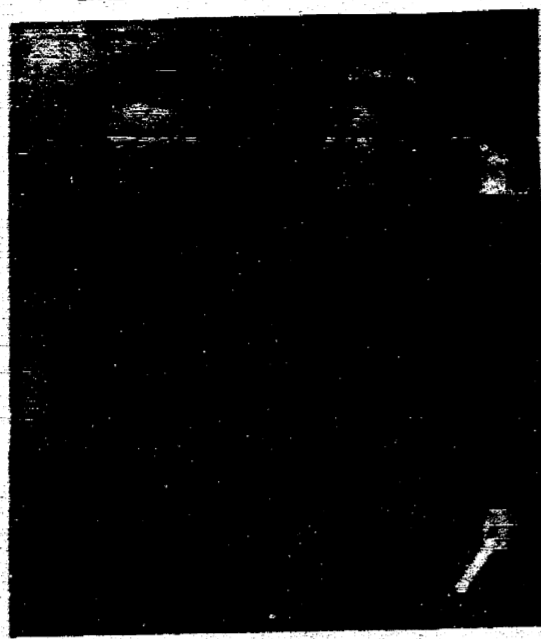

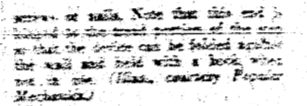

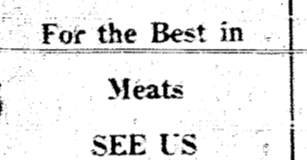

MICHIGAN MIRROR

A lot of temperamental toes in the Michigan tourist industry were stepped upon collectively by staff report No. 23 on reorganization of state government.
The report, as drafted by the Citizens Research Council of Michigan (successor to Loren Miller's Detroit governmental bureau), was submitted to Rep. Robert M. Montgomery, chairman of the state joint legislative committee. Recommendations include: Require the four regional tourist associations to match state aid dollar for dollar up to \$100,000 a year (\$25,000 each). Then increase this amount until no state funds are granted.
Permit the governor to appoint five members to the Michigan Tourist Council without present requirements that they be nominated by the four regional associations. The four association secretaries would be deprived of their right as ex-officio members.
The state director of "tourist development and promotion" would serve as secretary of the Tourist Council and also of the 500 Local Centennial Celebration Commission. The council now has its own full-time director, while the commission planning to appoint one in the near future.
The report challenges the principle that it is good business for the State of Michigan to subsidize, in part at least, the cost of Michigan Centennial Celebration. A quote: "During the 1947-48 biennium the State of Michigan contributed 25 percent of the funds spent on tourist promotion and publicity."
Actually, Michigan has lagged behind other competitors in the amount of money being spent for tourist promotion. It is not particularly more money should be spent on it. The big question is this: Who is going to provide the money? The State of Michigan 25 percent of the total industry 100 percent?
Speculation as to aspirations of G. Mennen Williams to the vice presidency's nomination in 1952, which has had a bearing on an interesting possibility. If Williams is selected governor in 1952 and if Williams were to defeat Sen. Homer Ferguson (or whichever Republican runs for the senate chair) in 1954 he would perhaps be the brightest star on the presidential horizon.
Remember, Williams was touted to go down in ignominious defeat himself twice as Michigan governor but he is being re-elected again (no Democratic governor has yet succeeded himself twice as Michigan governor) but the GOP is doing a bit of whittling in the dark.

The on-again-off-again variable of the state—the draft—has popped up again. State drafts were set for November 7, 1951, but were "jumped" from 2:47 to 2:57 to "cover last minute emergencies." The nature of the "emergencies" was not disclosed. Children's husbands now are subject to call.
While some are having trouble spending all the federal aid money for wildlife projects framed in it through a formula based on area of the state and number of licenses, Michigan will get only 52 cents per licensed hunter. Nevada, large in area and low in population, gets \$18.01 per licensed hunter but can't put up the required matching funds.

Locks as though Michigan will get its new state office building. National Production Authority has agreed to release 300 tons of steel. Another application must be made by Jan. 1, for the next quarter. If it requires as many telephone calls and loss of expensive time to high paid officials it will be cheaper to do without the new building.
The state administrative board has approved spending \$116,554 for repair of access roads to 20 state institutions.
Awards for construction in August fell off 13 percent from July in Michigan.
The "Little Hoover commission" studying reorganization of state government is dubious about the little legislature's legality. The little legislature may be called in to authorize expenditure of limited sums for urgent needs when the full legislature is not in session, and has been doing so for years. A constitutional amendment may be necessary to legalize the body's status.
The commission also has rejected a proposal that the highway commission and state director of agriculture be appointed by the governor. The commission will investigate duplication of jobs in the latter department.

Michigan State College's fall enrollment is 9.4 percent less than last year but still 1,000 more students than expected. This is the nation's trend.
Potato production this year is expected to be down about 20 percent—nearly the amount of last year's surplus. Corn probably will show a moderate price weakness during the harvest and near-record production of soybeans is predicted to depress prices.

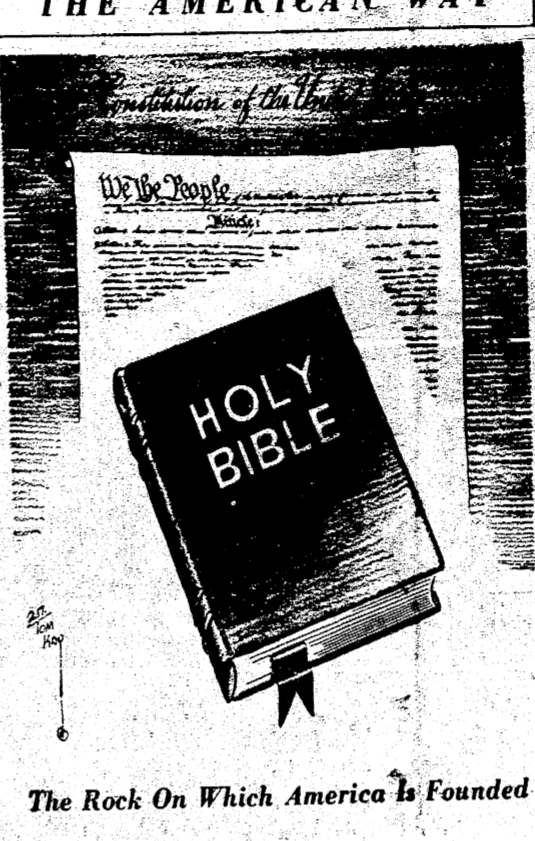
