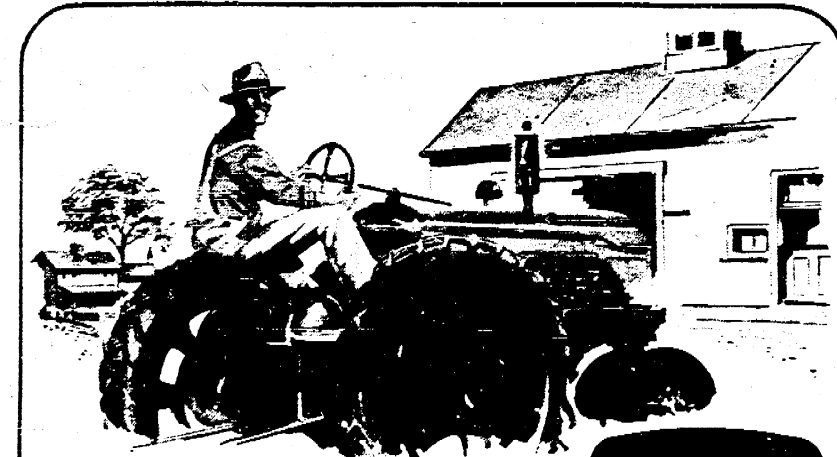

**Plat Law Discourages Land Sales By Metes and Bounds**

Owners of acreage intending to sell small parcels for home sites or other uses should acquaint themselves with the law according to Kenneth L. Halenbach and George D. Merrill, members of the County Planning Commission's Subdivision Advisory Committee.  
 The Plat Law of 1923, section 2, as amended in 1943, states: "The word 'subdivide' when used in this act, shall mean the partitioning or dividing of a lot, tract or parcel of land into 5 or more lots, plots, sites or other divisions of land for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of sale or occupancy for residential purposes or development; provided, however, That this definition of the word 'subdivide' shall not include a bona fide dividing, partitioning or plating of agricultural lands into lots, tracts or parcels of 10 acres or more for agricultural operation or development purposes."

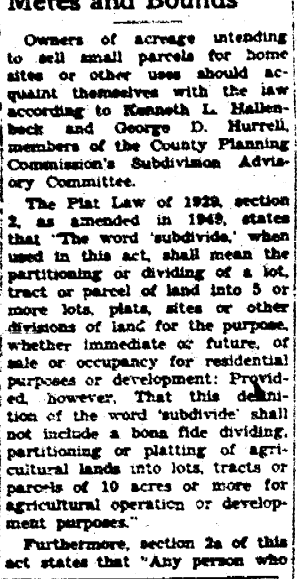

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## Prospectors for Uranium Face Wild Michigan Area

Tenderfoot and amateur uranium prospectors are flocking to the Michigan area to discover that a scattering of uranium ore is almost as plentiful as the modern copper country.

The geologic details of the uranium strike in the vicinity of the latest reported strike in the No. 1 uranium area are almost as important as the uranium itself. The uranium strike in the No. 1 area is one of the country's remaining wild and remote areas. The newly found deposits of uranium-rich pitchblende are in the vicinity of the Huron river, some 15 miles northeast of L'Anse-au-Loup, the uranium seat, which has a population of about 1,000. ## Form Wages Disappearing As Truckers Turn to Buses

Not many farmers own a bus, but a trader used for moving crops to market, says the U.S. department of agriculture. But nearly half the farmers own one or the other, according to a survey by the bureau of agricultural economics.

Many farms of course, are heavy duty equipment, but the survey shows that about 60 per cent of the trucks are rated at half-ton capacity or less. The Bureau of Agricultural Economics says the estimate is that only about two and one-half per cent of the total tonnage of farm products is hauled by bus or truck. The trucks are used for delivery of crops to canneries, sugar factories and the like to their own haulers.

The Rev. H. S. von Rague officiated at the funeral which was held at the Jenter Funeral Home.

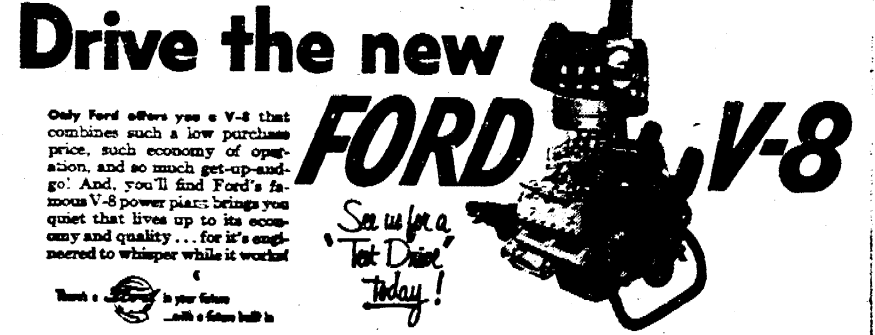
