The church choir of the Sharon church will sing the anthem accompanied by the organist, who will play for the entire service.

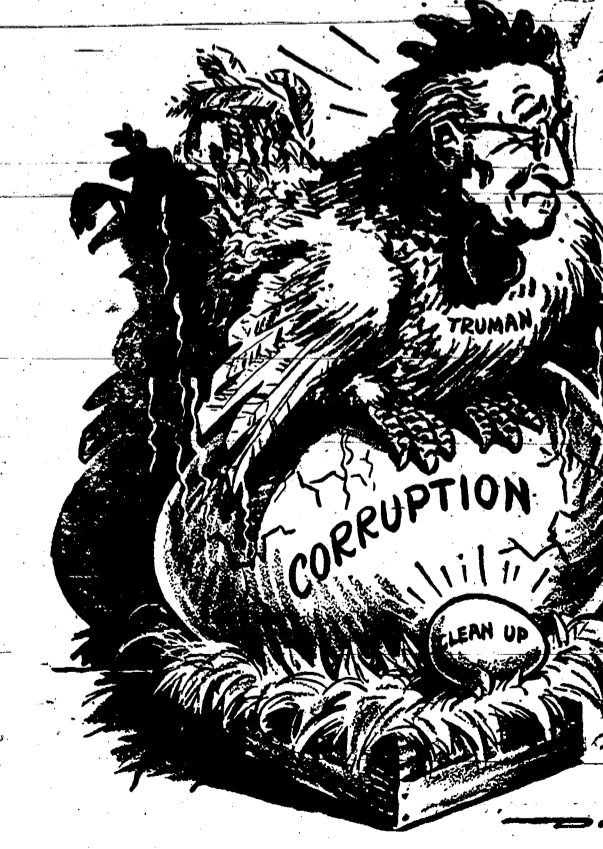
WCSH Hosts To Saline Group

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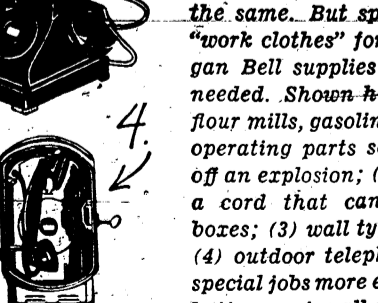

HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

DON'T BLAME YOUR REFRIGERATOR IF YOU DON'T KNOW STORAGE RULES

Do you make the most of your refrigerator?

The best way to guarantee a "Yes" answer is to learn the basic rules of food storage—what to put in a standard or conventional refrigerator, how long to keep it there and how to wrap it properly.

As a good general rule, to keep moist foods from drying out and to make sure that foods such as onion dishes, cheese, coffee and butter do not give off or absorb odors, store them in covered containers. The General Electric Consumers Institute suggests plastic-type covers, household foil or heavy wax paper as convenient coverings for such foods in the refrigerator.

Eggs may be stored in their original carton or in a bowl on any convenient shelf of the refrigerator; if you plan to keep them longer than a week, they should be in a covered container.

Notes on Meat Storage. Meat or fowl that is to be used the day it is bought can be stored, uncovered, anywhere in the refrigerator. For storage of meat up to four or five days, it should be wrapped in moisture-proof material such as heavy wax paper, household foil or cellophane—or else left in the store wrappings—and placed in the meat tray or on a refrigerator shelf.

If you wish to store meat or fowl for more than four or five days, wrap in moistureproof material and place in the freezer section, where it will remain fresh up to two weeks.

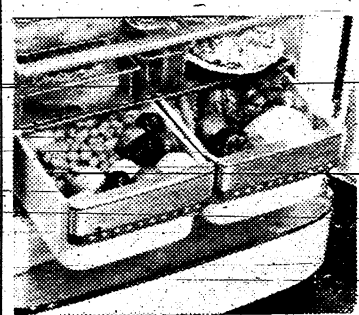
Fish should always be well covered with heavy wax paper or household foil, or other foods will absorb the odor.

Variety meats (such as liver and kidneys), ground meats and seafood are extremely perishable and should always be stored in the freezer section if they are to be kept longer than one day before use.

Milk Keeps 3-4 Days. Milk will remain fresh in your refrigerator for three or four days, de-

pending on its freshness at the time of delivery, the number of times the bottle is removed from the refrigerator and the length of time it is left standing at room temperature.

Most refrigerators today are equipped with drawers especially designed for the storage of fresh fruits and vegetables. Wash vegetables before storing them and discard those parts that are not to be used, except in the case of peas and lima beans, which should be stored in the pod, and corn, which keeps better if stored in the husk.



Fresh fruits and vegetables will keep best if they are stored in the specially-designed drawers found in most refrigerators.

Leafy vegetables should be well drained after washing to remove excess moisture.

Special Treatment for Berries. All fruits, except berries, should be stored in the refrigerator drawers. Berries, being very perishable, will tend to get mushy and lose their juices if they are washed or hulled before storing. They should be spread out on a shallow dish or plate and stored on an open shelf in the refrigerator.

And if your refrigerator is large enough, you may wish to keep such items as mustard, relish, catsup, sirup, jellies and jams in it. These foods do not require refrigeration but you may wish to have them chilled for serving.

Inside The Capital

Again the deluge of criticism by State Treasurer D. Hale Bra is falling upon the heads of our legislators. That is nothing new. Each session since 1935 to my personal knowledge, and I suppose the process went on long before then, some of the metropolitan newspapers have solemnly announced, "This is the worst legislature the state ever had." The words have been varied but the meaning has always been the same.

Of course, that could be true—but it has not been true. These years have seen definite improvement in the legislative structure, operations and attitudes. Both houses have reduced the number of their committees and the Senate has that number down to a good working basis. The Senate has adopted the procedure of appointing its own committees. The old rowdiness of the final night of the session is gone. The attitude toward our mental institutions has definitely improved and there is a new and very marked consciousness that the taxpayer must be given some consideration. This legislature and its immediate predecessor have been the most economy-minded of any legislature of this state for a generation, at least.

Working under the most adverse possible conditions, they have done a remarkable job in holding down state expenses. As state government generally goes around the country, it is the legislature trying to spend and the chief executive trying to hold them back. That is not the situation in Michigan.

branch of government, the branch closest to the people, and the greatest safeguard that the people have. A casual reading of history discloses that when somebody is trying to become a dictator and get everything in his own hands, the legislature is always the first thing he wants to put out of the way.

Comparing Michigan's legislature to those of other states there are some noticeable differences. One is the greater independence from executive control. The legislature here is more nearly a coordinate branch of government than it is in most of the states.

Another distinguishing feature is the extreme authority given legislative committees. There is no state in which the committees have more authority and very few in which they have as much authority as in Michigan. This focuses attention upon what is probably the greatest weakness of our legislative setup, namely, the secrecy of committee proceedings. While there is a permanent and public record of how each member votes on the floor of his chamber, there is no such public record of his vote in committee. There should be. A constituent ought to be able to find out just how his member stood in any definite action concerning any bill in committee as well as on the floor, and that is particularly true where the committee is given as much authority as it is in Michigan.

When the oratory and the confusion are over and the legislators go home, to one who examines the bills they killed and the bills they passed the marvel is that they could come out so well under the circumstances under which they work.

The Communist Party had the last week to write me a letter accusing me of "red baiting" and threatening me with political reprisals. The letter was on the stationery of the Communist Party, State Committee, 2419 Grand River Ave., Detroit, and was signed by William Albertson, State Secretary. His letter said I might have

been elected Governor by a much greater margin in 1950 if I had vetoed anti-Communist legislation. It pointed out (correctly) that I signed every anti-Communist bill which came to me, and urged a "yes" vote on a Constitutional amendment outlawing subversive activities. "Whatever support you may still have among progressive-minded workers and other liberal minded people is being dashed on the rocks of your red-baiting," the letter said. I have turned this letter over to the State Police Commissioner for his files. I do not want the support of the Communist Party. I will continue to do all I can to defeat them. I am gratified to have this written testimony that they don't like my program.

or lose half their funds. The volunteer organizations built up with great effort would be ruined by the proposed cut. I had the pleasure last week of taking part in the ceremonies dedicating the new \$1,180,000 Lee Memorial Hospital at Dowagiac. This 62-bed hospital is the newest addition to our \$40-million dollar community hospital program. In the last four years we have completed or started 40 hospital construction projects under this program. With two or three exceptions, these hospitals have been constructed entirely with local and federal funds—Uncle Sam putting up one-third, and local sources, public or private, putting up the other two-thirds. Nearly 80 percent of these new hospitals are in communities of less than 15,000 population. When the whole program is finished, we will have 2,394 additional hospital beds. When this program started, we had 24 areas in Michigan without adequate hospital service. Today we are giving hospital service to all but three of these areas. The program is under the direction of the State office of Hospital Survey and Construction.

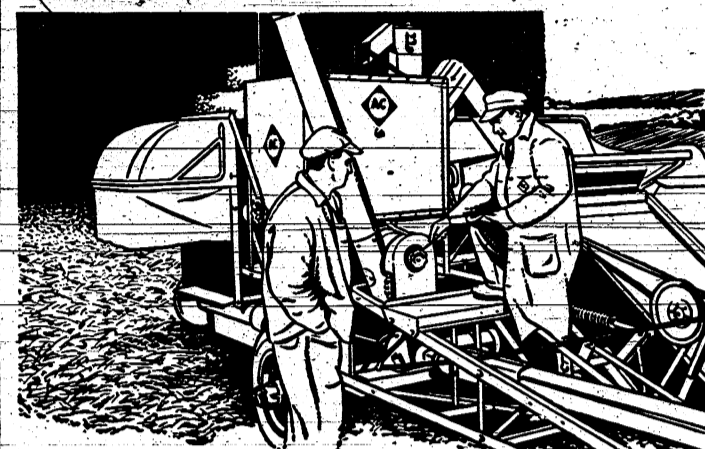

We got some more good news in our fight to check unemployment last week. Walker Cislser, chairman of the Emergency Defense Contracts Commission, reported to me that more than \$750 million in defense contracts were obtained for Michigan plants during February. This was three times as much as the January total. The Emergency Defense Contracts Commission was established as a temporary state agency on February 6. We were also able to get the U. S. Department of Labor to designate two more Michigan areas as critical unemployment areas—Port Huron and Bay City. This means that plants in those communities can get preferential treatment in the awarding of defense contracts.

Another set of new tax bills were sent to the floor of the State Senate last week. These bills would increase the intangibles tax; impose new taxes on telephones and other utilities; put a new tax on health and hospital insurance; and withdraw from the schools and other local units their present share of the present sales tax on liquor. Again I say that, as a whole, this is a bad program. It would result in higher local property taxes, or in higher costs for things the people buy, such as telephone service or hospital and medical insurance. But I will examine all of these bills carefully, if they come to my desk, and make a judgement on the merits of each measure.


Last year you will remember, I asked the Attorney General to start a grand jury investigation of the Michigan State Fair. This action resulted from the fact that rumors of corruption in the Fair had been current for some years. I wanted these rumors cleared up, the guilty exposed, and the innocent vindicated. Recently I asked the Fair Board not to act on the re-appointment of the Fair Director, James Friel, pending a report from the Grand Jury. Last week the grand juror petitioned the Board to remove Mr. Friel, charging misconduct in office. I immediately asked the Fair Board to suspend him until such time as these charges can be heard. Mr. Friel then resigned, with a statement denying any misconduct. It is well to remember that Mr. Friel has not been indicted, and the charges have not yet been proved. I hope that the whole thing can be brought out into the open so people can again have complete confidence in the State Fair management.
