Sportsmen Optimists... From the cane-and-pole angler of the rural ponds, rivers and small streams, to the fishermen who strip famous trout and salmon streams with the best of equipment, Americans by the millions are fishing this year as they have for so many years—but their numbers will be larger in 1954.

These Get Away... At Bonneton, N. C., three small fish might take you safely through strands of Cluthrie net—a new selective type of net which brings up shrimp and mable fish and lets other types of sea life work its way back to freedom. The net is a snood-like attachment of over-size mesh, hard-twine net interlaced with soft fiber strings attached to control part of regular shrimp net. A U.S. fishery biological laboratory expert estimated this net would save billions of fish from destruction.

Rough Fish Trapped... Iowa is showing the way, somewhat, to other state conservation agencies through its program of trapping carp and buffalo and other rough fish, as a supplement to the both the expensive setting program now in effect.

**MICHIGAN MIRROR**

During your leisure time travel on Michigan state highways this summer, don't be surprised if you encounter miles of worn-out roads.

In fact, be surprised if you don't!

The state 3-cent gasoline tax and other revenue sources afford about \$36 million in road money for the fiscal year ending this June 30. That seems like a lot of money, but it really isn't so much, as Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler readily proves.

"From this amount \$700,000 are required for general administration, \$3 million for engineering and supervision, \$11 million for highway and bridge maintenance and operation, and \$500,000 to cover operating loss state ferries at the Straits of Mackinac," says Commissioner Ziegler.

"This leaves a balance of only \$15,700,000 of state funds for highway and bridge new construction and reconstruction, as well as to meet unforeseen emergencies not in our program such as immediate replacement of three bridges which collapsed this year."

"The legislature has approved a budget item of \$2,500,000 to start construction of a double ended ice-breaker needed to handle adequately the increased traffic volume across the Straits of Mackinac, both winter and summer. Money spent on construction of this ferry must also come out of the funds available for highway construction."

Lack of finances do not permit the state highway department to provide for normal depreciation of its trucking system of 9400 miles. "We should be spending \$25 millions each year in order to take care of depreciation only," said Ziegler. "We still have about \$160 million of highway deficiencies to be taken care of."

"From 1942 through 1945 regular highway construction was impossible because of war restrictions, but depreciation was stepped up by unprecedented traffic made necessary by war-time emergencies. Government statistics show that 73 percent

of all war production transportation in Michigan moved over Michigan highways.

"In 1946, immediately after the war, we expected to get our post-war construction programs under way. We could not do so because of the impossibility of getting cement, steel, new equipment and other materials. Therefore, we had four years of war, plus 1946, or five years when there was no new normal highway construction."

"Cost of Michigan Highway work has risen steadily from 1941 through the war years to 1946. Today our highway costs 110 percent above the costs of 1941. One dollar today purchases less than one half what it did in 1941."

**Proper Precautions May Save You From Drowning**  
 Thirteen drownings in Michigan waters in one short week and brought a timely warning from the Michigan Department of Health.  
 The people who drowned were just ordinary folks—a child wading in a river, another who stumbled into a deep channel, a couple whose boat capsized, a lad who dove into a shallow creek, a woman who fell out of a boat, the Department said.  
 "Observing the ordinary swimming and boating precautions may save your life or the life of your child," it added.  
 Swim only at a safe, guarded beach, during daylight hours. Never swim alone or after dark. Do not swim in unfamiliar or swift waters, nor dive into water of unknown depth. Do not rush or dive headlong into cold water. Wait two hours after meals before you swim and then do not swim until exhausted or chilled. If you must race, race toward shore.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS  
GOP Leaders Rap Demo Depression  
And Plan Bill, to Meet Situation;  
Brannan Plan Held Farm Vote 'Bait'

FARM VOTE: Bares Mission  
Boit Is Set

There was more to the Brannan farm program than has met the eye. According to seasoned Washington observers, the plan would serve as a bait for the farm vote in the congressional races next year.

For instance, if administration leaders could extend wartime price supports for another year, it would give voters a chance to pass on the controversial Brannan plan. Thus the plan could be dangled as a major issue when Democratic and Republican began struggling for the important farm vote.

AT a midwestern Democratic conference, both Brannan, secretary of agriculture, and J. Howard McGrath, chairman of the national Democratic committee, made a plea for extension of the price support program as they prepared to plan for next year's tug-of-war with the GOP.

McGrath, making it plain that the Brannan plan is Mr. Truman's endorsement, said continuation of the present relatively high-price support program was to be preferred to the Aiken long-range farm plan passed by the 80th Republican Congress. Unless congress acts, McGrath pointed out, the Aiken plan will go into effect next year.

The Brannan plan is designed to support farm income at a "parity" level, but at the same time to provide consumers with lower prices for palatable food—especially meat, dairy and poultry products—when there are surpluses. It would use government payments to assure desired farm cash returns.

PRESENT laws direct the government to support prices of major products at not less than 90 per cent of parity.

CONJURER: Name, Smile

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., who inherited a name and a smile to conjure with and wasted little time in conjuring with them, has been duly sworn in as a member of the house of representatives.

The 34-year-old congressman from New York's 26th district, filling the seat left vacant by the death of his father, ran as a candidate of the Four Freedoms and Liberal parties, although he will operate as a working Democrat in the legislative arena.

ROOSEVELT failed to get the regular Democratic nomination during the campaign for the seat on the Four Freedoms ticket. In so doing he secured a popular upset over the regular Democratic candidate, a Republican and an American Labor candidate.

The third son of the late President took the oath from Acting Speaker John W. McCormack (D-Mass.), while his mother beamed happily from the gallery.

During his first day on the job, Roosevelt was introduced to the members of the new House.

RED CHINA: Quiescent

Communism, like the worm in the bud, was creeping swiftly through China as the presence of the Red conquerors began to make itself felt.

At one village meeting in northern China, a man, bewildered and dismayed by the use of the Russian hammer-and-sickle flag in Chinese Communist meetings and parades, ventured to rise and ask a question.

"WHY IS THIS DONE?" he said, "to make a foreign country and we are Chinese?"

And the presiding political commissar snapped, "This subject is not on the agenda."

About the only thing that did show up on the agenda throughout the meeting was the Russian, but only as a sign of respect for the Chinese Communist rule.

An attempt to raise a question as to the regular orbit as a willing satellite was well on its way to assuming a regular orbit as a willing satellite.

FOR THE MOST PART there have been no signs of coercion or the United States. There is every evidence that the Chinese Communists are in fact ready to follow the dictates of Moscow. And that revelation should be enough to destroy any illusion that the Chinese Communists are just simple agrarian reformers.

They are whole-hearted, uncompromising, and they are following the dictates laid down by Karl Marx and adapted for 20th century application by Joseph Stalin and Mao Tse-tung.

THERE IS as yet no conclusive evidence that the Kremlin is growing more desperate in its attitude toward the United States.

The application of China's formal situation to the rest of the world is disturbingly clear: Through the medium of the Chinese Communist party, China inevitably is becoming a massive extension of the Soviet empire.

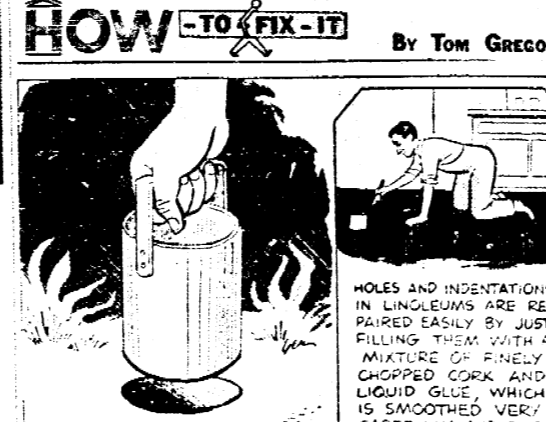
