



**SAFETY WEEK GOAL
 IS CUT IN ANNUAL
 FARM ACCIDENT TOLL**

Observance of Farm Safety
 Week from July 24 to 30 has
 been proclaimed by Governor G.
 Mennen Williams. The annual
 week is held to reduce the yearly
 toll of farm accidents.
 In his proclamation, the Govern-
 or points out "Accidents result-
 ing from carelessness take
 a heavy toll in human lives, ani-
 mals, and property on Ameri-
 can farms annually. On the basis
 of last records one out of every
 17 farm families will suffer an
 accident as the result of
 accidents in 1949".

Citing the frequency of acci-
 dents, the proclamation pointed
 out that records show four farm
 buildings are destroyed by fire
 every hour. The nation's farm
 population suffers an accident
 every 18 seconds during the
 year.

Total cost of the accidents,
 the facts show, is approximately
 one billion dollars or about \$38
 per farm dollar.

Agricultural extension work-
 ers at Michigan State univer-
 sity county extension personnel
 are cooperating to help reach
 the goal of fewer farm accidents.
 They are urging careful farm
 checks to get rid of hazards. The
 elimination of at least one un-
 safe practice by each member of
 every farm family is the major
 objective of the national farm
 safety week campaign.

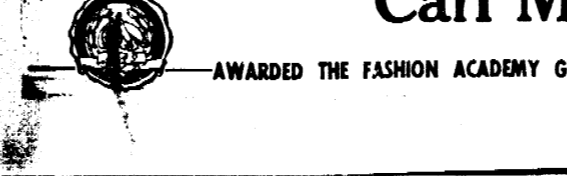

Censorship Rules Still Holds News From Most of World

WASHINGTON—(Continued) That word still rules the news for many sections of the world. The degree of restraint varies: In some countries the Soviet Union is seen the censor; in all news and cuts out anything he considers unfavorable.

In others, restrictions and pressures are heavy upon the press and upon persons or organizations that make news. That amounts to a censorship of the source, so a stoppage in the flow of information. Considerable restraint affects the news flowing from about a fourth of the world's populated area. That figure may seem small, but the effects of censorship are so far-reaching that they leave the world in doubt and suspicion.

Correspondents throughout the world have completed another periodic survey of censorship conditions. The survey shows that news restrictions have come down in the six months since the last roundup of the situation. In fact, news barriers have been erected for example, in China, torn by civil war.

The main exponent of censorship of the world the conditions that exist in one of the two most powerful countries.

This is impossible for an American reporter in Moscow to report of economic conditions in the Soviet Union. Unless there is an official announcement, he cannot tell you the current rate of wages to the price of food in Moscow.

The Moscow center is likely to be cut from a correspondent's copy any qualifying phrases the writer has inserted to balance news story on Russian developments.

The Russian idea of censorship is not confined to the press and radio, making it unanswerable to the government's orders. Has spread to other countries within Moscow's sphere of influence. However, those countries exercise less restraint upon foreign correspondents.

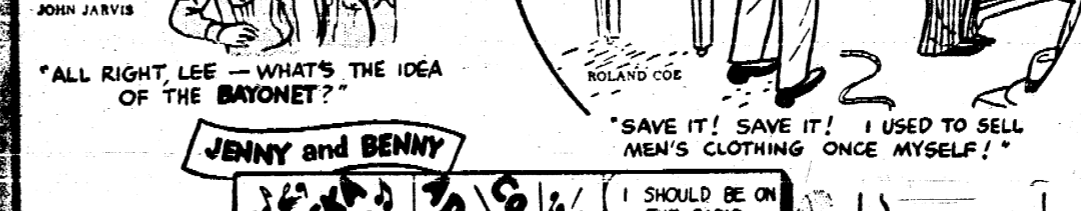

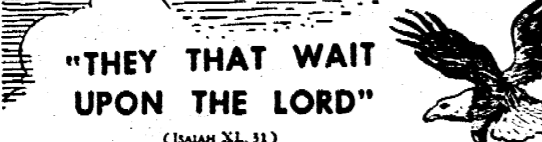
