One Party In Power Too Long, Says Ike

Abilene, Kan., (Eisenhower Day) -"One party has been in power too long in this country," Dwight Eisenhower, Republican candidate for President, declared in his maiden political speech which set the tone of his campaign. "Political health is endangered if one party becomes permanently or too long entrenched in power," he said at a two day Homecoming Celebration here.

On corruption in government he asserted: "When every citizen participates in every election proess ... or if any unworthy men, by deceit, gain official influence and are bold enough to practice their evil ways, punishment must be swift and severe.'

"To remain strong spiritually." he said, "we must first remember that free government is the political expression of a deeply religious

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High Taxes Bring Less Profit From **Greater Sales**

While the volume of manufacturing sales in the nation is increasing profits after taxes are dropping.

Noting this trend, which was revealed in latest Government statistics, the Citizens Research Council of Michigan today de-

is evidence that high Federal taxes on manufacturing businesses are reaching the point of diminishing returns both for the Government in tax revenues and for the American people in opportunity and jobs.

The Citizens Research Council said joint quarterly reports of the Federal Trade Commis-

sion and the Securities and Exchange Commission showed that in the 18 months between July 1, 1950 and December 31, 1951 the total net income after taxes. of all manufacturing corpora-tions in the country declined steadily in each quarter. except one, even though total sales

while manufacturers' sales of all manufacturing corporations. rose steadily from \$48,600,000, small business, showed a drop 2000 in the third quarter of 1950 in their aggregate quarterly net to \$54.300,000,000 in the fourth income after taxes from \$391,
No. 39277. quarter of 1951, their total 000,000 to \$156,000,000 even quarterly net income after taxes actually declined from \$3,706,000,000 to \$2,600,000,000 in the same period. The percentage of net income after taxes to sales dropped from 7.64. to 4.80 per cent.


FREE YOUR HOME OF GARBAGE NOW

If you are one of the millions of homeowners who lives in a suburban area not serviced by a public sewer system—and if you want to install a garbage disposal unit to operate on a septic-tank-plus-soil-absorption unit system, you can do so safely and effectively.

Check Septic Tank Capacity

It's a good idea to check first on the capacity of your existing septic tank facilities (the person who installed the system would know) and if the ca-



pacity is inadequate, the best plan is to replace the septic tank with a larger one or augment the existing tank with an additional one. A second tank, according to the General Electric Consumers Institute, should be installed in parallel to provide good distribution of sewage and food waste flow into

the two tanks. If an inadequate septe tank cannot be augmented or enlarged to take care of the increased loading caused by a garbage disposal unit, the tank will require more frequent cleaning.

The sub-surface soil absorption system used with a septic tank can be augmented by adding additional lengths of drainage trench and tile lines and by the installation of a suitable leeching pit.

Before you install a garbage disposal unit, be sure the septic tank and the soil absorption system are in good repair, that all plumbing connections have been made properly and that the drain lines are properly designed, clean and-workable.




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



"Never make jam or jelly on a rainy day," is a tradition that's been handed down from mother to daughter through many generations. It seems that moisture in the air used to be a perfect hoodoo for the seting qualities of the sweet spread.


