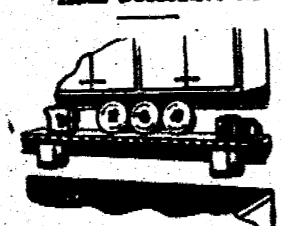

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Indian Troops Invade Hyderabad, Endanger Country's Shaky Peace; Russia Confuses Crisis in Berlin

INDIA: Events in India were far cry from the days when Mohandas Gandhi's philosophy of passive non-violence prevailed among the anti-British forces...

THEY WOULD TELL YOU that the Indian government is not even close to following the other Indian primary states in accordance with the President of India which was established last year.

Whether he could have succeeded in doing that, even if the dominant government had not opposed his efforts against him, is questionable. Hyderabad is a completely headlocked and has no say in the state except by courtesy of the states surrounding it.

From a practical standpoint there is not only no need for the present internal division. It was, apparently, a deliberate act of aggression and was a violation of the U. S. security council for judgment.

THE EAST-WEST split into two opposing poles spheres there would be complete Moscow. The U. S. itself probably would be reduced to total impotence in guiding international relations.

INDIA MOORE will have refrained from pushing the issue for a year, pending a peaceful settlement. The potential danger lies in two phases of the situation:

1. THE HYDERABAD might prove to be the factor that will precipitate violent conflict between Hindu and Muslim Pakistan, whose more or less essential relations now are strained uneasily.

RUSSIAN: Not even the most starry-eyed Politans could deny that the U. S. Soviet fratricide over Berlin was right fantastic and getting more so every day. The whole thing simply had stopped making sense, even to many of the diplomats who were embroiled in the situation.

DUCK CROP IN MICHIGAN GOOD

LANSING, September 29.—Ducks have increased slightly in numbers on the North American continent during the past year, reports H. J. Miller of the conservation department's game division. He bases his report on the contents of a meeting of waterfowl biologists and technicians at Westport, North Dakota, which was held earlier this month.

Delegates attending from 10 central states and Canada reported that potatoes have generally been increased production, while some breeding territory was almost completely flooded out.

Miller told the delegates that the fall duck crop in Michigan consisting principally of Black Ducks, with some bluewinged teal and mallards, appears to be good. Gunners, he added, should not expect much more improvement over last year in the number of migratory waterfowl.

Fire Prevention Week, October 3-9

Fire Threatens Farm More Than City Areas

Rural residents of this area are being urged to observe Fire Prevention Week proclaimed for October 3-9.

The National Sales' record fire loss of \$200,000,000 in 1947, the highest in history, was equal to the yearly earnings of all the farmers in Michigan. This shows the terrible toll taken each year by uncontrolled fire.

Statistics also show that about 50,000 of the people in the United States live on farms which are more than 100 miles from a city.

One-third of the persons who are killed by fire are farm residents. In 1947, 1,530 of them on farms.

Fire hazards are more numerous on farms because farmers keep large stocks of gasoline and kerosene on hand because farms are in greater danger from lightning, and because farmers use large quantities of combustible materials such as hay, rags and feed bags. Other hazards are the lamps and lanterns used on farms. The problem of curing hay properly and keeping it dry to prevent spontaneous combustion.

A campaign on each farm to eliminate fire hazards will help to reduce the toll of fires on Michigan farms.

Schedule Potato Grading Sessions

Potato graders, loaders, and other machinery are important to see demonstrations of potato graders and standards in a series of meetings announced by C. L. N. extension specialist in farm marketing at MSC.

The purpose of the meeting is to acquaint those concerned with potato marketing with grading procedures and standards before the heavy shipping season begins. Annual demonstration meetings were suggested by the government's potato study committee in 1947. A series of 12 schools last year drew a good attendance. Great interest in uniform grades and standards for Michigan potatoes was shown at the State Fair-Showman in exhibition which preceded quickly. Demonstrations will be conducted by Fred L. Bittick, federal supervisor for the fruit and vegetable inspection service of the state department of agriculture which is in charge of the standards. Those attending will see potatoes graded and hear an explanation of the grades which are in different crops.

All meetings begin at 8 p.m. and are held in the following places: October 5, Oakland county, Jack Williams farm, five miles west and one mile north of Okemos; October 6, Jackson county, Harry Carter building, reception building, October 7, Kalamazoo county, State Fair-Showman in exhibition building. Trespass Act Will Protect Farmers

SPORTSMEN WILL NEED
WRITTEN PERMIT TO
HUNT ON PRIVATE LAND

LANSING, November 29. When the southern Michigan winter comes out for deer in the state's forests, sportsmen will need a written permit to hunt on private land, the state's game warden said today.

Each farmer may decide for himself whether his land will be open to deer hunting, the conservation department points out.

The department adds, however, that approximately 12,000 acres of state-owned lands in the counties open to deer hunting will be available for public hunting this fall. This includes more than 7,000 acres in state game areas and wildlife experiment stations.

Each hunter must have written permission to hunt on privately owned lands, or on lands owned by an enclosed hunting club, according to provisions of the Michigan game law. The law specifies a fee of not less than \$10 on more than \$25 or 30 days' confinement for a first offense and a fine of not more than \$100 plus a mandatory jail sentence of 30 days for subsequent offenses.

While the law has been in effect in Michigan, it is small compared to that in the north, the game warden said. In Wisconsin, for example, the law is so strict that a person who kills a deer on private land is liable for the value of the animal.

The Michigan Game Commission and its department of conservation are in charge of the standards. Those attending will see potatoes graded and hear an explanation of the grades which are in different crops.
