**Attack on Anderson**  
IN ALL probability the department of agriculture, the largest governmental agency in Washington, needs bolstering of its defenses from this column. However, recent broadcasts of certain congressmen and the statements of certain newspaper columnists, together with those politicians who lack neither all hearing sense on the department and the secretary of agriculture for action in the purchase and sale of farm produce leads this reporter to re-examine.

To top it off, we recently set through the most absurd and utterly ridiculous trade to our knowledge ever made on the floor of the United States senate. The speaker was Sen. "Poppy" O'Daniel of Texas.

From tents to towers, from No Man's Land to a mighty state, Oklahoma's development through its history goes back to Coronado and his quest for the Land of Quivira, white men consistently overlooked its wealth above and below the ground until the latter part of the 19th century. A part of the Louisiana Purchase, Oklahoma was bought and sold, given to various Indian tribes, purchased back from them, and generally considered a land of little worth until 1890 when congress authorized the President of the United States to negotiate for unused land which might be opened to white settlement.

Lands of the Creek and Seminole were thrown open to homesteaders on April 22, 1889, and 100,000 people raced into Oklahoma. The entire region was settled almost within a day. Towns were laid out and plows hit into the soil before the sun was down. There was no government until May, 1890, when an act passed by congress created the Territory of Oklahoma. The first legislature met at Guthrie on August 27, 1890. The eastern part of the area remained Indian territory.

Field Over Staked.  
Agriculture for statehood began almost immediately. Whether there should be two states or one was an argument that lasted for years. The whites wanted the state of Oklahoma. The five nations met at Muskogee and petitioned for the state of "Covecroft." Governor Ross was elected in 1890.

Local concerns have been entrenched by two of the largest payments in history from government agencies. Another big payment was the \$7,593,487 distributed by the bureau of land management in 22 states as state grants for collecting for grazing, mineral leasing, timber and potash fees on public lands.

### Livestock Poisoning Hazards Listed

Seven livestock poisoning hazards, some of them especially critical during the spring seeding and pasture season, were listed today in a special warning bulletin from the American Foundation for Animal Health.

Valuable livestock may be lost, the organization declared, unless farmers are careful to protect their stock against these dangers:

- 1 Seed oats treated with mercury preparations to check rust may kill other fungus diseases. Mercury poisoning may result if an animal eats too much of this treated grain.
- 2 Rat poison, ANTU, 1000, thallium and even the relatively safe lead arsenic are toxic to farm animals and pets if sufficient amounts are consumed.
- 3 Lead poisoning from fresh paint or flakes of old paint, Cadex, especially, are subject to this danger.
- 4 Chemical weed killers. Now widely used, these should be checked to determine whether they contain substances poisonous to stock. If they do, they should be handled accordingly.
- 5 Grasshopper poisons. Arsenical-treated bran is commonly used to control grasshoppers. It should not be sprinkled on pastures. Bags of treated bran should never be left where livestock may get at them.
- 6 Hedges sprayed with lead arsenate to combat plant parasites.
- 7 Highway surfacing oil. Heavy rains may wash dangerous amounts of oil off the roadway and into pastures and fields. Several cases of cattle poisoning from this cause have been reported.
- 8 If an unexpected case of poisoning occurs, farmers were urged to call their veterinarian immediately.
- 9 "Emetics and other treatments may save a poisoned animal's life," the foundation declared. "A diagnosis may show that the trouble is caused, not by poisoning, but by some infectious disease."
- 10 A Chemical weed killer. Now widely used, these should be checked to determine whether they contain substances poisonous to stock. If they do, they should be handled accordingly.

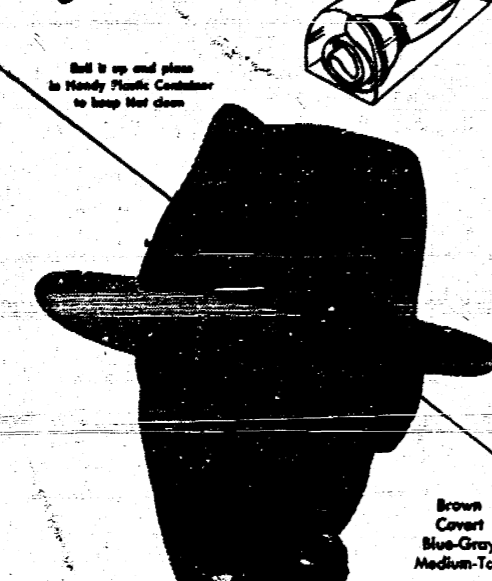

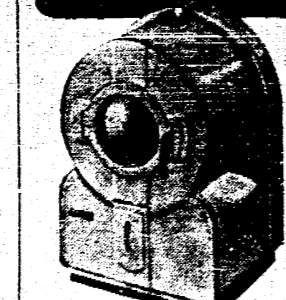

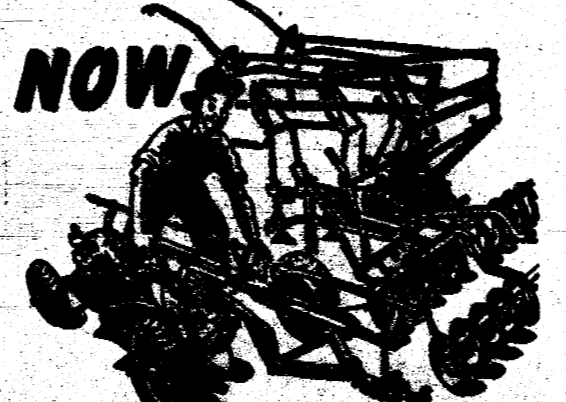

**CORRECT METHODS NEEDED FOR GOOD SLAUGHTER RESULTS**  
 Correct slaughter methods are needed to help insure a good meat supply for next summer, according to E. J. Fawcett, animal husbandry specialist at Michigan State college. Livestock to be slaughtered should be kept off feed for 24 hours previous to slaughter but should be given water. Avoid bruising or exciting and do a good job of sticking. Thorough bleeding is important for good results in storing and curing meat.

Slaughtering should take place when the temperature is just above freezing. If the temperature is too low, the carcass will freeze on the outside and cause souring of the meat. If the weather is warm, it may be more advantageous to wait until evening and cooler temperatures to slaughter. Beef improves with age so a carcass from a well fattened animal may be allowed to hang from a week to ten days before being cut—providing the temperature is around 34 to 36 degrees Fahrenheit. A choice lamb carcass may be aged a week but pork should be cut after two or three days.

Cold storage facilities are available in most rural villages, now and carcasses can be stored in them with greater safety. A lamb carcass may be cut up and kept in the family refrigerator for a few more days. Farmers may share a beef if a whole carcass is too much for one family. Most cold storage locker plants have facilities for clipping and wrapping the meat.

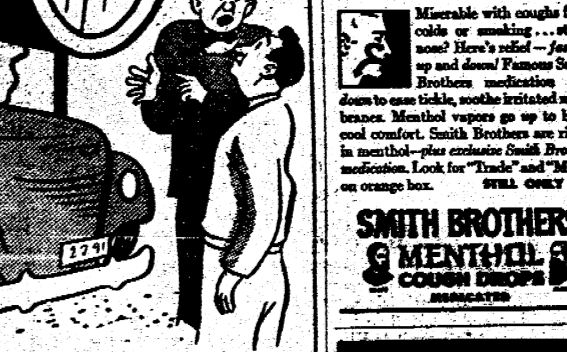
