

Summary of Proposals to Appear On Nov. 2nd Ballot and Recommendation Of The Michigan Farm Bureau

The Board of Directors of the Michigan Farm Bureau, meeting at Lansing on September 30, reviewed the issues to be submitted to the Michigan voters at the November 2 general election, and in light of Farm Bureau policy as established at the 1947 and previous conventions, recommends Yes and No votes as follows:

(a)—Yes (Y)—No (N)—
1. CALLING A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION. Any desirable changes in our state constitution can be adopted in the November 2 general election, and in ways set forth in that document. Since it became effective January 1, 1909, it has been amended 44 times while 52 proposed amendments have been defeated. The foregoing proposal will appear on an entirely separate ballot. The other 6 proposals being submitted at this election are grouped together on another ballot and are arranged in the following order:

Rural Tele-news

SPARE THAT TREE!—Graduate foresters at Michigan Bell are in charge of trained crews that trim trees and control brush which might menace telephone lines. They work with utmost care to preserve the beauty of trees and landscape. Thus far this year, tree trimming and brush control have involved 450,000 man-hours.

"BLIFFY SNIFFER"—That's the nickname for a sort of "electrical bloodhound" used by telephone men. When work needs to be done on a certain pair of wires in a cable, an electric tone is placed on those wires at the central office. On the cable, the "Bliffy Sniffer," a pencil-like instrument, quickly picks out the wires by detecting the tone they carry.

GOOD NEIGHBORS—Everyone has good rural-line service when everyone helps make it so. This means speaking out calls, not interrupting when others are talking, giving up the line when a rural-line neighbor has an emergency call to make, and always making sure the receiver is in place when not being used.

2. FIXING COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATURE BY LAW. This would remove from the constitution the provision that members of the Legislature should be paid \$1.00 per day and would provide that their compensation would be fixed by statute. It specifies that no change in compensation could be made effective during the term of office of the Legislature making the change. The present wage is not adequate to cover actual expenses of the members and discourages candidates and members of moderate means. Legislators are elected for 2-year terms and would not be likely to set a rate of pay higher than would meet with popular approval.

3. DRASTIC LIBERALIZATION OF 15-MILL LIMITATION. This amendment would extend from 5 to 20 years the period following the millage which might be raised above 15 mills anywhere up to 50 mills, or 5 per cent, as the result of a single election. It would raise the 15-mill limitation, which would result through increasing the tax rate above 15 mills. This new money would not be earmarked for capital improvements or debt retirement. The proposed changes would go far toward destroying the protection which the 15-mill amendment in its present form now provides. This proposal is in accordance with the position taken by the Farm Bureau delegates at the last three annual state conventions. It has been condemned by the directors of the Michigan Farm Bureau and a No vote is earnestly advised.

4. REPEAL OF SALES TAX DIVERSION. Adoption of the sales tax diversion 2 years ago has demoralized state finances. It is estimated by the best informed state officials that during the current fiscal year the state's revenue will fall about \$25,000,000 short of meeting its expenses. They predict that the substantial surplus in the state's general fund at the beginning of the fiscal year will be used up by the end of the year and probably replaced by a deficit. Obviously the state cannot continue to operate on that basis. Unless the diversion amendment is repealed, Michigan's fiscal setup. It is likely that burdensome new state taxes would be imposed. The Farm Bureau urges adoption of this amendment to repeal the diversion and to restore to the Legislature the power to allocate state funds to units of government and for various purposes in proportion to current needs.

5. FIXING COMPENSATION OF STATE OFFICIALS BY LAW. This would remove from the state constitution the present provisions which set the salaries of the Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General and Attorney General and provide for fixing such compensation by law. or office of the station at which they are registering. Even in an emergency, it is only necessary to know at home the name of the State Police post or conservation headquarters nearest to them and the message will be sent by radio to the registration station from where it will be delivered to an officer of either of the departments. The registration will also make it easier to inform persons at home if the hunter suffers an accident or is needed.

Only urgent messages will be handled and, in addition, the service is not offered where regular communication facilities can be used without delay.

In the past the service has been utilized by thousands of hunters and many messages have been delivered. Registration cards have been supplied to all State Police posts and Conservation headquarters. They will also be available to State Police officers stationed at the docks.

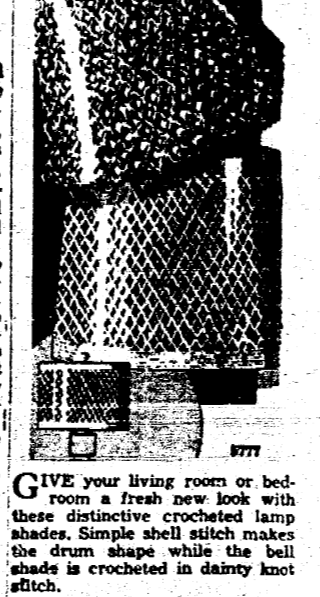

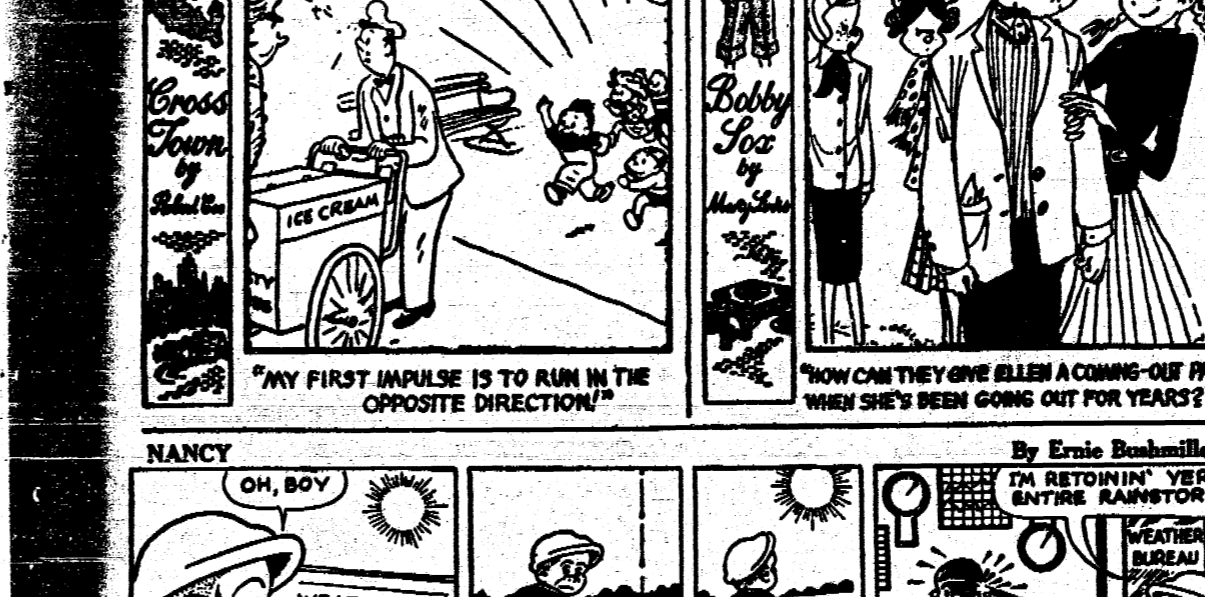

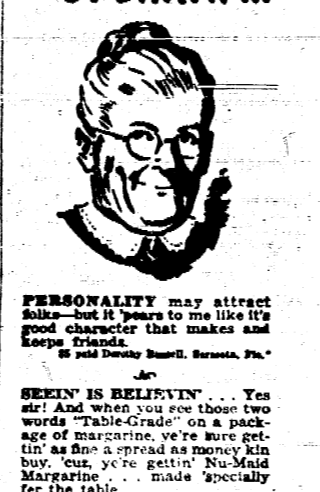
