Dear Folks: May I take this means of expressing the sincere thanks of the Legion Auxiliary and the Legion to those of you who gave a pint of blood October 2. Also to those who tried to donate but were refused because of circumstances beyond their control. While Manchester did not do as well as the last time a Mobile Blood Unit was here, ninety-one pints of blood were drawn. Perhaps more could have or should have been donated but the fact that it was not is certainly no fault of those who did attend. Incidentally only 39 pints were drawn at Dexter and 58 pints at Whitmore Lake the 3rd and 4th of October. Comparatively, Manchester's showing was fine.

It has come to my attention that some confusion and misunderstanding has occurred because the enterprise story on the Mobile Blood Unit identified the program as a Red Cross program, and yet the Michigan Department of Health Mobile Unit drew the blood. May I apologize to the enterprise if I caused publishing of any misinformation.

Michigan was one of the first states to adopt a state wide blood program. This program is under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Department of Health and is carried on in cooperation with the Red Cross program. In fact the two programs and the services rendered under each are almost identical except that the State provides certain processing of blood not

Michigan Bell's Plea To Hunters

Hunters please spare those telephone lines!

This was the appeal of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company on the approach of the 1951 hunting season, opening Oct. 15.

Michigan Bell advises that many persons are not familiar with the extent of trouble that can be caused by a bullet or even a BB shot into one of its cables. A pellet need not sever the many wires inside a cable to cause extensive damage. It was pointed out, for even a small hole in a cable's lead sheath would allow water to seep in and short out circuits. Aside from the normal terrific and emergency messages that telephone lines carry regularly, there are numerous calls bearing defense, and serious consequences could result if some of these were disrupted.

Prospective hunters are also reminded that it is against the law to willfully damage telephone facilities by gunfire, an offense which carries a felony charge if the damage exceeds \$50. Michigan Bell says that cable damage by bullets or shotshell usually means more than \$50 in repair expenditures.

Community Chest Goal Is \$4000

Will Be Held Oct. 22 Through Nov. 5

Manchester area Community Chest Drive will be held October 22 through November 5. Everyone is asked to plan now for a quick two week's drive. The Community Chest goal has been set for \$4,000—the same as last year.

The Kick-Off dinner is scheduled for October 18, at the Rowan Corner church hall. This is not a social event or a bonus for working on the drive. It is a work session for all solicitors and organizations as the solicitors receive their materials and exchange ideas which will enable them to do their work with uniform information. The hour selected—dinner hour—has been set to enable every solicitor to attend and still be able to attend other meetings if necessary, later in the evening.

On October 18, the special gifts committee will start working immediately on their solicitations and business men are urged to be prepared to do their part early in the drive.

Out of the agencies supported by the fund only a little more than one-third goes out of the area. The largest outside fund is the United Health and Welfare. This group includes such organizations as the Michigan Heart Association, Sister Kenny Foundation for treatment of polio, Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation, United Cerebral Palsy Association, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, Leader Dog League for the Blind and many others.

When planning to give the committee urges everyone to remember that this one drive includes many and everyone is urged to consider how much they would give to each agency if solicitations were made one at a time. That total is what is needed to make the Manchester Community Chest Drive a success. The drive here was originally organized to do away with constant solicitations.

This week I will give you the requirements for Clothing I, II and III. Any girl between the ages of 10 and 20 years may join a 4-H club. They are required to take Clothing I the first year and in each additional year the following years project work. However if the leader feels a girl is capable of taking two years of project work at the same time she may do so by completing requirements for both. However, we do not encourage a member to take more than one project each year.

Clothing I requirements: 1. Hem a towel or a head scarf by machine. 2. Make one of the following garments: An apron, a simple cotton dress or cotton blouse. 3. Make two satisfactory garments in pads. 4. Report—include amounts of material and costs.

Clothing II requirements: Cotton project: Make one of the following cotton garments, dress or shirt and blouse. 2. Make a hemmed patch. Report—include amount of material and costs.

Clothing III requirements: Make one of the outfits: (a) dress and one other garment; (b) Sportswear (active) play suit with skirt or shirt and slacks; (c) Lounging costume; a housecoat or nightgown or pajamas. Report—include amounts of material and costs.

We have the project books in the Extension Office for the members and also the requirement books which the leaders may call for at any time. For first year members we have the bulletin entitled "We learn to sew" (No. 9A), second year members "Clothing II" (No. 9B), and third year members "The Summer Costume" (No. 9C).

Next week I will cover the requirement for the following projects: Wood, Complete Costume and Children's Garments. May I close today's column with our 4-H pledge. The 4-H is in club work stand for head, heart, hands and health. They represent the four-fold training and development which club members undergo.
