Cost of this drying operation is only about 3 cents a bushel. Necessity for "turning" grain in storage is eliminated by cooling. When using the building for these purposes, grain is piled over the tunnel to a 6 12-ft. depth is the structure is filled. When the fan is operated, air is pulled into the building through its openings down through the grain. Carrying

moisture picked up from the grain, the airflows out through the tunnel. Fan Runs 20-60 Days At harvest time, the fan is operated continuously for an initial period until the grain's moisture content is brought down to a safe level for storage. This requires from 20 to 60 days, depending upon moisture content of grain and local weather. Thereafter, the fan is operated occasionally on cool-days and nights in order to reduce grain temperature to the lowest possible point for winter storage.



### Can Green Beans at the Peak of Their Growing Season

#### Always process Them in a Steam Pressure Cooker

Green beans provide a nutritious green vegetable dish enjoyable the year around. The best time to can them is at the peak of their growing season. They

should be tender, meaty and crisp. Wash the beans, string them if necessary, and break or cut into one or two-inch pieces. Cover with water and boil for five minutes. Pack loosely into hot Ball Mason Jars and add a teaspoon of salt to each quart. Cover with the water in which they were cooked or with fresh boiling water.

As with all low-acid vegetables. it is most important to process beans in a steam pressure cooker. If they are just right for canning as described above, process quarts 30 minutes and pints 20 minutes. stage, process them 15 to 20 min-







STRAWBERRY JAM Yield: about 10 medium glasses
4 cups prepared fruit
7 cups sugar
½ bottle fruit pectin

fifteen minutes after her fruit is juice. Measure 4 cups into a very prepared, she can place the finished jars on her shelf.

No one should gamble with fresh fruit, sugar, and other jelly making ingredients. Why do it when it's stirring constantly. Remove from so easy to follow scientific instructions which insure luscious jellies and jams, with all the color and flavor of the ripe fresh fruits? Here is a tested recipe which will lead straight to success with America's favorite berry, the strawberry.

Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan.

To make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling hoil, and boil hard 1 minute. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit: Pour quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 18 inch hot paraffin.
