**THE DOT COLUMN**

**"Family Care" Cook Book**

A special edition of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's new 94-page cook book "Family Care" is being printed by the Kroger company for distribution through its stores starting June 5. C. O. Talla of the Detroit branch said today. The book, ordinarily obtainable through the U. S. Government Printing Office for 25 cents, is being offered by Kroger to the customers at a cost of production price of 10 cents, Branch Mgr. Talla added.

The book is prepared and edited by the nation's leading experts in the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, and contains recipes and menus designed with an eye on nutrition as well as attractiveness. The Kroger printing is limited to 50,000 copies and after the present supply is exhausted no more books will be available through Kroger stores, Talla said.

**Debtors on US-112**

US-112 in St. Joseph county, 5,108 miles of township concrete resurfacing east and west of Sturgis. Temporary passenger car route starts at Chicago street and Lakeview avenue in Sturgis, and runs north on Lakeview, and north and east 7.1 miles on a county road to US-112. **Red Cross Assistance**

A total of \$27,777.77 in accumulative retroactive benefits was received by veterans in Washtenaw county during the past three months through the assistance of the Red Cross, according to Herald Hoffman, local Red Cross home service director. In addition, the Red Cross processed claims for delayed subsistence for students throughout the county, who are veterans, totaling \$3,778.68.

"The awards to county residents will continue to pay \$2,033.85 monthly, Mr. Hoffman said.

In this three-month period, 879 veterans or members of their families received assistance from the Washtenaw county Red Cross, according to the home service director. This number includes 600 persons who received continued service. Many other persons who made only one or two calls to the office were not counted, he pointed out.

"Two death awards were processed for widows by the local Red Cross home service, and paid \$1,177 in retroactive benefits, Mr. Hoffman stated.

Red Cross arranged for emergency hospitalization for five veterans in Washtenaw county, and for treatment by local physicians and dentists for 23 veterans.

Continued strength in feed-grain prices in the next two months can be expected due to delayed oats and barley plantings, reduced use of pasture requiring more grain, relatively small supply of feed-grains in some areas, and some planting reduction in commercial areas, and the predicted smaller feed-grain supply per animal for 1950-52. Protein supplement prices are like to continue firm.

1. Know your baby sitter and her family background well enough so you feel sure the sitter is mentally and physically healthy; know that she is old enough to be responsible and that she knows her first responsibility as a sitter is the safety of the child. If you are going to be out late, employ an older sitter.

2. Write, near the telephone, the number of the fire department and the police department and the number where you can be reached at all times. If you are moving about, call to let the number where'll you will be.

3. Tell a responsible neighbor that you are going out and a baby sitter will be on duty, and tell the baby sitter that this neighbor will help her in case of emergency.

4. Point out to the sitter the danger points in your home, the places where your child might get hurt.

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**Getting Woodwork Ready**

Before repainting interior woodwork properly prepare the surface to be coated—in order to insure the best results. Wash all glossy surfaces with a mild alkali, such as sal soda, trisodium phosphate, or sodium silicate, and rinse thoroughly. Scrape off any loose or blistered paint, then fill all cracks or minor surface irregularities with putty or a spackling compound. Next, prime all bare wood and, when it is dry, sandpaper the edges where the primer joins the old coating. Also sand the spots where filler was applied.

## Steel Industry Shuts Up New Record Despite Strikes

The steel industry ran the gamut of emotions, from triumph to despair, when it learned on Wednesday that it had produced a new record despite strikes.

The industry's steel output for the first five months of 1950 was 10 million tons in a little more than four years since it was ended, or within 10 per cent of the amount made in all of the 1930's.

That great surge of production, achieved despite two paralyzing steel strikes and numerous interruptions in coal production as well as raw material shortages and other handicaps.

## Employed Women Now Perform 30 Per Cent of Our Labor

Are you having difficulty finding someone who will take over in the kitchen and do the dishes, and-dumplings and apple pie? If so, this may be the reason:

Domestic work is a profession, and the statistics show that it is becoming a profession in the United States. Before the war 10 per cent of all women who worked were in domestic service, and now the proportion has dropped to about 10 per cent.

## Early Lens Grinding

The accounts of lens making which have come down to us from early times indicate that the basic process was somewhat similar to that in use today. A disc of glass was cut and ground with sand or other abrasives in a hollow iron dish, from which it gradually took its shape. To aid the grinding, the bit of glass was glued to the end of a wooden rod, making it a kind of paste. This, of course, produced only a convex lens. There are vague references to making the concave surface by means of a woolen cloth, also fixed to the end of a rod and polished with "powder of Tripoli." Thus the history of lens grinding had its crude beginning, and people suffering from visual troubles could try on whatever spectacles were available and select those which suited them best.

## Overeating Disease in Lambs

Three effective ways to keep feeder lambs from eating themselves to death are given by Dr. G. T. Woods, a veterinarian at the University of Illinois. Lambs starve on heavy grain feeding sometimes well into the summer months, but too much grain causes it to produce a deadly poison. One easy way to prevent losses from this disease is to put lambs on pasture or hay for one or two weeks while gradually starting them on grain. Or you can have your veterinarian vaccinate the lambs against overeating disease as soon as they are brought into the feedlot. The third control method has been used by Colorado scientists. They have found that daily feeding of one-third ounce of sulfur with each lamb's feed will greatly reduce death losses.

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Smead Elected Grand Master Of Michigan Masons

Michigan's 165,000 Free and Accepted Masons might ponder the chain of circumstances which gave the Wolverine State its 106th Grand Master who was elected in the Grand Rapids civic auditorium May 24 during the 106th Annual Convocation.

He is Dr. Morgan J. Smead, Past Master of Rochester Lodge No. 5, sometimes known as Stone Creek No. 7, the oldest Michigan lodge in continuous existence and the biological father which kept the light of Masonry shining during the infamous Masonic blackout of 1829-40.

occasionally by the disappearance of William Morgan of Batavia, N. Y. Not only is the new Grand Master the Masonic product of the famous lodge which for 11 years kept burning Michigan's Masonic light and when the tide of anti-Masonic feeling had subsided aided greatly in the Craft's revival, but he was born August 12, 1883, almost at the scene of the crime against the drunken, misguided Morgan.

Smead's great-grandfather whose credibility could not accept the story that Batavia Masons had murdered the absolute Morgan, was expelled from Pavilion, New York's Baptist church, rather than forego his Masonic membership. It is thus from such Masonic stalwart patriots that Michigan's new Grand Master is an offshoot.

Dr. Smead, a graduate of the University of Toronto holding the degrees of Bachelor and Doctor of Veterinary Science, has practiced his profession for nearly 40 years. He retired from Parke, Davis and Company late in 1949.

Among his professional activities he lists a past presidency of the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association. His debut in the veterinary medical field occurred at Port Huron in 1910 where he had the opportunity of treating animals of Drumore Farm, owned by Gordon Moore, at Detroit, and the home of three world's champions.

Just before the outbreak of World War I, Dr. Smead moved to Rochester to join the forces of Parke-Davis as assistant superintendent of the biological field, and through research toward cleaner air will be slow. Fisher declares.

Study of Home Accidents Gives Kitchon No. 1 Spot

Notwithstanding the popular belief that the bathroom is the most dangerous room in the house, more home accidents occur in the kitchen and dining quarters than in any other part of the home, according to Dr. Donald B. Armstrong, director of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company's health and welfare activities.

This statement is based upon the findings of a year's study of home accidents to policyholders for which the company's visiting nurse service was utilized. The study revealed that 30 per cent of the accidents happened in the dining and kitchen areas, while substantially lower percentages occurred in other parts of the home and home property. Only a negligible proportion of the total took place in the bathroom, the report noted.

Falls of one kind or another, but most of them on a level surface, accounted for more than half of the accidents. Walking or running was the activity at the time of the accident, which was reported most frequently, and more legs, feet, and toes were injured than any other part of the body.

A composite picture of the typical mishap was presented as a fraction of one kind of accident (fall or toe) as a result of a fall on a level surface while walking (or running) in the dining room or kitchen.
