**Importance Of
 Cooling Milk
 Stressed Now**
 Michigan dairy plants and
 producers have been advised of
 the necessity of cooling all milk
 and cream received for reser-
 vice or manufacture. F. M. Skiver,
 Chief of the Bureau of
 Dairying of the Michigan De-
 partment of Agriculture, says
 that letters have gone to 1100
 milk and cream buyers in Mich-
 igan telling them the require-
 ments of the law which prohib-
 its the receiving of milk or
 cream at a temperature above
 60 degrees.
 Receptive due to improving
 cooling facilities, heavy damp-
 ing, the first warm days of spring
 and extra care must be taken
 to see that farm produce tanks
 have plenty of fresh water and
 that milk and cream is allowed
 to stand in the cold water long
 enough to properly cool each
 can. "The increasing number of
 electric milk coolers on farms
 has greatly reduced the prob-
 lem of cooling. In some areas
 80 percent to 90 percent of the
 farmers have electric milk cool-
 ers," Skiver stated.

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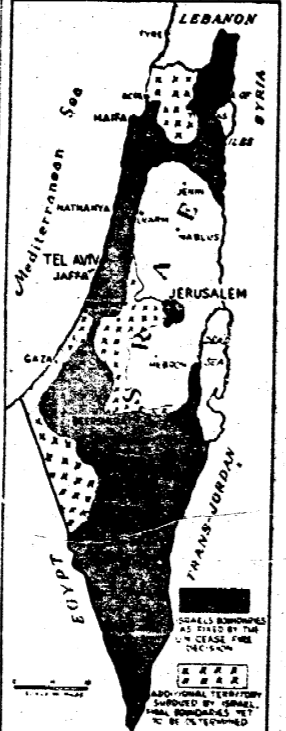

Jews in Dissent

The United States was urged to follow up on its promise...

BRADLEY rejected the idea widely held among some military men that it would be impossible to stop Russia from receiving the arms...

His remarks caused a sharp rebuke because he stated he had been requested by the state department to comment publicly on the military security significance of the North Atlantic pact...

He took a hefty swing at the Soviet, although naming them by name, which he declared "if to the people it is to be settled, then we must have to endure the slanders of those who call us Russia."

HE DECLARED the Atlantic pact had removed the world from a "cold war" stage and warned that America could not "stand by and see the victim of our own actions."

But all his urging to strengthen the "military" of China in favor of a striking coalition with the United States was met with a shrug and a "no comment" from the state department.

RUSSIANS ON RAMPADE
Soviet Troops Attack Army Post in Iran

Even as the North Atlantic pact was being signed in Washington, Soviet troops were attacking an Iranian army post in the strategic Middle East country...

ARMED UNITY:
A Contradiction?
Unity of the nation's armed services was promised, but where was the unity in defense preparation thinking?

For, despite the displayed potency of the air arm—combined with the atom bomb to immobilize naval might, defense experts were going blindly ahead designing and building new "super-warcraft."

LATEST EXAMPLE was the cruiser Roanoke—"the world's most powerful light cruiser"—and described by enthusiastic builders as being "practically unsinkable."

Speaking at the commissioning of the Roanoke, Louis Johnson, U. S. defense secretary, said the vessel was joining the "greatest fleet we ever maintained in time of peace."

HE DECLARED the ship would be "kept in training for its primary mission and carefully utilizing the word 'war.'" Johnson described the mission as "one we all hope and believe it will not be discharged."

Referring to armed service unity, the defense secretary said: "Our safety lies in the combined contribution of them all, each service in the sphere it is best equipped to handle."

With that aim, the people of the United States would be found in full accord.

NEW FEEDS:
Mighty Potent
Could an animal burst its seams by eating?

That is an academic question, of course, but some of the new livestock feeds are reported to be so powerful that animals literally "burst their seams" if fed too much.

DR. H. J. PRELUDA, nutritionist, stated that scientists simply would have to breed new animals with greater capacity.

The new high-energy feeds are being developed by a new firm, Nutrilite, based in what is called the "protein factory."

Dr. Preluda said that when these feeds are fed to a cow, the milk produced is rich in protein and fat.

HE ADDED that only a short time ago it took three and one-half pounds of feed to produce one pound of milk.

However, Dr. Preluda concludes, the new feeds will save weeks of the new super-feed.

When boiling rice, have water boiling furiously and drop rice into it so slowly that water never ceases to boil. Do not stir, lift occasionally to prevent rice from sticking to bottom of kettle.

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
