Contractor Well Qualified; Built Several Schools

H.R.C. Construction Company of Inkster, Michigan, was awarded the contract to construct Manchester's new grade unit, at a special meeting of the school board of Manchester, Michigan, held Tuesday night, June 15. The vote was unanimous and was made with the approval of the citizens' building committee and the architect, Paul Kasurina. Nine firms made bids for the job at the special meeting held Thursday, June 9 at 2:30 at the school. Bids ranged from a high of \$120,000 by an Adrian firm to a low of \$87,500, made by H.R.C., the successful bidder. Two bids only were below \$90,000, the second being that submitted by the Hungerford Construction Co. of Jackson, Michigan, at \$89,995. Above these two, the next two bids were \$95,789 by North Moline, Michigan, and \$98,235 by Schaffer Lumber Company, of Manchester, Minnie and Son of Ann Arbor submitted a bid of \$97,027. All other bids were over \$100,000. H.R.C. was thoroughly investigated by members of the school board and the building committee, who spent Friday in Detroit for that purpose. H.R.C. has built several jobs for the architect firm of Derrick and Gember in Detroit and the Federal Building in Detroit and the Ford Museum at Dearborn. Building a number of schools. HEALTH DEPARTMENT WARNS AGAINST SUMMER ACCIDENTS

Joyous that school is out and thoughtless of their vacation zone, many Michigan children will suffer accidental injuries and even death unless parents and adults protect them through example and through advice the Michigan Department of Health said today. "Take time to be careful; it isn't smart to show off," is the major summer accident prevention lesson parents and adults can teach. "Never run into the street for a ball or pet, do not push out from between parked cars or between houses or structures. Cross streets only at intersections and with the light. Try roads and never more than two across. Don't carry passengers on your bicycle. Ride it next to the right curb and use both front and rear lights if you ride at night. Refuse to ride with a careless or foolishly automobile driver. Obey all traffic laws, lights and signs. Michigan's lakes and streams may also be a danger to vacationing children. Many drownings can be prevented by good example and by repeated warning. Tell your child to swim only at guarded beaches, during daylight hours. Never swim after dark, alone or Do not play in the street. Associate each child with a playground group so that he can spend a good share of his spare time in the protected play area is another way to save children from accidents. FARM PLAN: More Curb Asked

Critics and supporters alike of Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan's 1950 farm support program were surprised when Brannan asked sweeping new powers to control the nation's agricultural production.

THE latest Brannan proposal was contained in the full draft of the administration's farm program which was laid before congress.

For example, Brannan asked that rural marketing quotas, now usable on only six major crops, be applied to the great bulk of farm products including meat animals, milk, poultry, eggs, fruits and vegetables.

It was a bold stroke on the part of the administration and one that was regarded with some skepticism by farm leaders.

For it was quickly determined that if such a program were adopted, it would mean a complete reorganization of the farm support program.

Brannan's proposal was a condition which would be allowed to move freely in the market with farmers getting a payment according to the difference of the market price and the government price.

With domestic issues having been given the great bulk of the attention, the state was not mentioned in the report.

The importance of the labor question to the administration was indicated in the executive order designating the National Labor Relations Board as the lead agency in the labor field.

THE report was rather detailed, and it was clear that the administration was planning to get going on the labor front.

 Because of their popularity with Michigan residents and out-of-state tourists the park system has plenty of funds available for the state treasury. The parks and recreation division has a development program which would put Michigan well into the lead nationally. The parks would attract more tourists to Michigan; the \$16 million cost would be more than repaid by additional out-of-state dollars received by business everywhere. Yet, to date, the legislature has appropriated only \$1.75 million in the past four years.  
 The state treasury squeeze, caused by earmarking of state funds for local government spending, is wrecking the state park plan. The \$991,000 maintenance budget, cut from an original \$1,165,000 request, must be spread over 60 parks.  
 Fishermen and hunters contribute to development of special facilities through purchase of licenses. Yet the state park system, outnumbering the fishermen and hunters six to one in total attendance, has no revenue of its own derived from those who enjoy it.  
 The state department was again rebuffed by the legislature in 1949 when it asked discretionary authority to charge admission and use fees, if and when and where needed. Legislators were apocryphal, hesitant and reluctant. The bill died in committee. The department is now convinced that broad discretionary power is not the answer to the park financing problem. Perhaps use fees, limited to specified facilities, would be more acceptable.
