From The Stenographer's Notebook

A verbatim reporter is a skilled stenographer who takes down word for word the proceedings in court or at conventions, conferences, board meetings, and so on.

Some verbatim reporters specialize as convention, conference, or court reporters, or so on. A verbatim reporter, if he can do so, is in some of the highlights of the drama of modern life.

The drama of life is enacted in a liberal education in itself. It is often said in jest that a specialist is a person who continues to know more and more about less and less until finally he knows everything about nothing. A verbatim reporter is somewhat the opposite of this. He knows a little bit about a lot of things.

In a sense, then, a verbatim reporter might become a mental Jack of all trades. He might acquire a smattering knowledge of sociology, economic science, law, medicine and so on. And if he tried to set himself up as an authority in any one of these fields, he might easily get himself and possibly others into a great deal of trouble.

If he keeps the proper perspective, however, and remembers all the while that after all he is nothing but a stenographer, a pencil pusher so to speak, a skilled craftsman at best, he can acquire one trait which is the world sorely needs and that is the trait of looking at all sides of every question.
