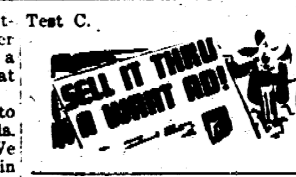

CARE NECESSARY AT MILKING TIME

Proper milking technique help to account for good yields, believes Earl Weaver, head of the dairy department at Michigan State college.

Cows are animals that become accustomed to routine. A little regularity and kindness in the milking job is good business, he explains.

Leaving a milking machine on a cow for 10 or 15 minutes is not good management, Weaver says. It doesn't get any more milk; it wastes time and may injure the udder.

The use of minerals for dairy cattle is of interest to many farmers, believes A. C. Baltzer, extension dairyman at Michigan State college.

Man Agricultural Experiment Station has long been for odorless steamed bone meal in addition to common salt.

The market today offers a mineralized salt which carries a trace of manganese, cobalt, iron and copper.

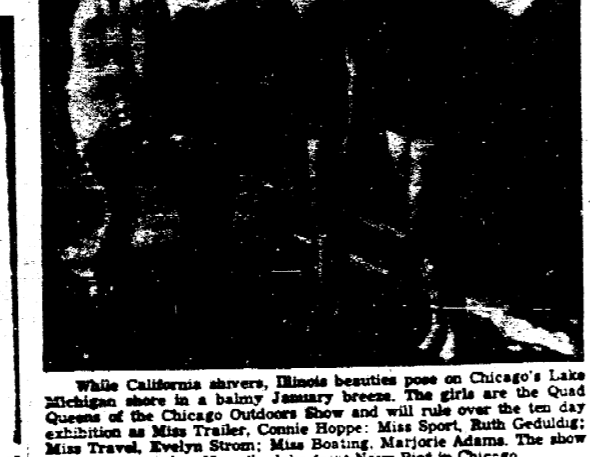

Michigan's local health de- partments are losing health profes- sionals in a droves, a retire- ment program to provide more security, would also help to improve the situation, he said.

The exodus of doctors, nurses and sanitarians was reported today by Doctor J. K. Aidand, Director of Local Health Ser- vices, Michigan Department of Health. He pointed out that there have been 55 changes in the 54 local health officer pos- itions in the state in the past five years. Less than half the health officers employed at the present time have been in health officer positions more than three years. Nine health departments have no directors at the present time. Continual changing personnel is a handi- cap to any program, Dr. Aid- land said.

Local health departments of the state have only one third the number of nurses needed to provide basic services. Of the positions budgeted, one-fourth of the nurses employed by local health departments have re- signed during the past year.

COUNTY GETS \$27,000 IN GAS TAX MONEY
LANSING, Feb. 2.—Vouchers to return \$1,270,000 in state gas- oline tax money to the coun- ties, cities and incorporated vil- lages as the second Session, set for February 12, are in Act 8 of the 1948 Extra Session, for expenditure on county road and city and village street improvements, have been prepared by the State High- way Department and the State Auditor General's office, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler reports.

Each year, \$6,750,000 of gas tax money is returned to the counties, cities, and villages for expenditure on local roads and streets. Of this amount \$4,000, 000 is returned to the counties for use on county roads only to compensate the counties for the cost of maintaining townships. An additional \$2,500,000 is returned to the counties which in turn distribute part of this money to their cities and incorporated villages.

Soil Testing Labs Set Up In Counties

The establishment of soil testing laboratories in about ten counties in Michigan is the result of increased interest by farmers and agricultural groups in soil testing in the last three years.
 Kirk Lawton, soils scientist at MSC, says that this is one of the best moves farmers can make since soil tests are necessary for a good soil fertility program.
 The county soil testing laboratory provides a valuable service for the farmer or grower. The results of soil tests in the county laboratory are turned over to the county agricultural agent. He is often familiar with the particular farm area tested and can interpret the tests and make soil management recommendations.
 The sponsorship of these laboratories has been undertaken by local agricultural groups including the county board of supervisors, farm organizations, the soil conservation district, and local business and civic groups.
 The methods used in these laboratories are generally made for acidity, available phosphorus, and available potassium. A slight charge is made for the cost of labor, equipment and chemicals.
 Lawton advises farmers who wish to learn more about a soil testing program to get in touch with their county agricultural agent.

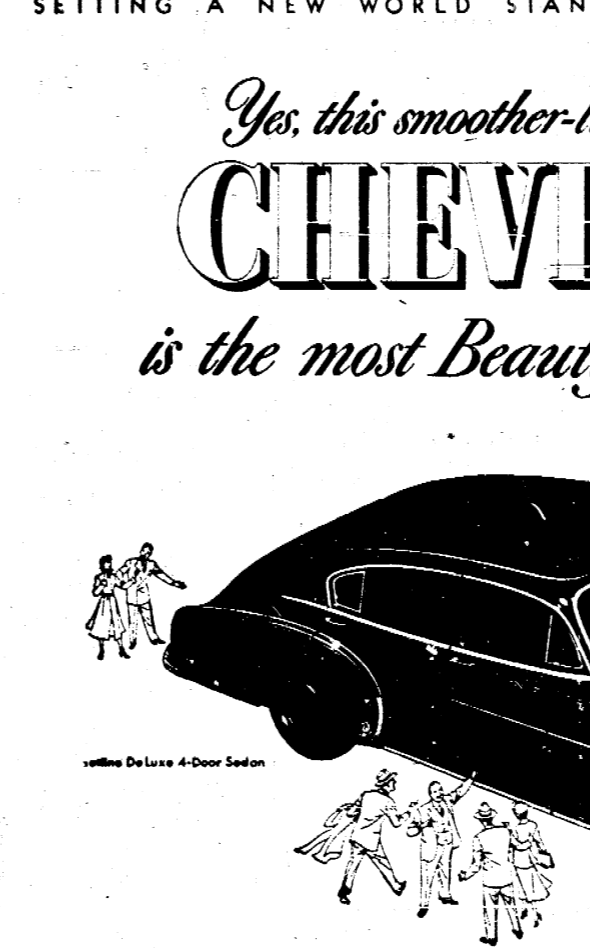

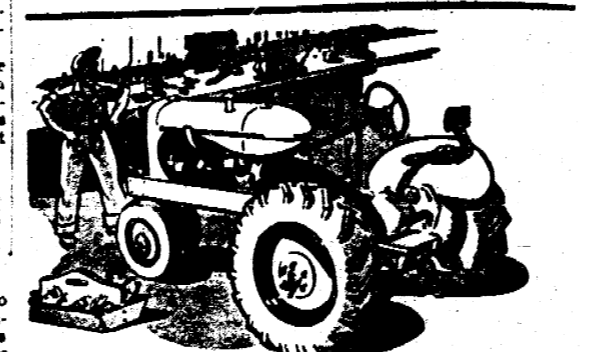
