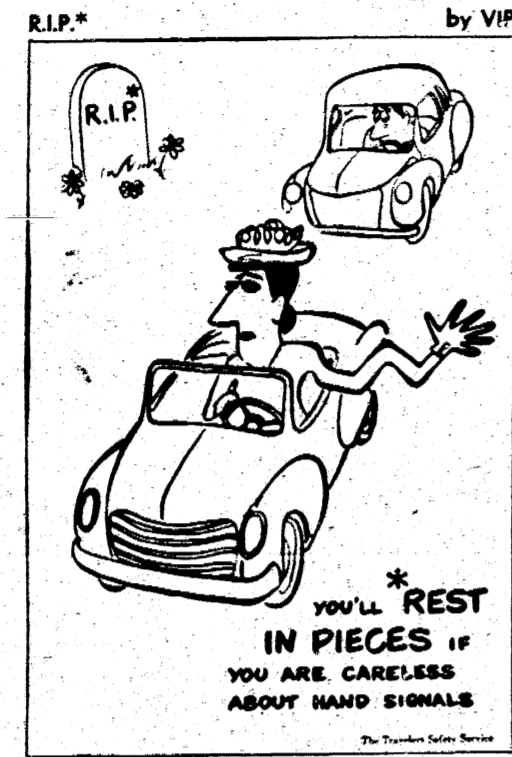

Senator Moody Reports: FROM THE NATIONAL CAPITOL

ardwick. When department officials appear before the committee of Congress, there is no congressional expert to advise them on "guesswork" and should be exposed. For the most part, the resulting action is based on "guesswork" and then on a cross-board slash of five or ten percent which hits everyone alike.

I do not believe that the present system is budgeted from a number of angles. It puts a premium on "padding" which penalizes the scrupulous executive without any strings attached. It penalizes only to see his estimate undergo the same process as that of others in some areas not heavily enough in others. It does not disclose where the "fat" that can be sliced off actually is.

Senator McClellan's bill will put Congress in a position to slice off this fat. It provides a focal point of leadership in reducing expenditures. The Joint Committee on the Budget, it ends the careless system of authorizing large expenditures without any firm estimate of what the cost may be. It would help to bring within bounds the "open-end" system of budgeting, in which bills are passed to pay money out of the Treasury without definite limit, under certain circumstances. Not all of these bills are bad. But they should be brought under firmer control.

My first move as a new member of the Expenditures Committee was to ask for action on this bill which had been passed by the Senate. It is inactive through the last session. The committee has not yet signed by both Democrats and Republican senators. This is not a partisan matter, and I am glad to report that equal support is coming from members of both parties. I have high hopes that Congress may pass this bill before it adjourns.

Visits 4-H'ers in Europe



Everett Mitchell, veteran radio commentator of the National Farm and Home Hour, will visit American 4-H young people in more than a dozen countries of Europe and the Middle East during the next month. His famous greeting, "It's a beautiful day in Chicago" will be changed to fit cities in Germany, Sweden, France, Greece and Austria on successive weeks.

During his 21,000-mile plane trip, Mitchell will interview many of the 58 4-H Club members who are spending the summer on foreign farms under the International Farm Youth Exchange program. He will broadcast a special report from these 4-H "grass roots ambassadors" at noon Saturday, August 18, over the NBC network. Other broadcasts on agriculture abroad will be heard on the National Farm and Home Hour at 4, 7, 11 and 12. The August 11 broadcast will be a report from the World Poultry Congress in Paris.

Kathy's Kitchen



Summer Quickies

These hot muggy summer evenings are not the time for mowing or any homemaker to be slaving away in a hot kitchen. So below we've suggested a few quickies which the family will go for and which are prepared with the expenditure of very little time and energy. We always remember that during these summer months when appetites are not so good perhaps a can of corned beef hash in a crock pot is still very important. These quickies are also.

This quickie is inexpensive and easy to make. It is a favorite with the kids. One can of hash serves six and along with the six eggs makes each serving amount to only about 15c per serving. Place the contents of a can of corned beef hash in a long wide, greased baking dish and mash. After greasing the top of the dish, make six depressions in the hash. Into each of these depressions place a whole egg. Crack a little yellow cheese (either the sharp or mild varieties) will do so on the top of each egg, and season with salt and pepper and paprika. Bake in a moderate 350 degree oven until brown and crispy. Serve to the family with lots of sliced tomatoes, carrot and celery sticks, scallion, radishes and lettuce wedges. A frosty glass of iced tea or coffee or cold milk would be good with this meal.
