**Future Farmers' Fat Stock Show Set For October 5**

Members of the Future Farmers of America are looking forward to the date of October 5 when they go to St. Johns for their annual fat stock school and sale.

George Brown, head of MSC animal husbandry department and Conrad White of the agricultural education division are working together on plans for the day. The FFA boys will bring their stock to the event where they will be judged and then auctioned to high bidders. An educational program on stock raising will be given by John Stockyards and a number of seminars are offered.

**FOOD DIET IS NEEDED FOR FIRM EGG SHELLS**

Is your flock producing eggs with firm shells? Cracked or checkered eggs bring less money, check out J. M. Moore, extension poultryman at MSC.

The specialist advises that eggshells can be improved by providing the birds with direct sunlight, not through glass. In the fall, the birds should have plenty of fish oil or other vitamin D supplement.

Calcium carbonate as found in oyster shells and limestone must be present with the vitamin D to make good egg shells. Moore believes, furthermore, that the birds should be encouraged to eat plants of this material.

**FEED SUPPLY SHOULD BE CONSIDERED NOW**

Checking up on what your feed supplies will be like this winter is good farm business. A little extra thought to feeding problems is recommended by A. C. Balder, extension dairyman at MSC.

Grain fed to cows now that grain is more abundant will pay off in more milk production in the winter. A grain mixture of 400 pounds of oats, 200 pounds of wheat, 200 pounds of corn and 100 to 150 pounds of good quality alfalfa is recommended. Such a mixture fed at the rate of at least one pound for each three one-half pounds of milk produced is suggested for cows milking over 20 pounds of milk daily.

It is also important to store an abundant supply of roughage in the form of hay and silage. Additional silage may be stored in temporary or permanent silos.

Balder says that farmers who feed their cows with grass or molasses grass silage in June have a decided source of feed which is available to meet conditions facing the dairymen at the moment. Forcing the feed situation by having roughage during the early fall pays off. It is expected that more and more farmers will plan to fill silos in 1940 with grass and molasses grass silage to maintain higher levels of milk production.
