



#### Farmers Urged To **Prevent Wheat Loss Due To Rodents**

Grain is being condemned for human use increasingly frequent because of contamination by animal hair and filth. This contamination comes mainly from rats, mice, cats and birds. In 1952 farmers will be penalized severely in price received if their wheat is contaminated. The only satisfactory protec tion is rat proof storage. This storage must be sanitary and free from trash, which serves as a hiding place for rats and mice. Even with proper sanitation and efficient control, rats may come onto a farm from elsewhere and enter a granary Suggestions for rat proofing: 1. Screen all ventilation openings with woven wire screen (hardware cloth) of a inch mesh or smaller.
