# The SNAPSHOT GUILD



The same legislator who stated that \$120 million was needed sum, rose the next day in the House and Senate and made a mistake. The amount needed, he said, was \$130 million.

That comes to more than TWO AND ONE QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS A WEEK for roads not counting the millions available in federal matching funds. I do not believe any such sum is needed.

But whether we accept \$120 or \$130 million as the total highway pool needed, either sum can be raised for much less than a 1 1/2-cent increase in the gas tax.

Revenues from present gas and weight taxes have been going up so fast that the gas tax is now producing what the Good Roads Federation calculated would produce in 1950.

The best estimate of revenues from present road taxes during the fiscal year beginning July 1 is \$193,500,000. This figure was repeated on the floor of the House only three weeks ago by one of the leaders of the two-cent drive. If the same conclusion—that we could build roads with a much less than a 2-cent increase, that an increase of that size would not be accepted.

I offered to sign with certain provisos a bill for a 1 1/2-cent gas tax increase. This together with other bills in the House, the Senate suddenly reversed itself, called the bill back and returned it to a conference committee of both Houses.

Immediately the gas tax advocates raised their goal by increase to 1 1/2 cents a gallon, \$10 million dollars.

**Picture Your Home**

It is a good time of year to make some snapshots of your home—while the trees, lawn, and shrubs are wearing their best looks of spring.

It seems a shame that our homes usually get into our pictures only incidentally, as a part of the background. When shots are made with the camera as the primary subject, the camera usually points the picture very high.

If you have a new home—whether it is actually a new building, or merely a new-to-you house—you will certainly want to make some pictures for showing and giving to interested friends and relatives. And of course, for placing in the family album to refresh your memory in pleasant fashion.

Recently I asked a professional photographer what he considered the most important point I could pass along to you about picture making. His answer was:

"Well, then to all the viewers, the houses are not to be taken as the whole neighborhood in the picture."

In other words, a house is a stable subject and if it is to be the feature of the picture, it should be taken from a low angle. If your point in making the picture is to show the house in relation to its surroundings, that is a different matter.

It is difficult to talk about lens openings and shutter speeds in photographing houses. Generalizations are not very useful here because the setting will depend not only on the light of the particular day, but on the amount of shade.

A certain amount of shade will add a pleasant touch to your snapshots with the interesting shadows it produces. Very heavy shade can pose something of a problem. However, a longer exposure (with the camera on a tripod) may enable you to make a satisfactory shot.

One reason that spring is such a good time for making pictures of houses is that the trees aren't yet fully and thus more light will be reaching your subject than would later in the summer.

These are the reasons why I say the 1 1/2-cent gas tax increase is taxing the people of Michigan for more money than we need.

All of these figures add up to one conclusion: that we could finance the road program adequately with a gas tax of about one cent per gallon.

Some people have said the argument was not great. But at a half-cent one way or the other means nearly \$9,000,000 to Michigan motorists. And that is a lot of money if you think of it.

The report comes from the two medical schools of our state and the Michigan Medical Society, which I had asked to study the problem. The report was made by E. Fernald Foster, M. D., secretary of the Michigan State Medical Society; A. C. Purstenburg, M. D., dean of the University of Michigan Medical School; and Dean Schell, Ph. D., dean of the Wayne University College of Medicine.

They said that the state needs 1,574 more doctors to bring our medical services up to the average of the rest of the country. The national average is one doctor for every 748 persons. Michigan now has one doctor for every 919 persons.

The committee recommended a detailed program for relieving the shortage. Space does not permit me to give you the details. But the recommendations include a plan for increasing the production of doctors through the proposed Wayne medical school and expanded facilities at the University of Michigan.

The report also recommends increasing the productivity of doctors by voluntary health insurance plans, "medical associations" and other methods it urges that our present supply of doctors be used to best advantage by increased public health services, and so forth.

The proposed Wayne medical school would permit them to graduate more young doctors. This medical school program would result in Michigan having the national average of one doctor for every 748 persons by 1959.

**Price Stabilization**

These step-by-step reductions in effect May 14 says the Detroit district office of the Office of Price Stabilization. These price reductions will be effective until July 1st, says the OPS district office.

On that date OPS will put into effect the first of two ceiling price reductions. The next price reduction will take place October 1.

The OPS regulation controlling beef prices is part of a group of regulations that reduce the prices that slaughterers can pay for beef cattle and that wholesalers may charge retail butchers. The ceiling prices will be reduced about 10 percent to 20 percent, October 1/2 percent of September 30.

The prices slaughterers may pay for cattle are the lowest which would protect cattle feeders against inventory losses on cattle acquired before the freeze date. The price reductions consider both the feeders' and assurance of orderly marketing through normal channels.

The new beef ceiling prices are based on costs that take into account distances from markets, transportation and the like.

### From Your Congressman

A Weekly Report From Congressman George Meader

Washington, D. C.—An \$85,000 hospital for the pets of residents in the Los Alamos atomic plant community and a \$6,837,677.463. This was cut by the House Appropriations Committee to \$52,037,500. Then the House cut it again, to a final figure of \$49,676,500. The Independent Offices request, which includes the President's executive office and miscellaneous commissions, houses and agriculture, was \$6,837,677.463. The Appropriations Committee cut this to \$6,117,174.40, and the House cut it again to \$6,144,510.555. In total, the Committee and the House cut the two bills by \$93,718,525, including considering and approving appropriations.

### World Champion Marksman Gives His Trophies to Kids

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y.—A marksman who has won so many trophies and awards that he has had to give more than 100 of them away to youngsters who visit his range in Evren E. Meddaugh. This crack shot, who has a private range in his home here, has just set a new world record in the 500-yard trap shooting competition's individual championship match, when he recorded 99 out of a possible 100. He is glad to give away items from his still overflowing trophy room. "It makes the youngsters happy and it cuts down on the objects to be stored," he says.

Meddaugh bought his first gun for \$20 in 1937 when he was appointed a deputy sheriff in Dutchess County. With this gun, a Colt officer's model revolver, he has since fired more than 85,000 rounds of ammunition.

The 55-year-old marksman set his record on a national match course. The U. S. Revolver Association during 1950 inspected and certified targets received from more than 2,000 persons from all 48 states and United States possessions. His record is not being used to determine that Meddaugh's score was a new world record.

Meddaugh has fired in more than 25 matches since 1939. In the past 11 years, he has won many trophies, certificates and merchandise awards.

investigate Atomic Energy Commission activities without endangering the secrecy of the atomic energy operations. The Council of Economic Advisors, and the Bureau of the Budget, originally requested \$22,215, including a \$25,000,000 emergency fund for the President. The Appropriations Committee cut the emergency fund in half and recommended an executive order total of \$19,501,215. The House cut this emergency fund to \$3,000,000.

The \$25,000 per hospital was brought up in the debate on the Atomic Energy Commission appropriation. Evidence in the Appropriations Committee hearings showed that in a previous year the Commission had asked \$30,000 for a cat and dog hospital at Los Alamos, New Mexico, and that the hospital had actually cost \$85,000. The Appropriations Committee was critical of this expenditure, which it was shown, was primarily for the pets of Los Alamos residents and their veterinary services.

The result was an amendment by Representative Lyle, Democrat of Texas, to reduce the Atomic Energy Commission appropriation by \$85,000. It was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

This demonstrates the difficulty the Congress faces in attempting to reexamine the expenditures of an agency cloaked in secrecy, such as the Atomic Energy Commission. There has been evidence that the management of the Commission has taken advantage of this secrecy and this freedom from congressional scrutiny to engage in extravagant and wasteful expenditures.

The Atomic Energy Commission had asked \$1,210,000,000, which was cut by the Appropriations Committee to \$1,140,011,750.

Since the expenditure of this money is not subject to the checks which prevail with respect to other agencies, such as inquiries by individual congressmen or reporting by the press, the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy Commission has taken special care of the activities of the Atomic Energy Commission to make certain that principles of efficiency and economy are being observed and that secrecy is not being used to protect inefficiency.

Some employees of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy have been screened for security purposes, to allow them to in-

express themselves on it. The point of order rule was suspended by a vote of 212 to 193. The House then approved the reductions recommended by the Appropriations Committee and made an additional \$130,377,000 in cuts.

The other example of what can become involved in appropriations matter was a very interesting procedural maneuver. In acts which authorized public housing construction and used appropriations by decreasing the number of housing units which were to be built and the amounts to be paid for merchant ships. The money to support these activities was merely an arithmetic computation, leaving no discretion in the Congress in the basic legislation could not be touched at the time appropriations for these activities were under consideration.

The Appropriations Committee recommended reductions in the amounts appropriated for these purposes. However, under the rules of the House they would be subject to a point of order because they would effect changes in existing legislation.

Representative Thomas of Texas, a member of the Appropriations Committee, told the House that if these cuts were not subjected to a point of order the savings would amount to a bare minimum of \$750,000,000. Under the point of order rule, he explained, any one member of the House could knock out these reductions without giving the 434 other members a chance to
