Horse Pulling Contest Rules

All teams within 20 miles of Manchester are eligible to compete if they are not professional horse pulling contest teams. The teams may or may not have shoes; there are no restrictions. The teams are to be weighed on local scales the day of the contest. The local weigh slip is to be presented to the contest judge before the team pulls. There shall be two classes: Heavy weight teams—those 2,000 lbs. and over. Light weight teams—those under 2,000 lbs. The distance the boat is to be pulled is 27 1/2 feet. Each team will be given three trials to pull the boat. The pulling time is to be 15 feet when the team leaves the line. The judge has the right to move the boat if he believes it to be in a spot which makes pulling it more or less difficult than is fair to any team. No one other than the drivers and help is to be allowed within the enclosed contest area. No driver is to abuse his team by striking or other means. The heavy weight contest begins at 12:00 noon Oct. 22, 1950. The light weight contest is to be immediately following the completion of the first year. Prizes offered winners in each class: First place \$200.00, Second place \$150.00, Third place \$100.00. In addition to the above there will be in each weight class a prize of \$50.00 for the driver which shows the best horseman-ship.

Manchester Schools Enrollment Now 446

An uncompleted report of the enrollment of Manchester schools now stands at 446 according to Superintendent V. W. Wendt. In the elementary building which includes the kindergarten through the fourth grade there are 179 pupils. The intermediate school has 127 students. This includes grades five and seven and eighth grades. The high school enrollment is 140. This is a 10.3 per cent increase over the 400 enrolled after one week of school a year ago. Last year there were 37 freshmen and this year 41 have started the ninth grade. The Red School in Sylvan township has closed in district seven and Rev. A. A. Weinert is transferring the five students to the Manchester school in his care. The school buses are making their regular runs on scheduled routes. Several of the teachers have reported the need of additional desks in Sylvan. He says that there are some absent because of illness and feels that the preliminary enrollment indicates that the school has certainly increased the enrollment over last year.

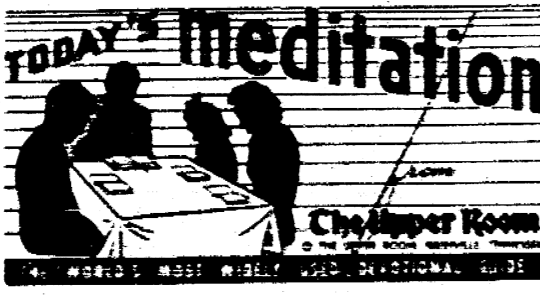

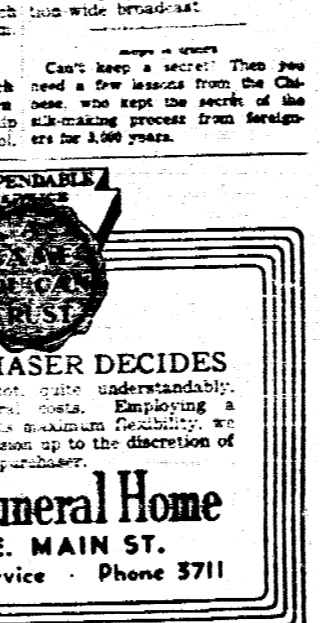

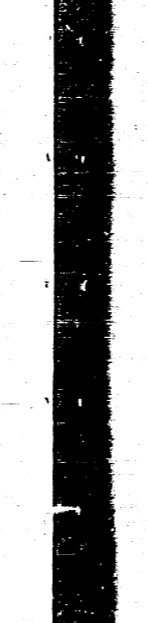

Possum Unequipped to Survive State's Winters, Wayne U. Biologist Believes

The Virginia opossum, long associated with the succulent southern dish of possum and sweet potatoes, is moving northward. However, Wayne University biologist believes the possum is unequipped to survive Michigan winters.

Dr. Charles W. Crasner, chairman of the biology department at Wayne University in Detroit, said the possums from the Great Lakes region in the range from eastern Nebraska to New York, and migration to a more northern climate is bringing him trouble.

In this state his difficulties are due to two things, the biologist points out, after following closely the animal's efforts to make himself a Michiganian.

First, he is not equipped to combat extreme cold, though he can live through a mild winter in the southern part of the state. Second, he depends too much upon certain crops, such as corn, for his food.

Dairy Farming Future Appears Good For 1951

Prospects for profits from dairy farming next year are "good," farmers explained at the second annual Michigan Farm Management Tour in Calhoun and Eaton counties, where they heard Quackenbush, Michigan State College milk marketing specialist.

Quackenbush explained that a new all-time record in milk supplies was expected, but that higher demand would mean a ready market. Consumers will have more money to spend and less goods to choose from as the defense or war program builds up and inflation increases, he said. They will spend more money for milk and other foods.

This is not the time, however, to be catching up on dairying, Quackenbush told the farmers. Some of the other farm enterprises which may be profitable during inflationary periods. Beef was given as an example.

The price outlook for next year, according to the M.S.C. economist, calls for slow advances in fluid milk prices and moderate increases for buttermilk, with the largest increase due in milk for manufactured products.

Money-making practices suggested for dairying included increased production with liberal feeding, and doing everything possible to save on labor costs.

During the past year, we have confirmed the fact that the anti-histaminic drugs, properly used, are the most effective treatment for hay fever. These drugs are administered in the form of tablets, capsules, or syrups. They are safe, effective, and do not cause drowsiness. They are available in many forms, and you can choose the one that is most convenient for you.

Another new development available to the allergic sufferer is the use of antihistaminic in an Atomizer that applies the medication directly to the affected parts of the nose. The medical profession has long known that the nose is the starting point of many allergic reactions. The antihistaminic does not have these properties and may therefore prove a real boon to those who suffer from hay fever.

With the new treatment now available, avoidance, immunization and symptomatic drug therapy, we are well on our way to effectively controlling allergy. The big danger now is that people will not use only from a fourth to a third of all available antihistaminic drugs. It is important to indicate that untreated hay fever, for example, or allergic skin conditions may in many cases develop into serious asthma.
