**Lincoln Made Plea To Democrats**

in August of 1850 when Abraham Lincoln made his only visit to Michigan is recorded in modern newspaper style. This is the second in a series of such stories based on eyewitness accounts in books and other material in the Michigan Historical Collections at the University of Michigan.  
 KALAMAZOO, August 27, 1850.—A plea to Democrats to come forward and support the new Republican party in rescuing the "great principle of equality" was made here today by Abraham Lincoln, former Illinois congressman and a leader of the new party in that state.  
 Urging support for John C. Fremont in his campaign against James Buchanan for the presidency of the United States, Lincoln told a mass convention of the Republican Young Men of Michigan that the question of extending slavery into the new territories should be the greatest question if not almost the only one, to be considered by the voter.  
 Republican sources estimate that 30,000 people had crowded into Kalamazoo to hear Lincoln, and the other speakers in a day-long program of oratory, parades and pageantry. Democratic estimates were much lower, ranging from 7,000 to 15,000.  
 Throughout his address, much shorter than the other orators given during the day, Lincoln resorted to calmness and logic in outlining his ideas on the explosive slavery issue. In 30 minutes he contrasted sharply with Zachariah Chandler, Detroit merchant and one of the founders of the Republican Party in 1854.  
 Chandler had preceded Lincoln on the speaker's platform and his rambling address was full of explosive talk since he favors action to abolish slavery, an act, political observers feel, that Lincoln's talk here today has cooled.
