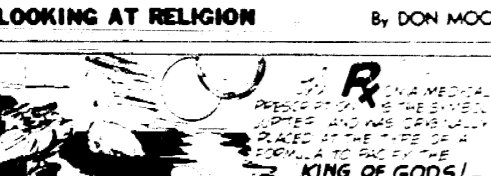

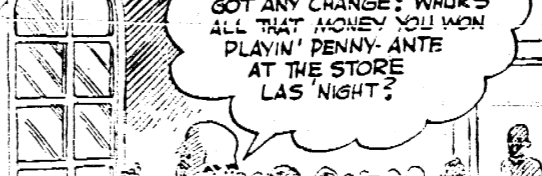

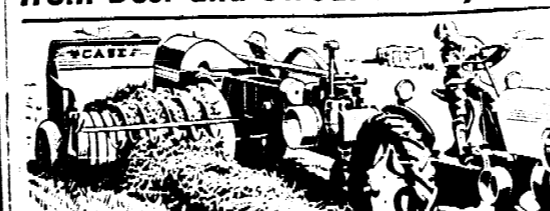

## GOOD JOBS AWAIT GIRLS IN NURSING FIELD

LANSING, May 25—Nearly a thousand Michigan girl graduates of hospitals are being lured, more and more, to the nursing field for their first summer out of school.

While other girls and boys of the same age may be wandering about, seeking door-to-door, and finally—in desperation—taking the first job that presents itself, most of these young women have a choice of several positions. They are the graduates of Michigan schools of nursing.

The vicious circle—"No experience. No job. No job. No experience"—is broken in their case, nursing leaders point out. Student nurses combine clinical experience in hospital wards with their classroom and laboratory work.

New graduates can usually work for a year or more, if they wish, in the hospital connected with their school of nursing, declared Thelma Scratch, chairman of the Committee on Careers in Nursing, or they can take their choice of many different positions. The demand is so great that practically any well-prepared nurse has no trouble in finding work.

"The open door in nursing is likely to remain open far into the future," she continued. "More hospitals are being built, more people can afford hospital care under the Blue Cross and other insurance plans, more people want to be kept well, more doctors rely on good nurses for assistance in caring for their many patients. There always will be far more openings for nurses than nurses to fill them."

Young women who want to be ready in three or four years for this kind of job opportunity are urged to find out at once about the 1500 openings next fall in the state. In addition, a one-year program preparing women for practical nursing is offered in seven centers under the State Board of Control for Vocational Education. Full information is available on request to the Michigan Nursing Center Association, 750 E. Main St., Lansing 12, Michigan.

## List Current Garden Jobs

Home gardeners in central and southern Michigan can usually

the last week of May and the first of June to put out tomatoes, egg plant, and pepper plants. This advice comes from Jack Rose, of the Michigan State College department of horticulture.

Frost-free days in Michigan are now about 100. This will include planting the seed and setting out transplants. Cucumbers, melons, and squash can be planted anytime until about June 10. Soil should be thoroughly warm before seeds of these crops are planted.

Many gardeners plant lima beans too early in Michigan, Rose believes. This crop should not go into the ground until the first week in June. The new varieties Peerless and Triumph, developed by the United States Department of Agriculture, have given excellent results under Michigan conditions. Henderson Bush is the second lima bean choice if the new varieties cannot be obtained.

PLAN INSTRUCTIVE PROGRAM FOR JUNE

GRASS DAY MEETS

Grass Day programs throughout Michigan this June will demonstrate to farmers the management and utilization of legumes and grasses in their farming program. Demonstrations have been set

up at each of the ten best farms in Michigan. The spots chosen by extension agents and agricultural agents.

As in past years, the Grass Day will be the opening of a series of all-Michigan farm tours. This will include, in addition to the necessary working of the soil and setting of the seed, bed and weeding the area.

Other demonstrations already prepared show various methods of soil control, methods of insect control, and various methods of fertilization. These demonstrations will be on hand to explain these plots and to discuss various problems with visiting farmers.

In the afternoon of each day, a program, held demonstrations of various types of forage harvesting and handling equipment will be conducted. These machines will include field balers, forage choppers, hay crushers, and crop blowers.

Master-testing equipment for hay and hay-crop silage will also be displayed and explained at each event. This new method has been recently developed by Dr. S. T. Dexter, farm crop specialist at MSU.

The series of Grass Day programs is designed to bring farmers up-to-date information concerning establishment, management, harvesting, and utilization of high quality forage.

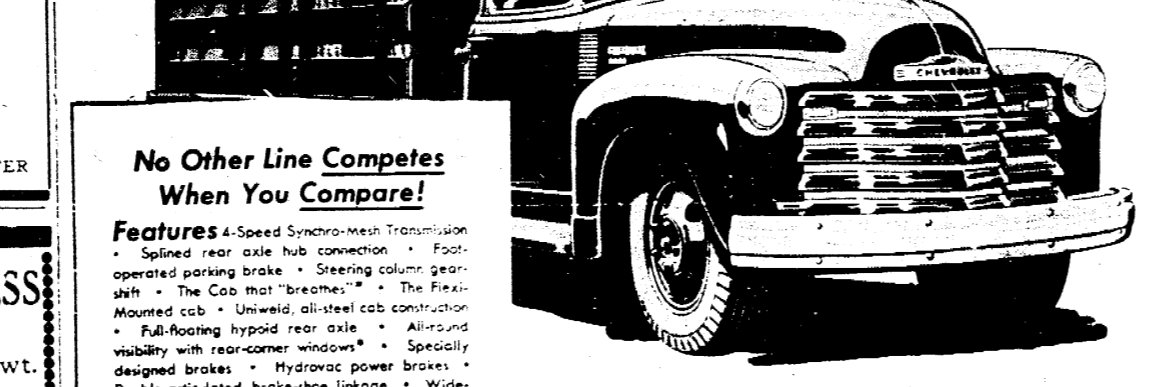

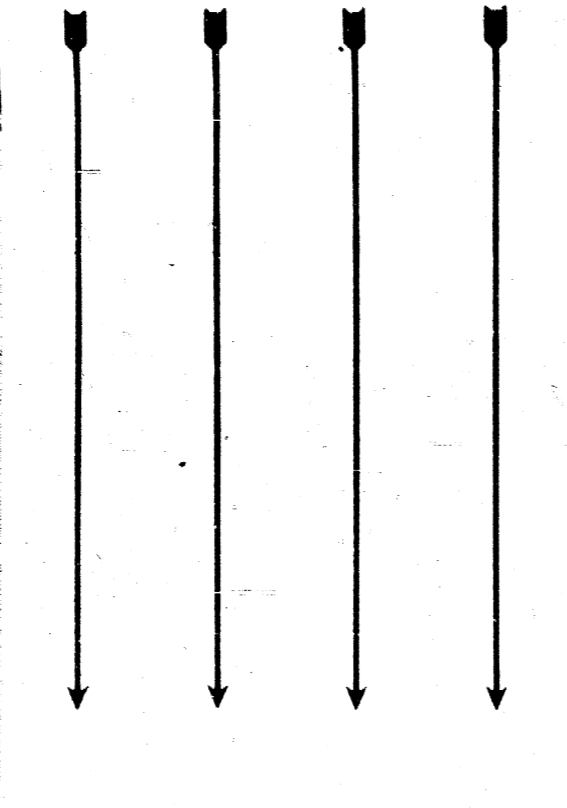
When the yellow line is on "your" side of the centerline it is unsafe to pass.
