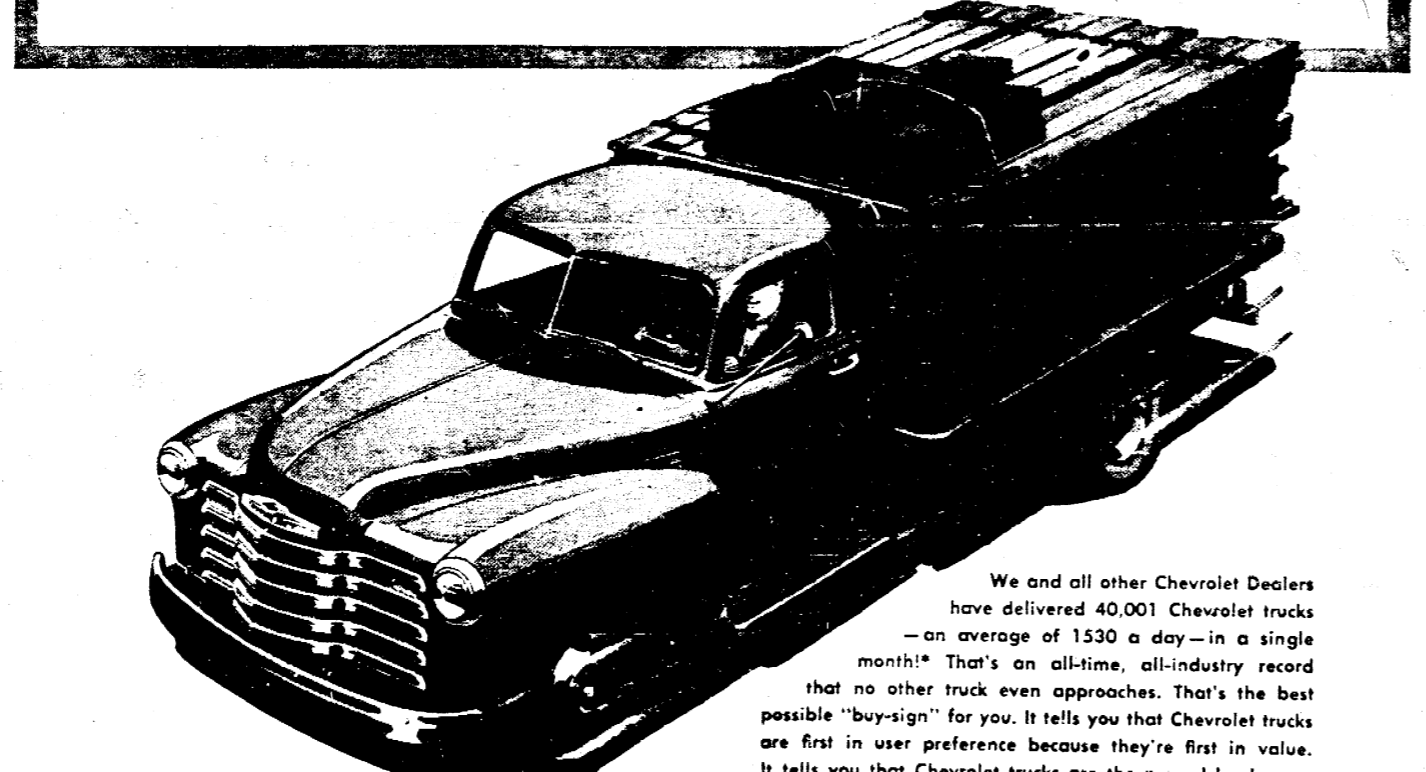

DAV Returns Lost Keys
The disabled American Veterans has returned a set of lost keys to Forrest Aseltine of Sable.
Attached to the keys was a DAV Indenture-Tag, miniature license tag for key rings, which is distributed to 30,000,000 motorists each year and the replica of their state license plates enables the DAV to return 5,000 keys a month from its national headquarters in Cincinnati.
In addition to key-loss insurance, the Indenture-Tag through contributions enables the DAV to maintain its free rehabilitation service for disabled veterans and their dependents.
Last year the DAV obtained more than \$19,000,000 in benefits for disabled veterans and

their families. The organization has the largest staff of national service officers of any veterans organization.
Keys are returned to owners from all over the world. One of the most unusual key losses occurred when a Cincinnati granary employee lost his set in a sack of oats. The keys were found when the sack was opened aboard a freighter in the English Channel enroute to Poland and they made their way back via the DAV.

33,145 Take U. of M. Courses
Ann Arbor—The University of Michigan provided education in credit courses for a total of 33,143 individual students during the 1949-50 school year.
The report of the Statistical Service of the office of Registrar Irs M. Smith showed an increase of 373 from the 32,770 students enrolled in credit courses during the preceding year.
Students in resident credit programs totaled 27,865 for the year as against 27,397 the year before. Off-campus credit students totaled 32,762 but 619 students who were included in both categories reduce the net figure to 33,143.
The peak of credit enrollment occurred during the Fall Semester when there were 21,217 taking resident courses and 3,823 in off-campus credit work. Once again the elimination of duplicates produces a net total of 24,934 credit students during the Fall Semester.

Max Spike's herd of registered Jersey cattle has just completed a year of official Herd Improvement Registry testing.
