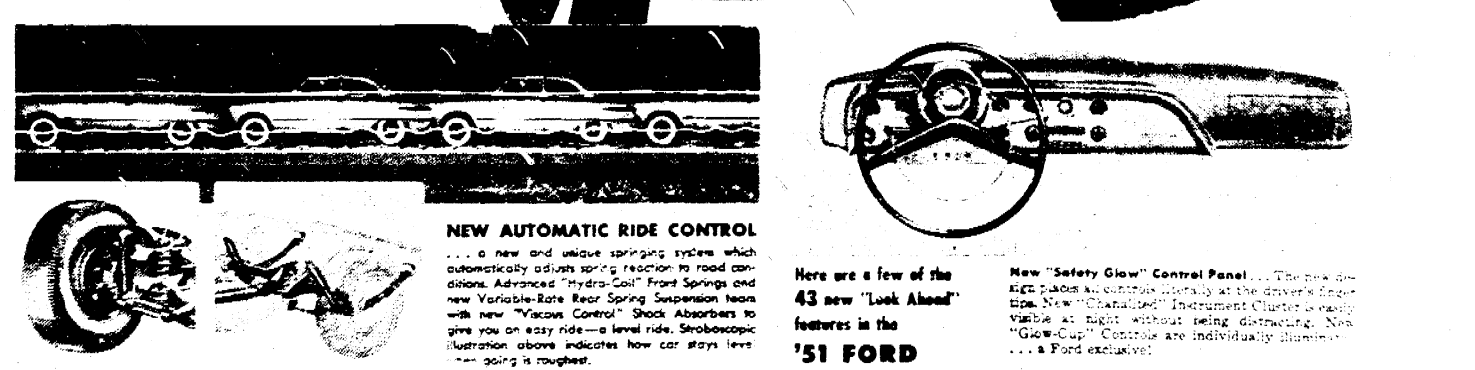
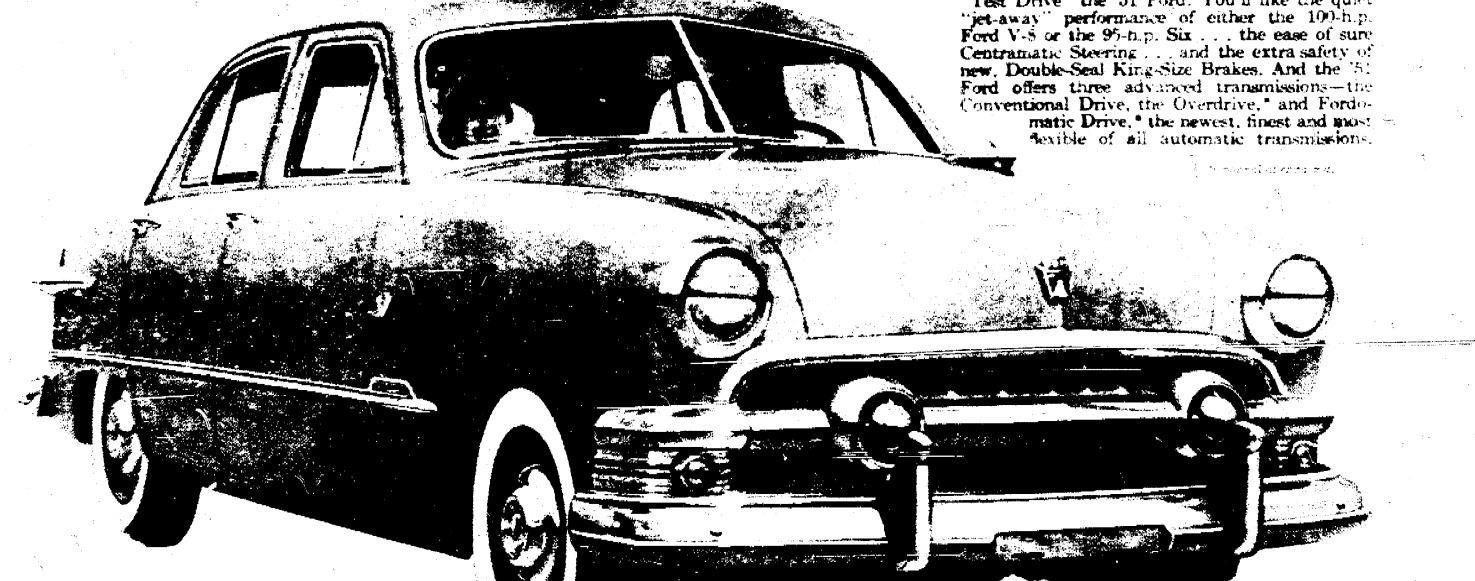

Rural Tele-news

5480 TELEPHONES—Last year, the average cost of new plant and equipment for each telephone added was \$480. More telephones are going in all the time. So a lot more dollars are needed to continue Michigan Bell's rural construction program. This money comes from investors. Despite shortages of labor and material which have hampered progress in the construction of the addition to the high school, the new Dundee Community School is scheduled to open after the Christmas vacation.

Roast turkey with dressing, mashed potatoes and gravy, hot buttered rolls, salad, juice, milk or coffee and cherry upside down cake for dessert—what do you think of that for a lunch, and for 25 cents?

That's the price that was paid by more than 300 Dundee public school students Tuesday when they were served their lunch in the cafeteria of the new high school. Servings were plentiful.

How can the school serve lunches for 25 cents? Well, they are subsidized by the government, seven cents on each lunch, and part of the food comes from government surplus commodities. In addition, the school gets two cents a bottle subsidy on milk served to elementary students.

Whooping cough is increasing in the Chelsea area and is beginning to assume the proportions of a potential epidemic, according to information released by the Washtenaw county Health Department.
