Says Build Roads Now Gov. Williams, speaking before the Michigan Road Builders' Association in Detroit, recently said, "I am convinced Michigan needs to build and rebuild roads and needs to do so badly right now. This road program does not depend directly upon a solution to our road problems. If the appropriation were made and the reform bills of the Michigan Good Roads Program adopted, the road building program could start right away, regardless of the final determination of the tax question."

Count Crows in Pleasant Tally Prebreeding season pheasant counts now being made by nearly 1,000 rural mail carriers and will be followed by a conservation department crowing cock survey starting April 24. Rural postmen in the course of regular runs are counting ringnecks in 38 southern Michigan counties where pheasants breed.

Department men in their survey through the first week of June will cover 37 routes in 28 southern Michigan counties. Wildlife management students from the University of Michigan and Michigan State College have been selected as observers on the spring project.

To get as good an estimate as possible of the breeding population of wild geese, every mile and later for two months. They will cover each 20-mile route at least three times. Good as well as poor pheasant ranges will be canvassed.

Grades Separated at Milan Work has been started on two grade separation viaducts on the relocated route of US-23 in Milan, Washtenaw and Monroe counties. One of the new structures will carry the Washtenaw County Line road over the highway, and the other will be an underpass to take the new structure over County Line road.

Both viaducts are located at the eastern end of Milan. The new bridge will consist of one 80-foot ballast deck, through girder span and the complete crossing which includes a pump-house and a 20-foot drainage facility, construction of the embankment for the temporary roadway grading on the US-23 relocation and the complete grading and surfacing of the County Line road approach.

These grade separations will provide much greater safety for vehicular traffic than on the unseparated crossings which exist on the present route. Johnson-Greene Co., Ann Arbor, is the contractor at the contract price of \$219,273.86. The completion date is August 15, 1950. Initial work on these structures was started in September of last year.

Newcastle Disease Decreasing. The number of cases of Newcastle disease in poultry flocks in the state appears to be less than last year, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. If the decrease in the number of calls concerning the disease can be used as an indicator.

Dr. John D. Groves in charge of poultry diseases for the Bureau, reports that the vaccination of each hen of the flock appears to have done considerable to help control this disease. Flock owners have been using both the live virus and dead virus vaccines. The effectiveness


