Michigan Farmers Urged to be Careful With Motor Vehicles

Motor vehicles may kill 5,000 farmers and injure an additional 200,000, H. E. Curry, vice president and secretary of the State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Co. said today.

This company insures nearly 2,000,000 automobiles, about two-thirds of which are in rural areas.

Farm motor vehicle deaths totaled 8,300 in 1950. This is a drop of only three per cent over 1949, Curry pointed out.

"Every car is the most dangerous thing a farmer owns," he said. "Deaths from this cause are increasing."

"Farmers lost nearly 7,000,000 work days in 1950 because of rural motor vehicle accidents," he pointed out.

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New Dean Named At MSC Vet School

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Medics to Hear Their President

John W. Cline, M. D., president of the American Medical Association, will cite the public's stake in future medical advances in an address before the Michigan State Medical Society in Grand Rapids, September 25, C. E. Humphrey, M. D., of Detroit, president of the state medical organization said today.

More than 3,500 doctors of medicine from Michigan, the Midwest and Canada are expected to attend the six-day meeting devoted to scientific lectures and the dissemination of the latest advances in medicine.

The new dean was named August 9 by the State Board of Agriculture, governing body of the Michigan State College, to succeed the late Dr. Claude S. Bryan, dean since his death in July from aplastic anemia.

Dr. Clark worked with Michigan veterinarians and farmers as a member of the MSC veterinary staff and as state veterinarian.

From 1948 to 1949, Dr. Clark left full time duties with the Michigan State faculty to serve as state veterinarian, during which time he was retained as a lecturer in surgery. He first joined the staff in 1929 as a technician in animal pathology.

Born in 1899 in Fitzburg, Mass., Dr. Clark received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine at Michigan State College in 1929. He had previously attended the school of agriculture in Massachusetts and the U. S. College of Veterinary Surgery in Washington, D. C.

He has been head of the surgery and medicine department in the school of veterinary medicine since returning to the staff in 1949.

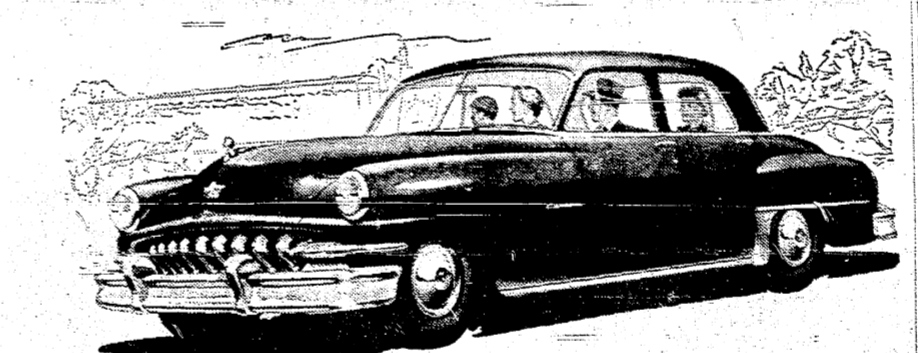

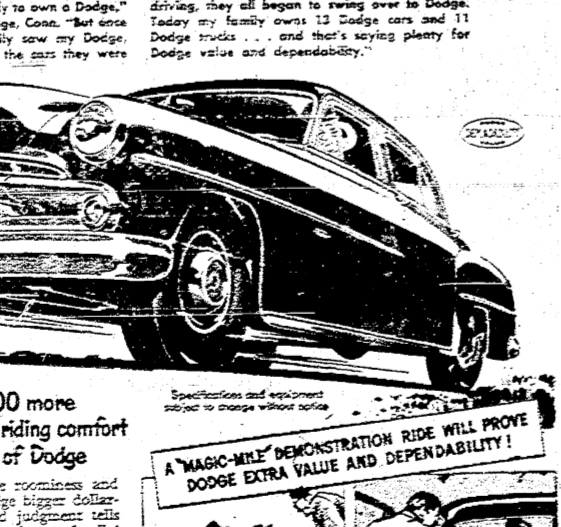

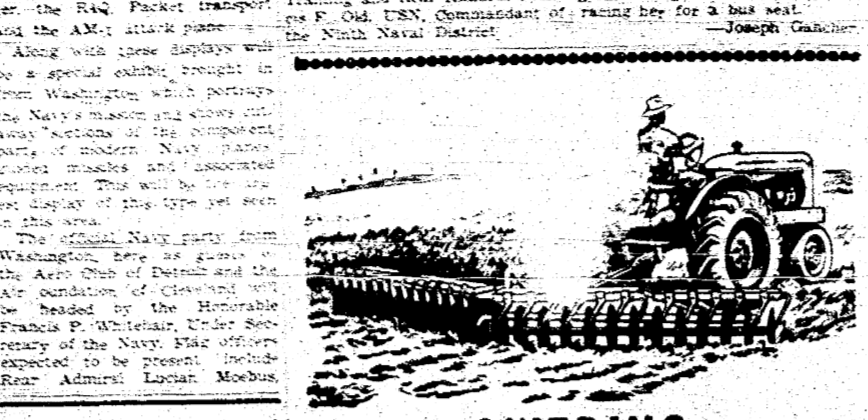
