THERE will be several new talking pictures shown covering farm equipment and modern farm practices which will be interesting and worth while to see.

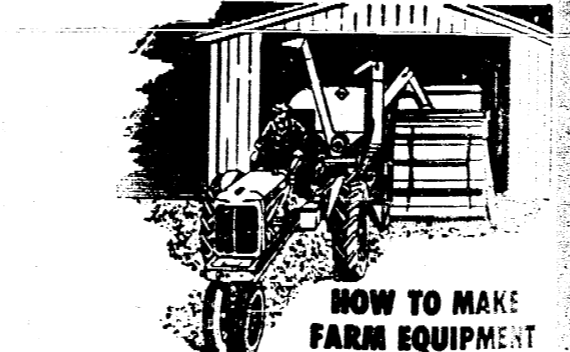

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## Retailing Isn't Easy

One of the highest rates of business mortality always exists in retail trade. Various reasons explain this. For one thing, running a store is a business, not a hobby, and people try it without adequate resources in either money, experience, or aptitude.

There is nothing simple about retailing. Like any other worthwhile endeavor, it demands certain abilities and characteristics if a man is to succeed. He must be willing to study and learn. He must have a genuine desire to serve the public, and to please people so that they will come back again and again. Above all, he must have the competitive instinct—the impulse which makes him want to do a better job than the storekeeper down the street or in the next town. He must never stand still, but must be constantly seeking ways and means to make his store more attractive to the public.

For those with the necessary resources, retailing offers great opportunity. No business gives the small operator a better chance to become the big operator. As an example, most of the chain systems are staffed, on

their top executive levels, by men who began in minor jobs—clerks, truck drivers, warehousemen, and so on. That is true of the big department stores and other major retail outlets. These people started at the bottom of the ladder and climbed it through their own efforts.

## Weight Tax Money To Be Distributed

Retailing is no place for the man who fears competition and has small faith in himself.

LANSING, January 26.—Vouchers for returning to the counties, cities and incorporated villages of Michigan the \$357,809.53 collected in weight tax by the state during the 4th quarter of 1948 have been prepared by the State Highway Department and sent to the Auditor General's department for payment. Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced today that the fourth quarter payment

makes a total of \$32,019,088.52 collected in weight tax during 1948 and returned to the counties, cities and villages to provide for the highway program by the state. This is an increase of \$4,029,677.50 over \$27,989,411.02 in weight tax collected during 1947.

Following is the amount that Washtenaw county will receive in 1948 fourth quarter weight tax money before sharing the return with the cities and incorporated villages: \$10,068.44

Washtenaw county 4-H girls will participate in their first county-wide Cherry pie baking contest Saturday morning, Feb. 5.

Twenty one girls have entered the contest to determine the county pie baking champion of Washtenaw county. The winner will be given an overnight trip to the state contest at Grand Rapids February 11.

Contestants must furnish all baking utensils and supplies except the cherries. The cherries will be furnished by the Michigan Cherry Growers. The contestants will be allowed to bake only one pie of approximately 8 1/2" in diameter and 1 1/4" in depth. Three minutes will be allowed each girl to tell about her recipe and other facts of interest. Pies will be judged on their appearance, crust, filling and taste.
