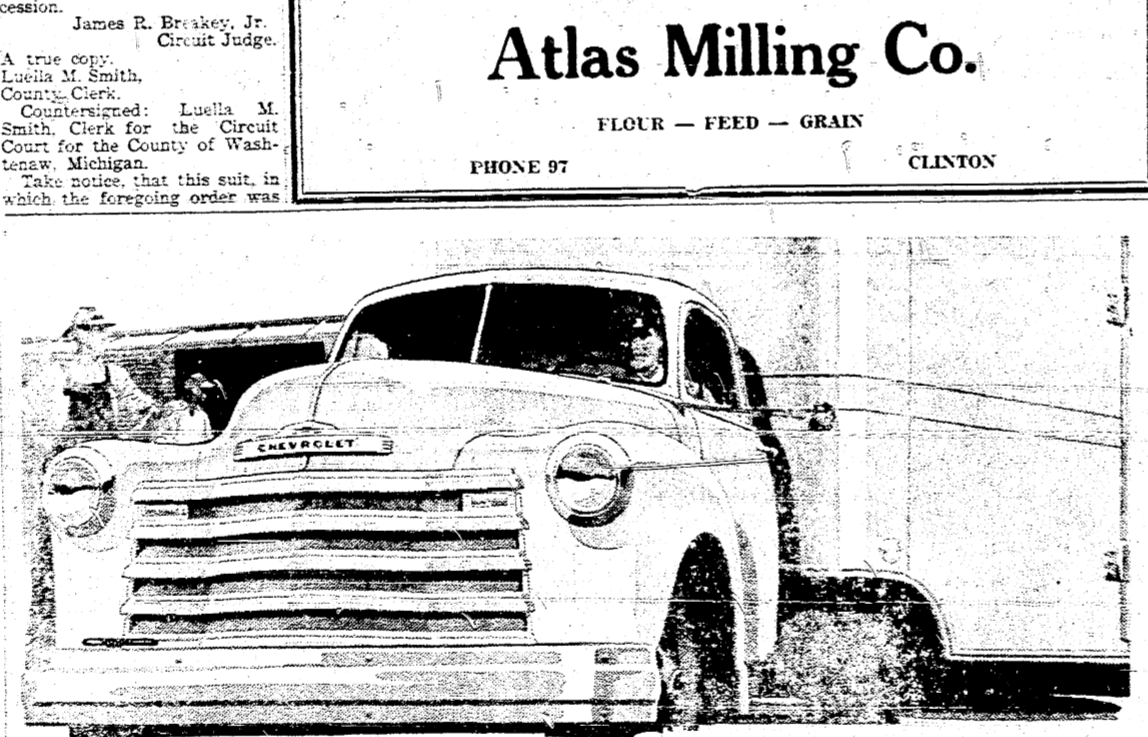

Science invades the silo to aid dairy farmers

Michigan weather, especially in the upper peninsula, hinders the making of good quality field-cured hay. Tests conducted by Michigan State College's Agricultural Experiment Station maintained the range of feeding values possible in days put up at different periods during the hay-making season, using three curing methods: early hay crop silage, mid-season barn-dried hay and late field-cured hay. Michigan farmers who find it difficult to cure hay in the field will be interested to learn that more milk was produced on hay crop silage than on either field-cured or barn-dried hay. GOV. WILLIAMS REPORTS TO THE PEOPLE
 Whatever is made at this time. Old people who have read about the legislative action and are expecting an immediate increase will be disappointed. They will not meet the tuberculosis sanatorium needs of Southeastern Michigan.
 Instead, the lawmakers granted Wayne county a pailty \$300,000. With all due respect to the needs of other areas, which we certainly do not want to neglect this action was certainly unfair.
 Southeastern Michigan has the worst TB problem in the state. Two thirds of the deaths from this disease in Michigan in 1950 occurred in Wayne county. 98 percent of patients on the waiting list for sanatorium care are in Wayne county. In the face of these facts, the legislature granted Wayne county less than 10 percent of the available funds.
 This is an issue which cuts across political lines and interests. I urge an appropriation for sanatorium care to protect the interests of every county, regardless of its population or geographic location. This is a case of obvious injustice to one area.
 Most of good will, no matter where they happen to live, ought to cooperate to stamp out tuberculosis wherever it occurs. It is no respecter of geographical boundaries.
 State Library Resumes Services
 The Michigan State Library has resumed all services, including filling requests for books and information. The number of books loaned to state employees, libraries and state residents without charge already exceeds ten thousand per month and is increasing rapidly. Reading materials for libraries are still lacking, however, in annual training.

Many of our old people who are getting state old age assistance may be cruelly disappointed by the Legislature's indecisive action on old age benefit payments.
 I recommended to last week's special session that it increase maximum old age assistance benefits from \$50 to \$70 a month effectively immediately. Instead the legislature adopted a highly deceptive piece of legal language which seems to conform to my recommendation but actually does not.
 Actually the new law does not mean any immediate increase in old age benefits. It merely results in an increase in the cost of old age assistance, a point on which Uncle Sam is not undecided.
 In any event, the legislature's action undoubtedly will not result in an increase to \$70 a month. This means that no increase in old age benefits is to be expected.
 I recommended that the maximum old age benefits be raised to \$70 a month, without waiting for Uncle Sam to act. I pointed out in my message that the last raise (from \$50 to \$60) was made in 1949, in response to my recommendation.
 Since the \$60 figure was set in 1949, the cost of living has gone up so sharply that many of our old people are severely pinched. I pointed out in my message last week that this has become an emergency situation, warranting action by the legislature without delay.
 The legislature responded with some legal double talk. It denied the few thousand dollars necessary to have an adequate supply of state flags.
 I have asked the Highway Commissioner to see if there are some funds available in his department which could be used to provide state flags for the Straits of Mackinac ferries.
 There may be other ways we can encourage the display of the state flag without the appropriation the legislature released.
 It was a great satisfaction to spend a weekend with the Michigan National Guard at Camp Grayling, where the state's militia have been engaged in annual training.

From Your Congressman

A Weekly Report From Congressman George Meader

Congressional exploration to determine whether procedures have been established to hear the withholding of Justice Department action on a self-imposed dollar most fraud case is asked in letters which I have sent to the chairman of four committees of the Congress.

The case against the Commercial Home Equipment Corporation of Chicago on a transportation contract with the Lustron Corporation of Columbus, Ohio, has been in the hands of the Justice Department for 16 months. It was exceptionally well-documented when it was referred to the Justice Department. Yet a formal inquiry which was addressed to the Attorney General on June 28, 1950, brought a reply on July 12 from Deputy Attorney General Peyton Ford that the Justice Department still is studying the matter.

The alleged fraud consisted in false representations by Commercial Home Equipment of 200 tractors to Lustron where, in fact, it had furnished only 180. Hence, payments of a minimum monthly amount were based on the number of tractors furnished.

The Investigations Division of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation filed a report on the fraud case to the attention of the Justice Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation on April 19, 1950. Subsequently, the FBI and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation investigated the case and on August 11, 1950, filed a report recommending that the Justice Department investigate to determine whether a criminal offense had been committed.

With no attempt to minimize the difficulty of examining the facts in preparation for a criminal prosecution, it would seem on the surface that 16 months is a long time for the Justice Department to complete its investigation and either present the matter to the grand jury or determine that there was no probable cause for action.

It is particularly in view of the fact that the Justice Department has had the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to complete its investigation and either present the matter to the grand jury or determine that there was no probable cause for action.

As counsel for the Fullbright Committee at that time, I am familiar with circumstances which seem to me to indicate what appears to be delay and procrastination by the Justice Department in this case.

Second, during preparation and consideration of the Fullbright Committee's report on this case, unusual pressures were brought to bear upon the members of the committee and the staff by the associates and friends of the individuals involved in the case.

In view of those circumstances I do not believe it is wild speculation to suspect that similar efforts have been made with respect to the investigation and action by the Justice Department. It is in this aspect of the matter which warrants the attention of Congress.

The Justice Department holds the responsibility for maintaining public confidence in the integrity of the Federal Government's rules of conduct and their enforcement. It is essential that the Justice Department act vigorously, fortitudo and promptly in the prosecution of offenses against the United States. It is idle to talk of
