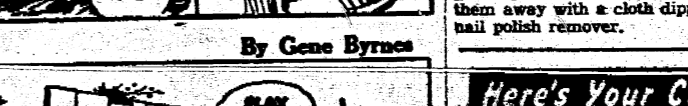

**Potato Exhibits At State Fair**  
A new type of tablestock potato exhibit has been scheduled for the Michigan State Fair this year, according to Herbert Postgreve, farm crops specialist at MSC, who is assisting with the exhibition.  
Any Michigan grower or shipper is eligible to enter an exhibit of potatoes representing the quality of the potato being marketed. Each entry will be a minimum of 400 pecks. The potatoes remain the property of the exhibitor, but arrangements can be made through the Superintendent to sell them at the close of the Fair.  
Within the judging is complete, exhibits which meet the quality standards of the Michigan Potato Development Association may be stamped or tagged with the "Seal of Quality" by the secretary of the association.  
Interested growers and shippers should notify: H. E. Postgreve, Farm Crops Department, MSC, E. Lansing, by August 26, if they intend to exhibit.

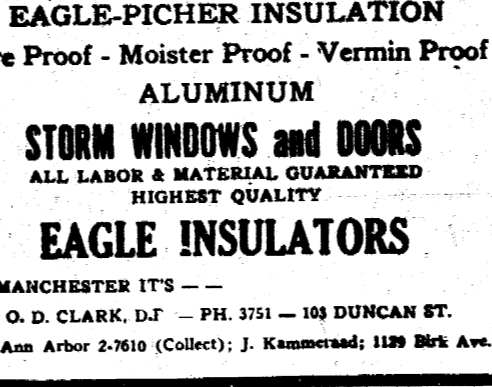

With the inauguration of nationwide worldwide air parcel post service on August 26, the United States Post Office in Manchester, Michigan, will afford postage of more than 42,000 post offices in America and 250,000 in foreign countries. The new service will be reduced to 10 cents per pound for parcels up to 100 pounds. Postmaster Merriman pointed out that air parcel post packages will be given the same priority consideration shown air mail in routing. In addition, identical postage delivery will be given to air parcel post as is afforded other forms of mail, making the air parcel post service unique in every respect.
