

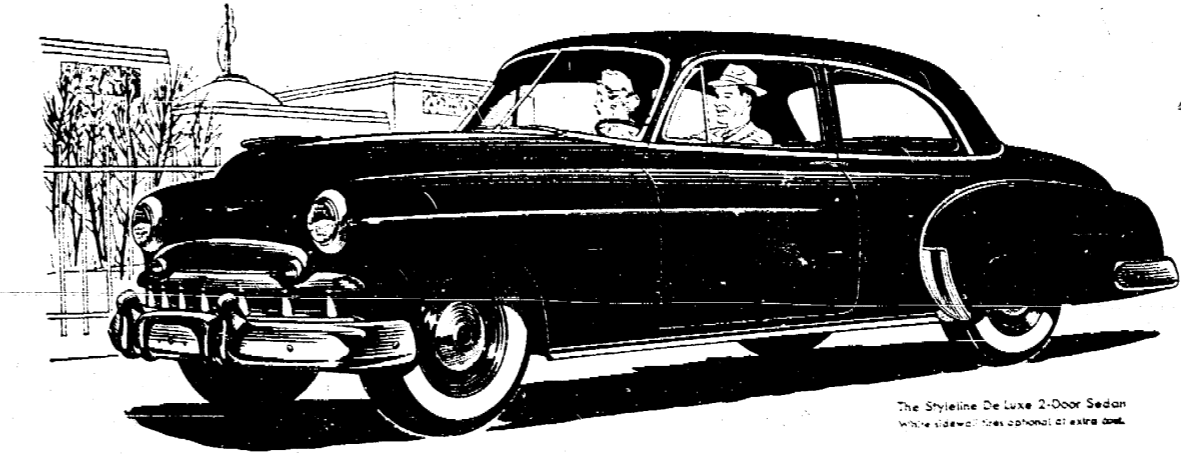

On these farms, better crop yields produced about the same total income in 1948 as did lower crop yields in 1947. The price drops caused that. Dairy, beef and poultry operations paid slightly more income, but swine and sheep projects returned less gross profit.

The average income in 1948 on these farms was only \$100 higher than in 1947. But farm expenses averaged \$807 higher in 1948 than the year before. Feed purchased, machinery costs and crop raising expenses were up considerably. So was the cost of hired labor.

Earnings declined 14 percent or \$842 on these better-than-average farms. This is the first time since 1943 that records on farming in this area showed a drop in earnings.

It is doubtful that legumes such as alfalfa, red clover or timothy hay are practical for muck soils because of the difficulty in maintaining them. Potatoes, which are not recommended because of lodging.

Looking for a spring tonic? Then pick some of the small weeds of wild greens growing in your backyard or along roadsides and eat them raw or cook them for dinner.

Some of the common weeds in Michigan gardens are considered "excellent" eating by consumers of other lands. Shoots of milkweed served like asparagus, steamed or raw, are considered great delicacies in many countries.

Pigweed, marsh marigold, chickory, wintercress, mustard, serrel, dock, and pokeweed like all other leafy green vegetables furnish iron, vitamin A, and in addition, some vitamins C, B1, B2, and calcium.

# Fire Prevention Notice

The following are a list of once issued by the Michigan Department of Conservation pertaining to grass fires.

1. The law requires that a building permit must be obtained to do any burning when the ground is not snow-covered. Permits may be obtained from any conservation officer, fire officer, townsmen or headquarters, either by calling personally or by telephoning.
2. Do not burn on a dry, windy day.
3. A fire break sufficient to stop the spread of fire should be constructed around the area to be burned before the fire is started. This may be a plowed furrow or some other similar fire break.
4. When fires start burning into the ground, they are called ground fires and to stop them, a ditch or plowed furrow should be dug around them. This ditch should be dug to the sand, gravel, clay or other mineral soil.
5. If your fire gets out of control, call the nearest fire officer, conservation officer, townsmen or sheriff's department at once.
6. The safest time to burn is in the early evening. Brush burns readily at this time if it is tightly piled.
7. Never leave a fire unattended at any time.
8. False alarm fires caused by persons failing to get permits are costly to the taxpayers. Keep your taxes down by helping to prevent fires.

DUST Laying Requests Are Reported By Kenneth Hollenbeck

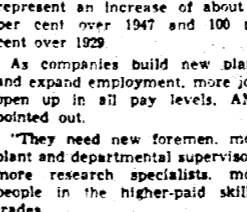
