These produced by high level bursts. While most of the radioactive materials swept up into the sky eventually fall back to earth, they are so widely scattered that they are very unlikely to offer any real danger to humans.

It was said earlier that 15 percent of the Japanese A-bomb deaths or injuries were caused by radioactivity. But not one of them was caused by the falling bomb. Explosive radioactivity caused them all.

Deaths on or near the ground usually will leave a limited area of rather heavy and often dangerous pollution near the site.

him check you with his meter after you've finished your clean-up. Should he find you're still radioactive, get out of the house. If necessary, bandage open cuts and wounds and do standard first aid equipment.

What About Radioactivity in the House? A few simple steps will go a long way toward keeping your home free from contamination.

You should also manage to take a bath or a shower if you have been in an area of lingering radioactivity.

It is washing your particular attention to your hair, for that is one place where the wastes are sure to pile up.

While we cannot see, feel, smell or taste radioactivity, the presence of it is reported as present.

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Handling of Traffic-Injured Persons

While the bomb's radioactivity will not interfere with the operation of your radio, in the event of an attack, be sure to turn it off. It may be your main source of emergency instructions.

Should you help to clean up a contaminated area, you might get some radioactive materials on both your body and clothing.

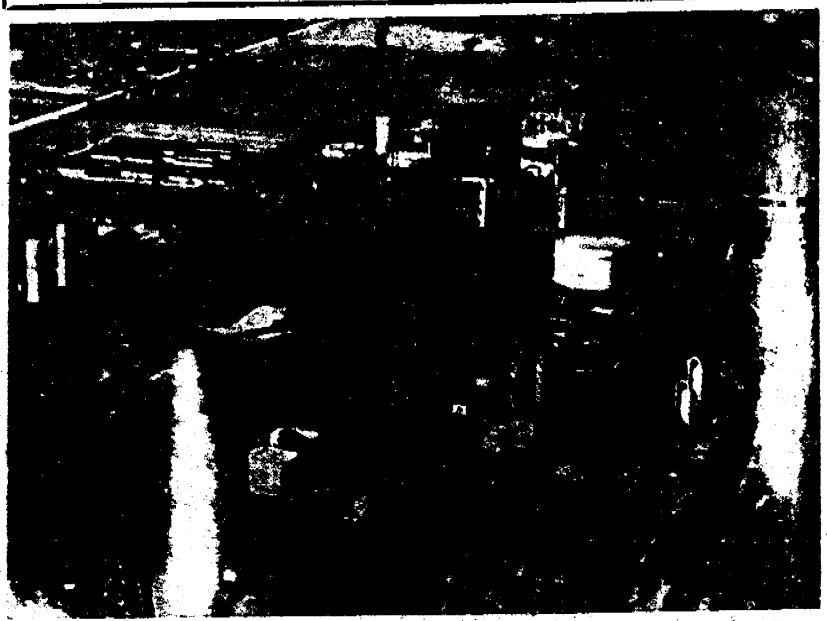

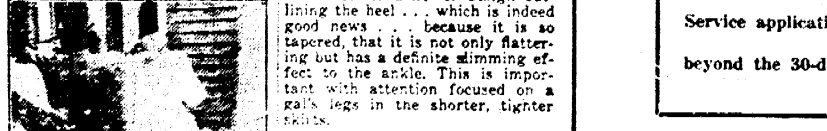
