Leo Gruner, former county treasurer, bank official, shoe dealer and exalted ruler of the Ann Arbor Elks Lodge No. 325, died at seven o'clock on Friday night at the home of his grandson, Jack Walters, 315 N. Main St., Ann Arbor.

Mr. Gruner was born in Ann Arbor on May 19, 1874, a son of Frank and Leona Gruner.

Early in his life he entered business with his father in the Gruner Boot and Shoe store at 109 S. Main St. and continued that association until 1914. For many years during this period he was president of the Shoe Dealers Association of Michigan.

Mr. Gruner was a member of the Ann Arbor Elks Lodge No. 325, and was a member of the Grand Lodge of the Elks Lodge No. 325 in 1916, winning election on the Republican ticket.

In 1920 he entered the banking profession as cashier of the First National Bank of Ann Arbor, where he served until 1933.

Mr. Gruner was married to Mrs. E. J. Gruner on June 1, 1897. She died in February, 1922. On Feb. 10, 1928, he was married to Mrs. Clara Conroy of Manchester, who died in June 1940.

Mr. Gruner had lived in Manchester since 1922. He was elected justice of the peace in that village in 1931 and continuing to serve in that capacity until his death.

During his business years in Ann Arbor, he was active in several civic and fraternal organizations and was exalted ruler of the Elks Lodge No. 325 in 1916 and 1917. He was also a member of the Elks Lodge since 1907.

Mr. Gruner actively assisted in a successful campaign to obtain Ann Arbor's first boulevard lights in 1911 and later served in a similar service for the city of Ypsilanti.

He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Thelma Reynolds of Lansing; a son, Paul Leonard Gruner of Detroit; 10 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Another daughter, Mrs. Frances Walters, of Ann Arbor died in August 1940.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Muchly Chapel, Ann Arbor, with Rev. Walter Brand officiating, and burial was in Forest Hill cemetery, Ann Arbor.
