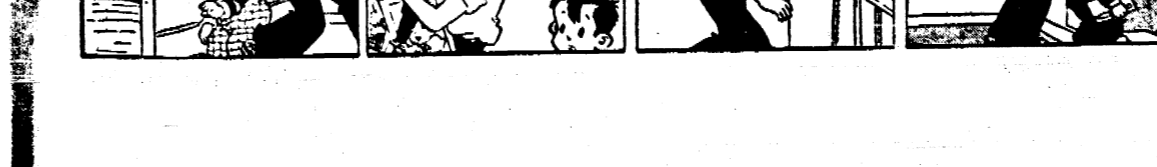
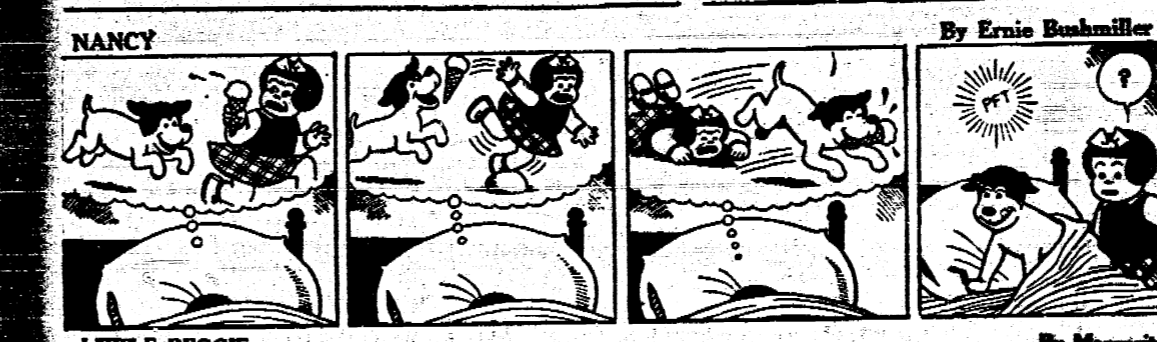

Car Registration Hits New High

DETROIT, November 17—A total of 1,730,000 passenger cars will be registered in Michigan during 1948, it was estimated today by Automobile Club of Michigan. This is 8.3 percent above the 1,597,137 total for the state in 1947.

While the number of cars on the road increases yearly, fifty percent at pre-war levels yet, Richard Harfat, Auto Club general manager, said. Worst deficiencies in Michigan he named as road building and repair, off-street parking facilities and tourist accommodations.

Harfat recommended that Michigan's next legislative session adopt the road program which has been found necessary by the Michigan Good Roads Federation Study. It includes redistribution of all highway revenues and increases in various revenue-producing methods.

While an Auto Club survey reveals 16 Michigan cities are now getting results from off-street parking programs, provisions to date has not been reported.

Harfat recommended that more cities adopt specific plans and begin work on financing off-street parking facilities.

"Michigan needs more first-class tourist facilities," said. Several large Michigan cities have inadequate and antiquated hotel accommodations, while some tourist areas of the state have no "room-with-bath" accommodations at all he said.

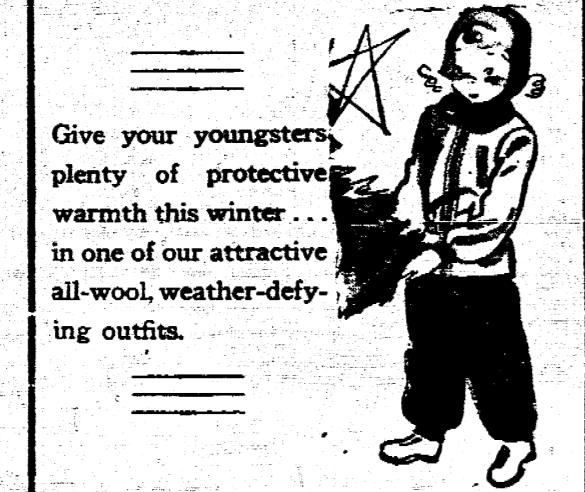
In spite of increased traffic, the rising toll of accidents should be stemmed soon, however. For in teaching its youngsters how to drive, Michigan leads the nation with 200 high schools now offering behind-the-wheel training, Harfat noted. Trained youths have five times less accidents than their untrained schoolmates.

In the United States some 33,325,000 passenger cars will be licensed this year, or roughly 2,000,000 more than the record including autos, trucks and buses will approximate to \$27,000, an 8.6 percent increase over last year's record, and 6,065,000 greater than the previous high established in 1941, he said.

With the exception of Montana and the District of Columbia, losses in passenger car registrations due to the war will be made up in all areas by next year. Bus and truck registrations have increased more rapidly than automobiles, he noted. The percentage of trucks and busses on the road has increased from 14 to over 22 in 1948.

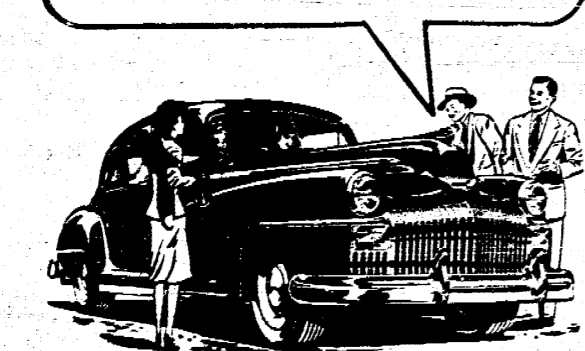

Dairying Seen As Profitable In 1948

Farm prices of dairy products in 1948 that will average close to the 1948 levels are predicted by MSC agricultural economists. Supplies will be higher, they believe, but with a strong continuing demand, net farm income from dairying should be good.

Dairy specialists advise feeding balanced rations to cattle to maintain full production in the coming year. High-producing cattle should receive enough extra feed to keep them producing well. Culling and attention to feeding of young stock are also indicated. The feeding situation will be improved, they believe. Each pound of milk will buy one-third more dairy ration than a year ago.

Demand for all dairy products will continue strong, the economists say. Fluid milk sales follow the usual seasonal pattern, declining about ten percent from December to June and rising after that. Milk output will probably be higher by two to three percent.

Motors Need Winter Care

Farm automotive equipment should be readied for winter, say agricultural engineers at MSC. An important point to consider, they believe, is anti-freeze to prevent motor freezing.

The cooling system should be carefully inspected before adding anti-freeze. Costly damage can develop from leaks, and under severe conditions an engine block can be ruined, putting the car, tractor or other equipment out of service.

Here are some of the tips passed along for a cooling-system inspection.

1. Inspect radiator - If it is rust-clogged, it should be drained and cleaned. A cooling system cleaner is excellent for this purpose.
2. Check for leaks - radiator hose, hose clamps, and pump should be tight. Servicemen will indicate need for any repairs or replacement.

President Truman Astonounds Nation By Winning Election Over Dewey; Senate, House Go Democratic, Too

ELECTION: Ghost Walked

The night of November 3 was supposed to have been a walk for the defeated Democratic party but the corpse wouldn't be still. It not only sat up but went around stopping the premature burials of the party.

It was Truman all the way from the first early returns which indicated the trend until the great pivotal states of Ohio, Illinois and California swung over to the Democrats' camp, crushed Dewey and forced him to concede.

MR. TRUMAN'S two million-plus plurality which gave him 30 electoral votes to Dewey's 187 was nothing less than a popular directive to serve.

More than that, the President has commonly stated about the election that the Democrats had control of both houses of Congress. How justifiable that claim will turn out to be, however, is a question over his veto.

Thomas E. Dewey of New York must have been the most trusted man in the nation for a few days after November 3.

At 46, an age when most men in politics are only beginning their climb to the top, he had set for a new mark on an imaginary yardstick — created by himself — when he voted from the pollsters' tally to feel it disprove under him.

Fort At Soo in 1751 French Built Tiny

Competition for the white man's share in the Upper Peninsula Indian fur trade caused establishment of a French fort at Sault Ste. Marie in 1751.

The fort was built by one of two Frenchmen to whom had been granted 214,000 acres of land in that region.

is now, according to Dr. F. Chester Bald, assistant director of the Michigan Historical Collections at the University of Michigan.

The two men were Louis de Gardou de Repentigny and Captain Louis De Bonne. The fort was built and maintained under the direction of De Repentigny as De Bonne never visited his holdings.

Construction of the distinctive stockade which contained four buildings marked the second time the French had occupied that immediate area.

Eighty years earlier on June 14, a French officer standing at the Sault before some 2,000 amazed Indians formally had claimed the entire western country for France.

A French mission also was begun there in 1688. But it was abandoned in 1689 because the Chippewa Indians, with whom the priests had been most concerned, had practically deserted the area.

The fort was occupied in 1763 by a group of British troops from Mackinac following the ce-

lating-place around the rapids between Lakes Superior and Huron, the 110-foot square fort dominated the principal trade route between the upper and lower country, its convenient soon drew valuable furs from the British trading posts further away.

But Cadott was a practical businessman, not a romantic. He offered no resistance. However the British occupation was brief at the site of 1872 a fire broke out under mysterious circumstances and destroyed all except Cadott's home, according to Dr. Bald. The British were forced to return to Mackinac.

And so Cadott was left to himself to carry on his fur trading in the fort's one remaining house which already originally belonged to him. But the flames on that December night had burned away the main chapter in the history of Sault Ste. Marie's first fort.
