'49 Frazer On Display Here; Many Changes Noted

WILLOW RUN, October 20.—Kaiser-Frazer Corp. dealers introduced the Frazer and Frazer-Mauser today, new models which complete the company's 4-door sedan series for 1949.

The Kaiser Special and Deluxe sedan models were announced a month ago.

Edgar F. Kaiser, vice president and general manager, said that the new Frazer sedans joined Kaiser's model-on Willow Run production line September 14, and that K-F's output of 1949 models is now over the 800,000 mark.

Resold throughout, the Frazer sedans incorporate extensive mechanical changes which include a 12 per cent boost in horsepower with no accompanying increase in fuel consumption.

The power increase was accomplished with the adoption of dual carburetors and a dual-throat carburetor which provide most efficient distribution of fuel to all cylinders. A compression ratio of 7.5:1, highest among standard mass-produced automobiles, has been maintained in the six-cylinder engine to produce maximum economy and performance.

Slowly, the Frazer series is distinguished by longer skirt body panels, a new "honeycomb" grille, wide chrome trim along the base of the body, and the addition of a chrome "crease molding" which extends the length of the car below the window openings.

In interior design, the Frazer and the Mauser represent a new approach to fabric and color styling, featuring 37 varieties of built-in colors and harmonizing face-quality upholstery fabrics.

Mr. Kaiser said the Frazer models, which were unveiled as a part of K-F's \$10,000,000 new model program for 1949, embody "more custom styling features than any other mass-produced American automobile."

Among other features, automatic window opening, "Great Sound-Down Great Plays," over station CKLW, Detroit.

New Telephone Rates for Michigan Bell Customers

The Michigan Public Service Commission today approved a new schedule of rates for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in compliance with an order of October 6 increasing the Company's revenues by \$2,177,000 a year.

Effective immediately, the rate increase which after taxes will mean \$3,094.50 to the Company, will be applied to each of the Company's 242 exchanges and virtually every type of Michigan Bell service. The rate increase is the first of the Company in 22 years.

The order establishes two sets of rates in outstate exchanges, including Manchester, where extended-area service will be introduced. The first will be an interim schedule until the service is initiated and the other, new rates when extended-area service gets under way, to eliminate toll charges between exchanges with the same "community of interest." Although extended-area service was authorized by the Commission in April, facilities will not be ready for the service to be introduced here until late next spring.

For the privilege of making unlimited calls to Ann Arbor without paying toll charges, customers here will pay somewhat higher rates when extended-area service (See—NEW RATES—Back Page)

is in effect. Introduction of the service, however, will not increase the Company's revenues inasmuch as such increases in local exchange charges will be offset by the loss of toll revenue, the Company pointed out.

The order authorizes relatively higher increases in some exchanges, including Manchester, to correct inequities. N. J. Pratkanis, manager, said. He pointed out that a Commission order of 1942, while discharging such inequities in exchanges where charges were above the levels fixed in the rate were below such levels. "Rates in Manchester have been on the low side for years when compared with other exchanges of like telephone development and calling opportunities," he said.

Monthly residence rates for local exchanges here will be increased as follows:

Residence Service—Individual lines, now \$1.25, to \$2.25 until extended-area plan introduced, four-party, now \$1.45 to \$1.75 until extended-area service, and \$2.25 when extended-area service introduced.

Business Service—Prime branch exchange, now \$2.75, to \$3.00 until extended-area plan introduced.

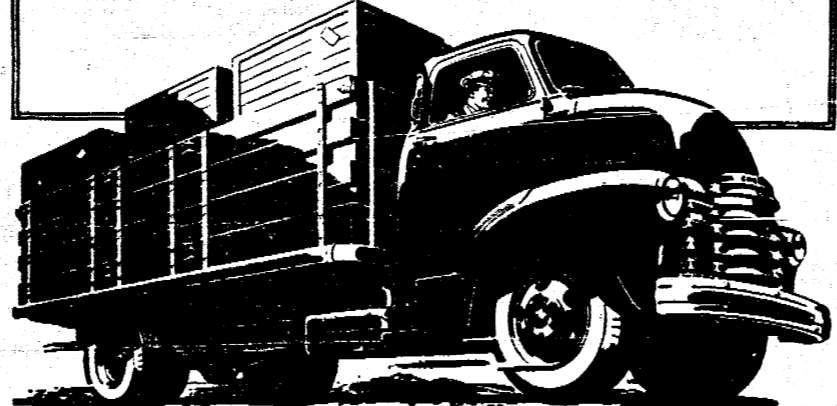
