KELLOGG CENTER NEARS COMPLETION AT MSC

Michigan State College is putting the finishing touches on its Kellogg Center for Continuing Education. Planned largely through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation of South Bend, the modern building is scheduled for completion in September.

Believed to be the number one building of its type in the U. S., the Kellogg Center will contain extensive facilities for the college level program of adult education and a working laboratory for hotel and restaurant students. It contains 120 double beds, a dining room, a kitchen, a lounge, a bar, a ballroom, and a large auditorium. The Kellogg Center is designed specifically to accommodate the thousands of Michigan residents who come to the campus annually for special courses and conferences of benefit to them in their professions and occupations.

Market Basket Higher Priced But Costs Fewer Hours Work

Market basket higher priced but costs fewer hours work. The weekly market basket of food items purchased by the average family in 1950 cost \$19.00, up from \$18.00 in 1949. The basket of 1950 cost 10.3 hours of work, down from 11.5 hours in 1949.

These figures were announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in a report on the cost of living. The report shows that the cost of living index for 1950 was 103.3, up from 100.0 in 1949. This means that the cost of living is 3.3 percent higher than in 1949.

Milk Marketing Order Effective Starting August 1

The Federal milk marketing order, which has been in the process of formulation for more than a year, will become effective in the Detroit metropolitan area on August 1 for one month. The order will be permanent after that date. It will be fully effective. The price provisions of the order do not operate until September, but all other provisions will be carried out during August to assist producers and processors with the transition.
