**TAKE IT EASY . . .**

**Traffic Mishaps At New Peak, But Death Toll Drops**

Motor vehicle accidents in Michigan reached a new high in 1947, the fatality toll was the lowest ever set on record, travel mileage exceeded that of any previous year, but the death rate per 100 million miles of travel dropped to an all time low.

This information is revealed in the annual accident report released by Commissioner Donald S. Leonard of the Michigan State Police.

The report shows 137,619 traffic accidents during the year as compared with 110,521 in 1946, an increase of 27,098, or 25 per cent. There were 1,770 fatal accidents in 1947, 1,434 persons met their deaths; 20,714 accidents which resulted in 20,195 injuries, and 109,635 property damage accidents. Compared with 1946 experience, there were 34 fewer deaths, or a reduction of two per cent, and an increase of 3,716, or 11 per cent, in injury accidents.

Estimated motor vehicle travel exceeded 17.6 billion miles in 1947, or 10 per cent more than in 1946, and the death rate of 0.14 per 100 million miles of travel was 12 per cent below 1946.

More care in driving and walking and better control measures appear to be the most logical explanation for the reduced severity of accidents, the report states. Contributing to this was the important influence of the press and radio and other agencies in stressing safety. On the other hand, the increased mileage multiplied the chance for accidents and was partly responsible for the increase in personal injury and property damage mishaps.

Incorporated communities accounted for 85 per cent of all accidents, 63 per cent of the injuries and 37 per cent of the deaths. Rural areas accounted for 15 per cent of all accidents, 37 per cent of the injuries and 63 per cent of the deaths. Higher speeds were largely responsible for the increased severity of rural area accidents.

Pedestrian, railroad train and off-road accidents resulted in 1947 the highest ratio of deaths and injuries per accident. Passenger cars accounted for 77 per cent of the vehicles involved in fatal accidents, and trucks, buses, and taxicabs accounted for 20 per cent. In addition, 46 motorcycle and four school buses were involved in fatal accidents.

Five counties, Cheboygan, Kalamazoo, Keweenaw, Lake and Ogemaw, reported no traffic deaths for the year.

The report also points out: Night accidents accounted for 57 per cent of the fatalities, although there is usually only one-third of the total daily travel during these hours.

Seven out of 10 drivers involved in fatal accidents were reported to be violating the law at the time. Driving too fast for conditions was by far the major cause. About one out of five, or 22 per cent, of these drivers "had been drinking," and one out of 17, or six per cent, was "under the influence."

There were 495 pedestrians killed in 1947, a reduction of eight per cent from 534 in 1946.

three were violating the law or acting unsafely at the time. Children under 15 years of age accounted for 98, or one-fifth, of all pedestrian fatalities.

Vehicle defects were reported in 15 per cent of all fatal accidents. "During the 10-year period of 1938 to 1948 there were 967,367 reported traffic accidents in Michigan," Leonard said. "These accidents resulted in 14,502 deaths and 301,096 injuries. The number of deaths was eight times greater than

**Phone Service Here Above National Average**

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today revealed that the percentage of farms having telephone service in its territory is well above the national average.

Whereas 42 per cent of America's farms have telephones, 63 per cent of rural establishments in Michigan Bell territory have the service, according to the H. J. Frakken, manager for the company. The national average—a new record high—compares with 52 per cent at this time three years ago.

Frakken said that, at the beginning of the year, there were more than 2,000,000 telephones in rural territory of the Bell System, including some 122,000 in the territory of Michigan Bell. Since V-J Day, the number of rural telephones served by Bell companies have increased 700,000, including a gain of 42,750 in rural areas served by Michigan Bell.

Rapid progress since V-J Day, Frakken said, is attributable in part to fast and economic construction methods perfected by telephone engineers in recent years. Use of stronger wire has reduced the number of required poles which are now set farther apart. Portable-driven augers dig trenches, bury wire, and cover it in one operation where soil conditions permit.

In addition to bringing telephone service to more rural customers, Bell companies are improving the service, Frakken said. Overloaded lines are being relieved by reducing the number of parties on a line. Magneto, or crank type, service is giving way to lift-the-receiver or dial operations.
