



# Chicks Should Be Ordered Now

For farmers who are still wondering if it is advisable to buy baby chicks this year, Howard Zindel, M.D., extension poultry man, has a few suggestions.

He says that the farmer should consider five points if the prospects are favorable. The chances are that poultry production would be profitable for the farmer. First, is the proper equipment available? Was there a poultry enterprise on the farm last year? Do you like poultry and chickens? Do you have time to manage and properly care for baby chicks? Last, Zindel advises that the farmer figure whether adequate feed is available.

The farmer who steps from the poultry business from one year to another has little chance of making money, he stresses. The "in" and "out" is invariably wrong — in or out at the wrong time.

For those who plan to keep poultry this year, Zindel advises adding more members to the roll.

## Vernon J. Brown Offers Solution To Tax Problem

ANOTHER "PAINLESS" tax solution for Michigan's financial mess is now suggested by former Lieut-Governor Vernon J. Brown. He would abolish the retail sales tax and adopt, as its substitute, a one percent levy on the gross value of all manufactured products to be paid by the manufacturer.

SEVERAL VETERAN Lansing observers report growing opposition among legislators to Governor Williams' proposed four percent tax on corporation profits. Here is the reasoning: Michigan leads all states today in per capita income from manufacturing. It ranks fifth in the nation in the number of wage-earners. Why invite Michigan industry to decentralize or migrate to other states when such action would only reduce employment and curtail industrial wages at home?

THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE of the Republican state convention adopted by majority decision, any move to stir up the membership of the CIO prior to the spring election by attacking the CIO "domination" of the Democratic state convention. Political strategy will be to get out the rural vote. Legislative enactment of the colored oleomargarine bill was in line with this thinking. Legislators feared an impending referendum would cause city voters to flock to the polls.

LATEST RACKET: by ball pushing salesman in Michigan; Seligman poses as an interviewer "taking a poll." Housewife is led to believe that her "mail in her vote" on her favorite radio program (with a dollar check) will result in a scholarship course, she is asked to sign a contract which is taken her into buying something which in some cases runs over \$150.

INFLATION NOTE: County supervisors are to get \$8 a day, instead of \$6, in a bill approved by the House of Representatives at Lansing and likely to be OK'd by the Senate.

Governor Williams plans to appoint eight study commissions to investigate such state problems as higher education, state services and expenditures, aid to local governments, state and local tax structures, youth guidance, legislative reapportionment and medical services.

THE MICHIGAN DAIRY INDUSTRY, which has opposed sale of also colored to resemble butter, puts a valuation of \$187,125,000 on Michigan's 859,000 milk cows which produced 2,650,000,000 quarts of milk in 1947. Production per cow was 2,974 quarts, a new record. Dairy farmers' income totaled \$208 millions.



### CONGRESSMAN DINGELL

(Detroit) member of the House ways and means committee with Rep. # New Grade Unit To Be Voted On Friday Polls To Be Open From 2 to 8 p.m. The Manchester Enterprise

Voters of District Two will go to the polls tomorrow, March 11, to decide whether Manchester is to have a new grade unit.

The school board has announced that the polls will be open at the school from two p.m. to eight p.m. Although the law requires the polls to be open only two hours, the longer voting period will allow everyone time to get to the polls.

Three propositions will be voted on. They have already been printed in full in the Enterprise, but they are listed here in brief, to emphasize the point that all voters, whether they are taxpayers or not, are entitled to vote on at least one of the measures.

All voters, regardless of whether they are property owners, may vote on the proposition to increase the tax rate limitation. This limitation must be raised in order to assure the new grade unit. A simple majority of those voting will pass this proposition.

Actual voting of the bond issue is for property owners, their wives or husbands. It is not necessary for a wife to be a joint owner of the property with her husband. If he owns property she also has a vote.

The third proposition, to rescind the present building and site sinking fund, must also be voted by property owners, their wives or husbands. Both of these propositions may be passed by a simple majority of those who come to the polls.

## Need Is Great

How great is the need for the new grade unit was well brought out in the open meeting held by the Parent-Teachers' Association at the high school last Monday. In one room, the teacher is faced with an enrollment of 50 students next fall. The room has 37 desks and these are crowded against the walls. Next year she will be compelled to give the students only half-day sessions, teaching one group in the morning and the other in the afternoon. Other grades are faced with a similar problem. The only other answer is to rent vacant space elsewhere.

It was brought out at the PTA meeting that the new building will only add five mills to the present school tax. Where taxpayers have been paying about fifteen mills for their school over the past few years, their tax next year will be twenty mills. "This amount will be reduced as the bond issue is paid off year by year.

The \$100,000 bond issue runs over a period of fourteen years. If the building costs less, the savings can be placed in a bond retirement fund, which is demanded by investors as a guarantee of the safety of their investment. After a period of several years, the money saved may be used call in bonds.

Friday, March 11 has been set as the date for the School Bond Election. The School Board has announced that the election will take place at the school building, the polls remaining open from two p.m. until eight p.m. This will allow members of the district who work on afternoon and night shifts sufficient time to get to the polls.

Three propositions will be voted on. The first proposition, to borrow \$100,000, may be voted upon only by taxpayers and their wives (or husbands).

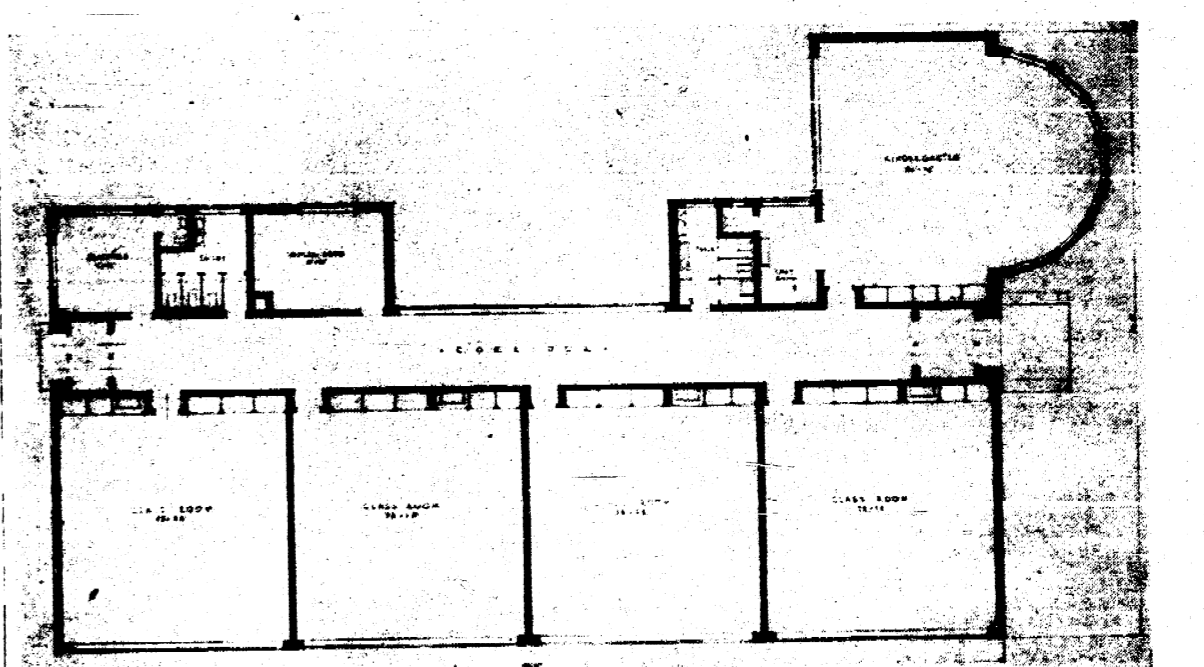
The second proposition, to raise the tax limitation, may be voted upon by any citizen of District Two who has lived in the district 20 days and in Michigan six months.

The third proposition, to rescind the present three-mill building-improvement fund, may be voted only by taxpayers and their wives (or husbands).

## Floor Plan Of Proposed School Unit



The Enterprise presents herewith the floor plan for the proposed new grade unit for the Manchester school. The unit includes four grade rooms, each 12 by 24 feet, a large kindergarten with a curved window. The plans also call for furnace room, faculty room and two toilets. A study of the kindergarten unit shows that it has its own stool, and an ante room with sink where children may wash their hands. These plans avoid many mistakes that have been made in other economy buildings recently erected in Western Michigan. For example, the wall between the corridor and classrooms is so constructed as to provide space for built-in wardrobes with sliding doors, bookcases and so on. The architect has made provision for a sink in each grade room, a practice that is now recommended in all new school buildings. Lower grades, in which children use paints and crayon, need their own sinks. The school board will welcome suggestions from room mothers and parents of children in lower grades as to decorations and furnishings for these rooms.

The architect has tentatively estimated that a building such as shown will cost in the neighborhood of \$77,000. There is some indication that building costs may be lower this summer than they have been, in which case the above figure may be lower. The architect, however, includes brick facing and fairly complete cabinet work inside. The above figure does not include furnishing such as desks, curtains, etc.

## School Unit Cost Will Be Moderate

Manchester citizens have wondered what a new school unit will cost THEM as taxpayers. Here is the information on which any citizen can figure his annual personal cost of the new school. The total school tax in 1950 is likely to be around twenty mills. It has been estimated that operating expenses will require eleven mills and the new building nine mills.

If a taxpayer has a property valuation of \$1,000, he will pay \$4.80 per year for the new building. (One mill equals one dollar on a thousand dollars of valuation.) From this, the taxpayer can figure the cost of the new grade unit. If he has \$2,000 of valuation, his cost will be twice \$4.80 or \$9.60. All the taxpayer has to do to figure his actual cost is to multiply the number of thousands in his valuation by \$4.80.

The above costs will go down after the first few years, as interest and principal on the bond issue grow smaller.

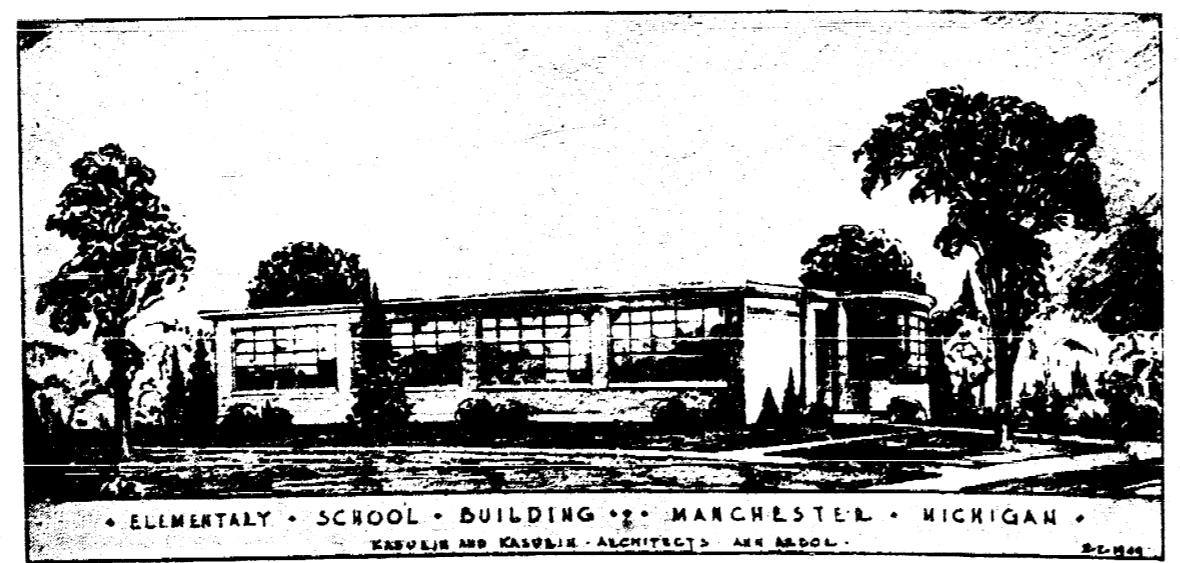

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Congress Gets Control Proposals Which Would Curb Wages, Prices; Doctors Offer Public Health Plan

CONTROLS: Needed or Not?

The administration at Washington has made it move for price and wage control.

It has asked congress to place ceilings on prices which threaten to go above last December's level. It also has proposed creation of a six-man board to regulate wage increases.

Already, however, it was becoming increasingly clear to the people that the administration's program was changing so rapidly that some of the major points in the administration's legislative program would become obsolete before they are called for consideration.

FOR INSTANCE, the downward trend in prices would indicate that a proposal for price control, except for some few isolated cases, might even appear ridiculous. Consequently, containing decline in prices would naturally knock out any validity of wage hike demands.

The urgency of the administration in this respect might be open to question, but not seriously so. Practical politicians and people who realize the need for application of political in government procedures will understand that whether the government actually wants what it asks is somewhat beside the point.

The real point is that these measures were pledged by President Truman in his campaign, and it was as early as inauguration day that administration leaders stated publicly they meant to implement campaign pledges in every way.

Now the administration is going through the motions of seeking to have adopted all the legislation the President promised the voters when he was a candidate for the office.

A QUICK RUN-DOWN of the administration's legislative program will show that civil rights, tax increases, outright repeal of the Taft-Hartley law and some other legislation, all admittedly needing some treatment, are in for a rough time in congress.

That being the case, it is difficult to understand how Mr. Truman and his advisers could make price and wage controls stick should there be no apparent need for them.

PUBLIC HEALTH: Physicians' Plan There would be discussion of medicine, of course, but without acquiescence by the belief that socialized medicine was an undesirable alternative, or by the desire to widen their field of service.

AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION: The plan was a counter move in the developing battle over socialized medicine, and in it one could see some concession to the bureaucratic ambitions which it is claimed, motivate the socialized medicine effort.

FIRST: The doctors through their American Medical Association board of trustees, urge creation of a federal department of health, with cabinet status, which would be authorized to promote the general welfare by aiding and fostering programs in the field of health.

DEPARTMENT DEVELOPMENT: Of diagnostic facilities; health centers and local public health units; health centers and hospital services; comprehensive health education programs; integration of veterans' medical care and hospitalization with other medical, care and social programs; greater emphasis on the prevention of disease; and adequate support, with funds free from political control, of the medical, dental and nursing schools and other institutions necessary for the training of specialized personnel required in the provision and distribution of medical care.

LONGEVITY: The Hard Way So you'd like to live to be 100? There's a way—but it will appeal only to the fabled.

MERCY TRAIN: And Kitties Although he finished back at the game, Kentucky's Gov. Earle Clements was not to be outdone in the amenities incident to arrival of the French Mercy train in Frankfort.

TRENDS: Dictatorial

The gentleman who was talking knew where he spoke. When he began to express himself on dictatorial trends, the public might have expected an assignment to put down one of the most vicious dictatorships the world had ever seen.

But he wasn't talking of foreign dictatorships. Instead he was warning the Columbia college forum on democracy that dictatorship was an actual possibility right here in the United States.

THE SPEAKER was Gen. Dwight D. "Doc" Eisenhower, who was supreme commander of allied forces in the war against the dictatorships.

Discussing the supposition that this nation was in danger of falling into the hands of a dictatorship without a shot being fired, Eisenhower said he was not talking about the usual type of seizure of power by force.

He was talking, he said, about a gradual dictatorship of bureaucracy which could result from the "constant drift toward centralized government."

"There is a kind of dictatorship," he said, "that can come about through a creeping paralysis of thought and readiness to accept paternalistic measures from the government, along with a surrender of our own responsibilities and, therefore, of our control over our own lives and our right to exercise our vote."

"WE ALLOW this drift toward centralized bureaucratic government to continue, finally it will be irreversible. In the actual field of operation.

"There'll be a warning of bureaucracy over the land, ownership of property will gradually drift into that central government, and finally you have to have dictatorship as the only means of operating such a huge organization."

When a man of General Eisenhower's stature is concerned over the probability of a dictatorship in this country, it is a warning that should be taken seriously.

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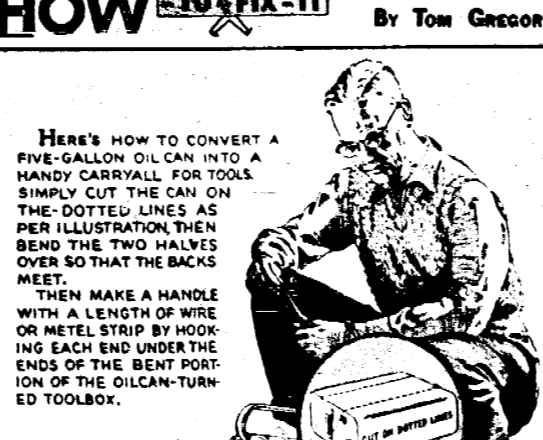
