**Dry Cellar**  
Placing around the cellar trays containing calcium chloride will keep the air dry, as the material absorbs moisture from the air. However, the method is not too practical because the amount of water to be absorbed is so large. Generally it is better to paint the cellar walls with a cement-based water-proofing paint. A number of such paints are available commercially.

**Concrete Pipes**  
Although concrete pipes may develop in exposed concrete pipe, these small cracks will heal themselves in the presence of moisture and in fact become stronger than before the break. ## Laws Passed By Legislature In '49 Session

**Editors Note:** This is another in a series of articles on laws passed during the 1949 session of the Michigan Legislature. They affect you and every resident of Michigan. The entire series is prepared as a public service of the State Bar of Michigan under the direction of Russell A. Searl, Lansing, Chairman of the State Bar Committee on Legislation and Law Reform.

The vast majority of bills introduced in the 1949 Legislature have to do with cities and villages were the result of the thinking of the members as to the proper solution of the financial problems not only of the local governments, but also, the state government.

The system under which the general tax on real and personal property is levied was revised and modernized. The proceeds of this tax, ever since 1933 when the 15-month limitation on levying taxes was imposed, have been divided between local municipalities. The state has refrained from levying any general property tax, relying on the proceeds of other taxes, such as sales tax, corporate tax, and liquor tax.

Under the new law, each step in the assessment of property and the levy of taxes is moved ahead to an earlier date in the year, the "tax day" being the first of January. Other amendments to the general property tax act included a limitation upon the exemption of federal property, the increase of amount of property in the state owned by the United States government, Congress and the federal government, and the permitting of certain types of federally owned property to be taxed for local purposes.

On the other hand, school districts which own property which is actually used for two or more years in the year, rather than public school purposes, are required to pay taxes of special assessments thereon to the city, village or township in which the property is situated.

By another act, municipalities were authorized to enter into programs for the modernization of residential buildings and to accept grants from the federal government as well as contributions or aid from industries to assist in projects to prevent water pollution.

Three bills of interest to local governments pertaining to the operation of the liquor laws were also enacted. The first governs the holding of local elections upon the issue of "on the premises" sale of spirits in cities and villages. From now on a vote upon that issue may only be held at elections at which candidates for state offices are to be elected. Previously, it has been possible to call a special election to vote upon such an issue and the experience has shown that at such elections only a fraction of the eligible voters determine the issue.

The second bill clarified the manner of determining the distance between liquor bars and churches or schools to determine whether the bars are outside the 500 feet area as prescribed by the 1945 act. This applies only to new licenses.

The third bill prohibited the operation of a club or club which sell set-ups to members and in which the members were served their own liquor. Before the effective date of this measure these clubs could operate without any regulation.

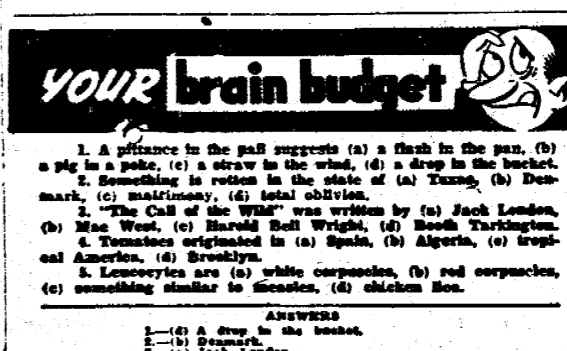
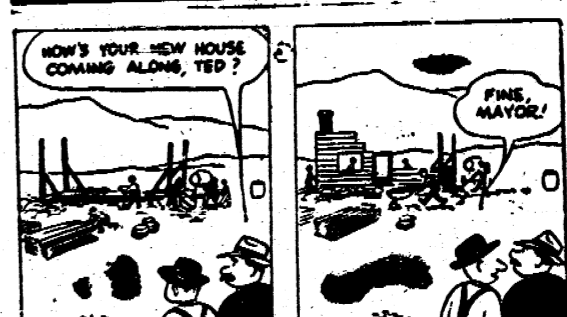
