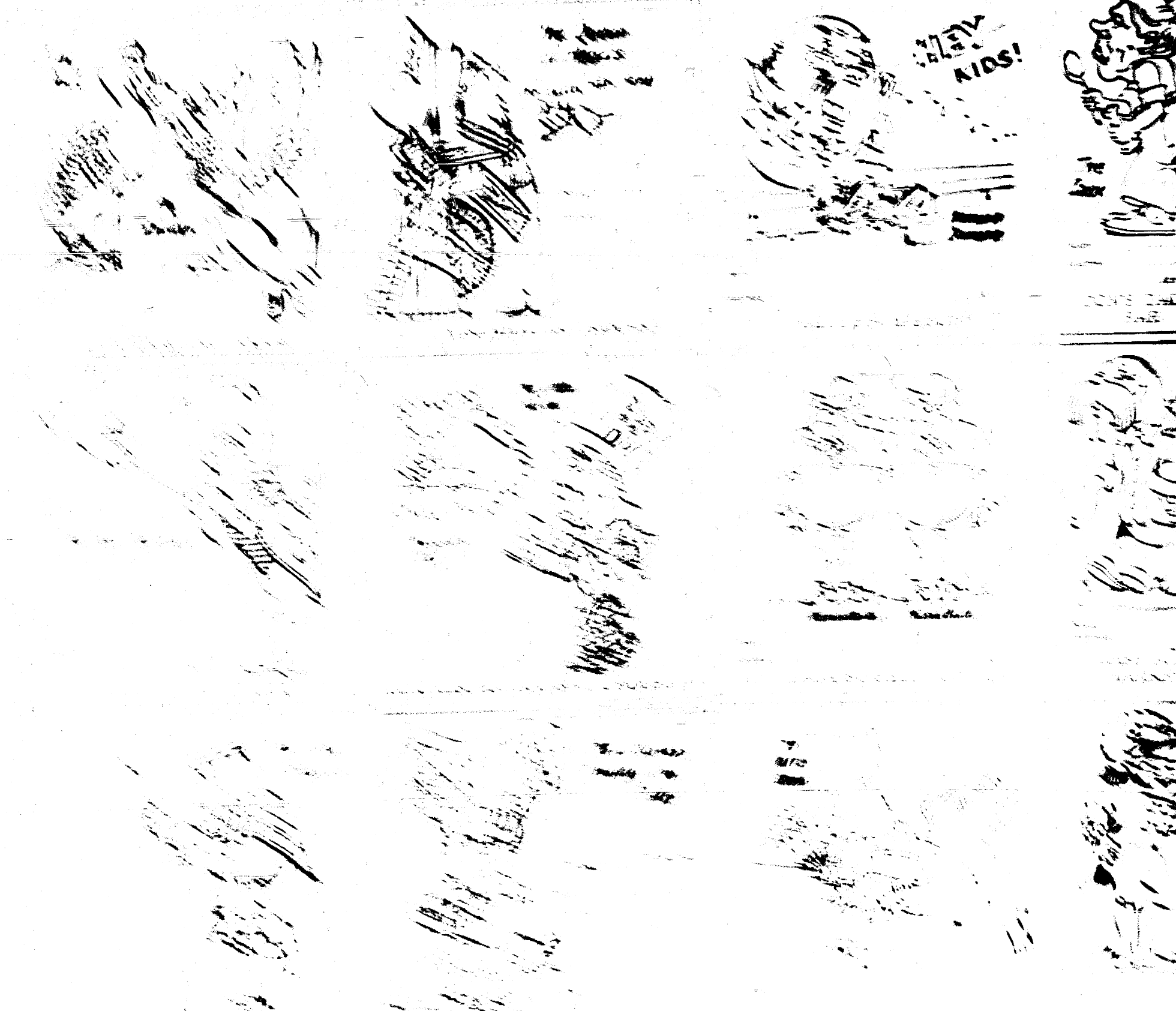

## Wonder Drug Makes Pigs Gain Faster

Word has been received here that Arnold Heimerdinger of Los Angeles, California, has been given the silver medal award issued by the Director of the Office of Aviation Safety, Washington, D. C.

Arnold, a former Manchester resident, is the son of Mrs. Charles Heimerdinger and the late Charles Heimerdinger of Manchester. He is employed as a flight engineering agent and is currently assigned to duty in the C. A. A. He was faced with an extreme emergency during experimental flight testing of the Boeing 377 airplane. Mr. Heimerdinger's performance during this emergency was outstanding and it was because of the judgment he displayed that the award was given. Mr. Heimerdinger was in charge of the flight at Boeing. These two men occupied the cockpit and pilot's seats respectively during the flight and worked as a team during the emergency which occurred during a flight at Seattle, Washington, on Dec. 10, 1948. The purpose was to conduct heat anti-icing tests under actual flying conditions. During the flight smoke was discovered on top of No. 3 nacelle behind the oil tank filter cap access door and at various other points. Because of the possibility of fire in No. 3 nacelle, it was decided to shut off No. 3 engine. As the flight engineer was throttling the engine preparatory to doing this, the fire warning bell and light indicated a fire in zone 2 (the necessary section of No. 2 nacelle). After No. 3 engine was feathered, the fire control gang switch was operated to shut off the fire extinguisher valve to zone 2 of No. 3 nacelle. The L. 4 fire extinguisher supply (50 lbs.) was discharged in an attempt to put out the fire and Furness and Heimerdinger discussed the situation and decided to turn back to Boeing Field.

Following the discharge of CO<sub>2</sub> the observers in the rear cabin observed a decrease in the amount of smoke. The Boeing Aircraft Company radio station was advised that there had been a fire warning and that the airplane was returning to the field. Then the approach control was advised that a propeller had been feathered and the airplane was having trouble. The approach control stated that there was no traffic and authorized any type of approach desired. A rapid descent northward to Boeing Field was started at 250 miles per hour with Heimerdinger still flying aircraft. A second fire alarm was sounded and flames were visible in the wheelwell and black smoke was going back under the wing.

It was evident that the first discharge of carbon dioxide had failed to control the fire. This condition was of grave concern to the pilots since both knew the rapidity with which a fire in flight can become a catastrophe. The de-

There has been one or more traffic violations in each of our last three runs. Someone either passing or cutting or front of the trucks for an untimely reason, thereby endangering the lives of the firemen as well as the safety of the trucks.

On rural runs we use three fire trucks and in the village, four fire trucks.

Whenever you are driving your motor vehicle and you hear the trucks sirens, the department is asking that you please pull to the side of the road or street or proceed slowly until all of the fire trucks have passed. Then you may proceed to your varied destinations.

Following is the State Law relating to fire apparatus section 579 in the State of Michigan vehicle code: The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than 500 feet or drive into or park such vehicle within 500 feet where fire apparatus has stopped in answer to a fire alarm.
