands of specimens of nursery stock offered for sale are found to be apparently dead or severely weakened. Stock in such condition is destroyed. Inspectors also check carefully all incoming nursery stock being offered for sale, especially that which has been imported into the United States, for insect pests and diseases, as well as for physical condition.
