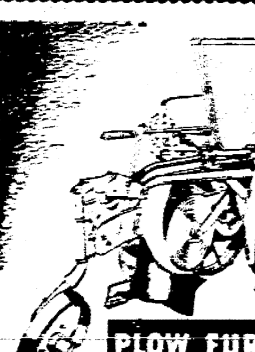

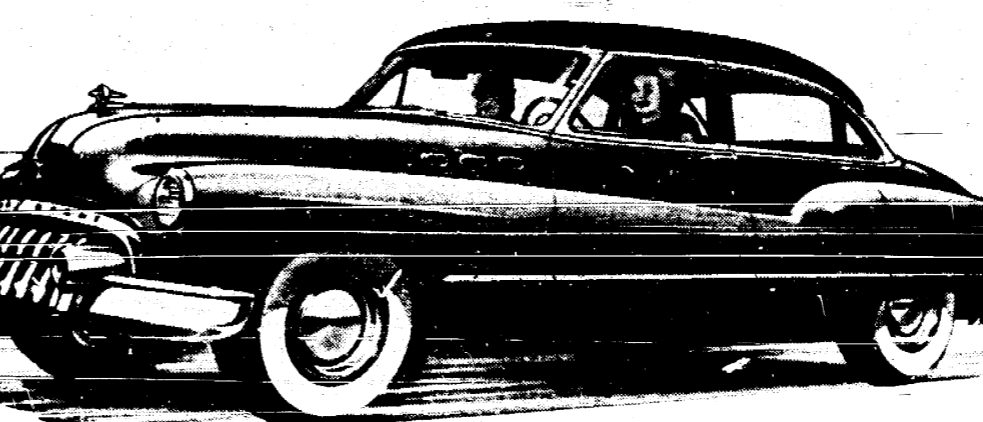
SEVENTH GRADERS CELEBRATE EASTER
