Voters in the Pleasant Lake school district yesterday approved, by a three-to-one majority, a proposed \$125,000 bond issue to build a new elementary school. They also approved, by the same majority, a special tax levy up to a minimum of eight per cent for ultimate redemption of the bonds.

The vote was 129 to 42 in favor of the bond issue, and 137 to 45 on the millage question.

Though the present enrollment of children in the newly consolidated Pleasant Lake district is only 120, the new school will be equipped to take care of 175. The building, which will have a special community room and kitchen, has been designed by Ann Arbor Architect Walter Anicka so that its facilities can be expanded if necessary.

More Bank Run Material For Road

The Washtenaw county road commission Manager Howard L. Minier has announced that the 18,000 yards of bank run material originally estimated as the quantity needed for the roadbed base on the Chelsea-Manchester road, has already been augmented with an additional 6,000 yards. Minier said that a rough estimate of the quantity still needed before the surface gravel can be added indicated that another 6,000 yards will be needed.

The bank run materials are being hauled from the Wellhoff pit on the Chelsea-Manchester road which the Road Commission owns. Because the quantity needed is so much more than originally estimated, the date for the completion of the under base has been changed from July 1 to July 7th. A minimum of 5,000 yards of gravel has been estimated as the amount that will be needed for the topping.

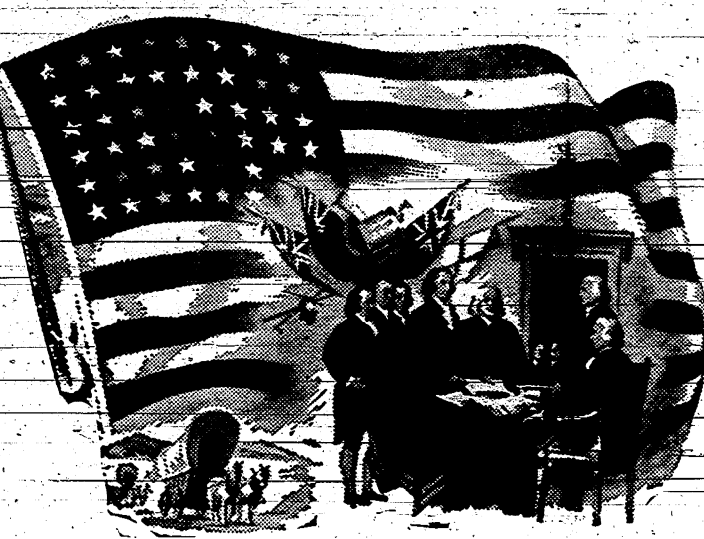

Unanimously agreed to by representatives of the Thirteen Colonies, July 4, 1776.

Opening Words: "When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impell them to the separation.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness."

Closing Words: "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."
