Hawaii Awaits Final Approval In Long Fight for Statehood

Island Territory Sees Culmination Of 50-Year Bid

WASHINGTON. — With its 50-year-old bid for statehood safely past the halfway mark, the Territory of Hawaii will make a concerted effort to become the 49th state during the second session of the 80th Congress.

This is not the island's first campaign for statehood. The territory has been seeking recognition as a state ever since it was annexed to the United States. However, this is unquestionably the most ambitious campaign.

With "statehood now" on the rallying cry, Hawaii has carried on an active campaign in the United States as well as in Washington. To facilitate contacts with the national capital, a statehood committee formed under the leadership of Gov. Ingram M. Stainback, has operated Washington headquarters in charge of this branch in George H. McLean, a full-time scholar who went to the territory six years ago for a temporary job and decided to remain.

Long known as the "crossroads of the Pacific," Hawaii is composed of 18 islands, of which nine are inhabited. The group extends for 2,000 miles from northwest to southeast and comprises 6,436 square miles.

Experts Predict Big Wheat Crop

Output of Billion Bushels Again Would Permit Large Exports.

WASHINGTON. — Department of agriculture experts declare that another billion bushel wheat crop, which would permit large exports, is possible in 1948.

Despite the adverse weather conditions which delayed seeding of the winter wheat crop, the experts said that it farmers planted an average of 100 million bushels in 1948 as in 1947 and the yields were average, a bumper crop of more than one billion bushels was possible.

This would be one of the six largest in history and again would permit large exports, the experts said. New December Record. December wheat output report, first on the new crop, set winter wheat seedings at 10,049,000 acres, a new record. Production was estimated at 830 million bushels, assuming that the winter wheat crop develops normally.

The final 1947 crop report showed wheat production to be 83 million bushels, the highest in history. Because of the decline, the department estimated the 1947-48 crop at 830 million bushels. It 830 million bushels were consumed in the United States, including 37 million bushels for export, 757 million bushels would be available for export.

Farmers were receiving higher prices than ever before, but they were paying more for the things they buy. The index of prices paid by farmers, including interest charges, was 100 in December, a record 34, 40 points above November and 20 above a year earlier. The index of things the farmers sell advanced to 81 in December, 10 points above a month earlier, and above the October record of 71 above December, 1946.

Average prices of wheat, oats, barley and cottonseed set new records; dairy products prices were down only in those categories. The 1947-48 crop was higher than in any December since 1927; most animal products broke their 1947 record. The index of farm prices declined and were 26 per cent lower than a year ago.

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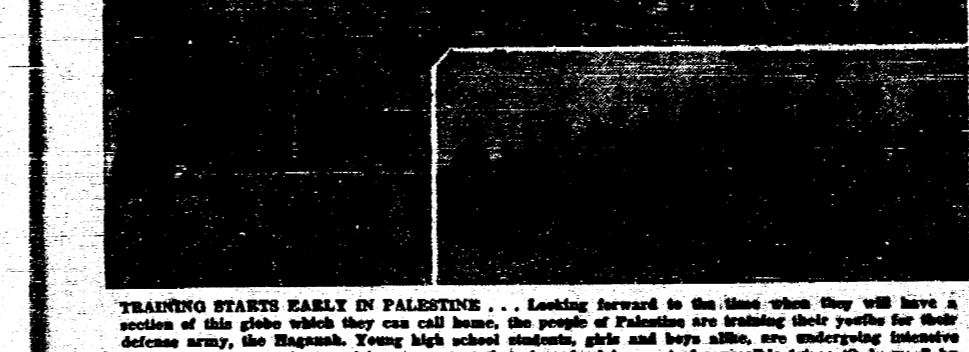

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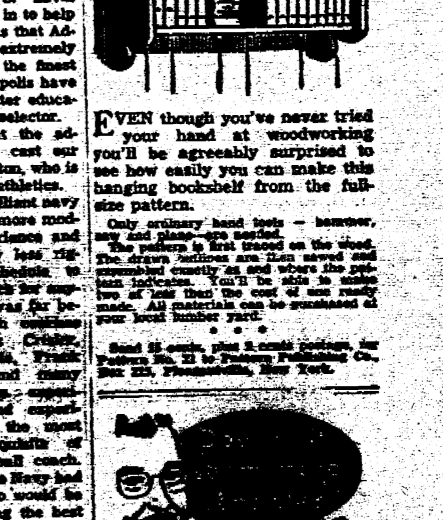

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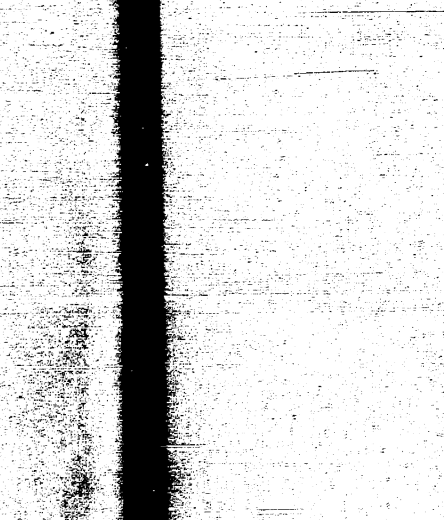
