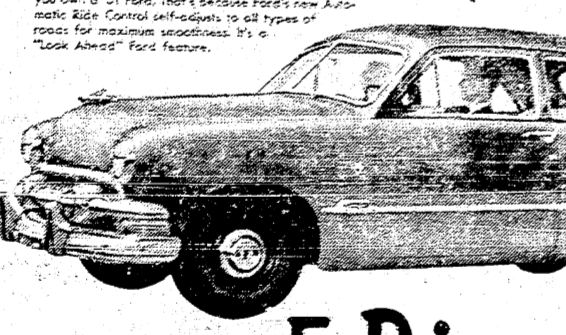

A Weekly Report From Congressman George Meader

Washington, D. C. - The Emergency Reorganization Act of 1951 last week became the first bill in the 81st Congress to be acted upon by the Committee on Expenditures in the Executive Departments of which I am a member. I thought it might be of interest to trace the history of this bill through the Committee as that was what I am doing. The Emergency Reorganization Plan was introduced by Representative William C. Cramer of California on January 15, 1951, and referred to the Committee on Expenditures in the Executive Departments, which has jurisdiction over the structural reorganization of the national Government, both in the legislative and the executive branches. On March 15, 1951, the House of Representatives passed the bill by a vote of 354 to 118. The bill was then sent to the Senate. The Senate passed the bill on March 22, 1951, by a vote of 88 to 12. The bill then went to the President for his signature.

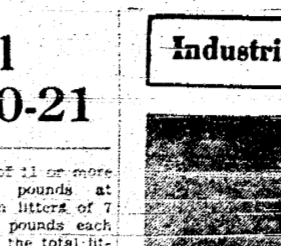

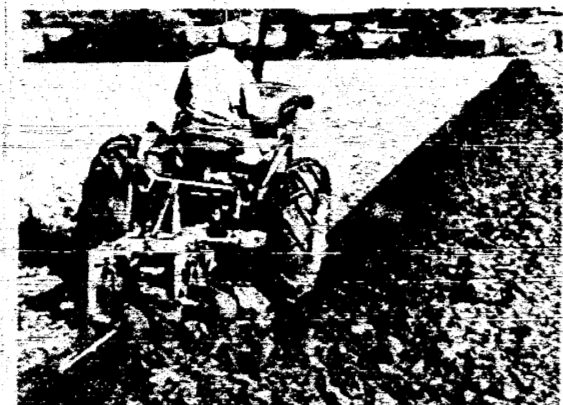

How to Gain Typing Speed Told by Fastest Operator
