The FATAL FOURTH is coming up again.

Fourth of July holiday accidents took 66 lives last year, 50 lives in 1949 and 63 lives in

Traffic and drowning were the major cause of accidental deaths during the 1950 four-day liberty celebrating holiday: 43 died in motor traffic, 8 in swimming and boating accidents, 5 from falls, and 2 from fire. Two were killed when a tractor overturned, and a horse and wagon ran over a small child. Three babies suffocated in their cradles. One person accidentally took an overdose of barbiturates and another was killed in a non-traffic

motor vehicle accident. Of those killed in traffic, 10

were pedestrians. Of those who drowned, three were occupants, of small boats. Only one was swimming at a public beach, or area actually

set aside for swimming.

During the three-day Independence Day holiday in 1949. 11 were killed in traffic and 20 in swimming or boating accidents; in 1948, 24 were killed in traffic and 23 drowned.

Excessive heat and sun and over-exertion took additional lives each year.

You may save your life this holiday if you drive with care when you must drive, if you swim at a public beach, remain seated aboard small boats, watch where you are walking and take it easy if the weather is hot.





Possible decline of honey bee worries farm experts

The honey bee, with his precious cargo of pollen may become too scarce on Michigan farms for the good of agriculture in general. Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Michigan State College are reminding farmers that the honey bee, so necessary for the development of fruit and seeds, cannot survive without sufficient nectar and pollen resources. Approximately 50 cultivated crops require insect pollination and the job of pollinating fruit blooms is now almost entirely dependent upon honey bees. But Michigan's honey bee population is growing dangerously small. For advice on ways to help save the important honey bee, farmers should consult their County Agricultural Agent.






