Mission Festival Slated For St. John's

Rev. Emil W. Menzel, recently returned missionary from India, will be the featured speaker at the annual mission festival at St. John's church, Rogers Corners, on Sunday, Oct. 26. He will speak at 10 a. m. and will show films of his work at the 8 p. m. evening service. Dr. Theodore Schmale of Ann Arbor will be in charge of the morning service and Rev. T. W. Menzel of Bethel church, Freedom township, will preside in the evening.

Rev. Emil Menzel has been working in India since 1925. Most of his work has been done in the educational field, both as a supervisor of a large system of mission schools and as principal of St. Paul's high school at Raipur in the Central Provinces. He has written a number of books on educational methods adapted for Indian teachers. During his last term in India he has also taught at the Madras Teachers College, where he spent one semester of each year coaching teachers who worked toward their masters degree. He is a brother of the pastor of the Bethel church.

The Bethel church is also planning to hold a family night at the Bethel church in Freedom township on Monday evening, October 27, at 8 p. m. The feature of the evening will be a group of stories and demonstrations by Rev. Emil Menzel. Refreshments will be served by the Adult Fellowship.

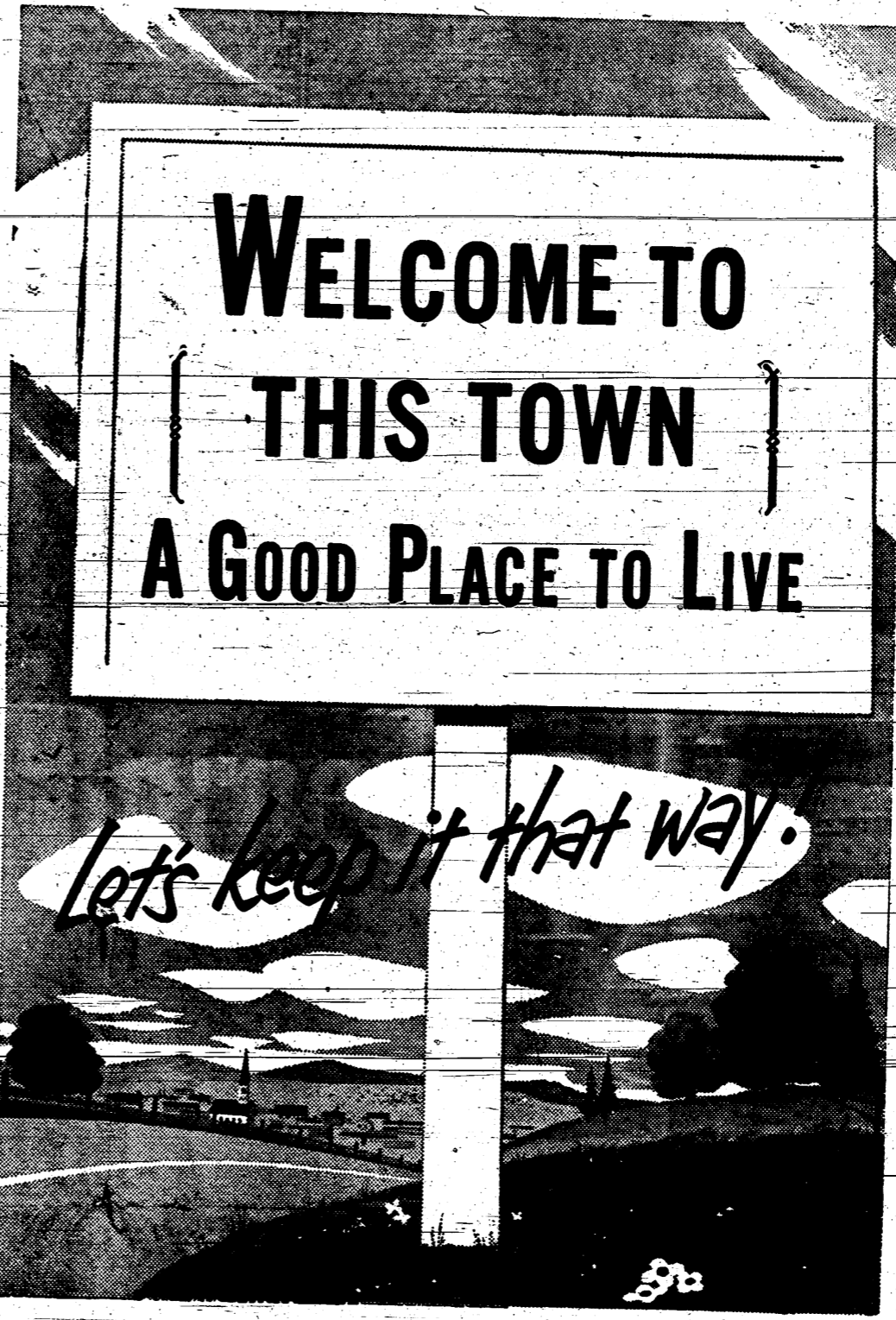
Cpl. Donald Koch Returning Home

Manchester Area Community Chest Drive started with the theme "Ring the Bell." It takes \$4,000 to "ring-the-bell" this year and the sixty solicitors who gathered at Rowes Corners Church Monday night were confident and sincere in their views for the future. Confident that they can "ring the bell" in the three weeks set for the drive—October 21 to Nov. 11—and sincere in their feeling of the worthwhile value of the project as a whole.

Manchester helped through its gift to the Health and Welfare Fund which includes the Michigan Heart Association in whose research laboratories strides were made for the development of the heart.

Reverend Karl Rest commended the solicitors for their community spirit and praised the area for its past record of generous and useful giving to the agencies that make up the heart of a village and nation. He urged them to "ring the bell" for the coming year.

Kits and materials for all solicitors were briefly checked with the workers by Mrs. F. M. Reck. Mr. Johnston gave a short overall picture of the value and aims of the drive.

Group singing enlivened the meeting as conducted by Arthur Cathey with Nellie Ackerson at the piano. As usual the Rowes Corner ladies served a delicious supper in record time and with super efficiency which enabled the business meeting to be conducted even as courses were being changed.

If the smoothness of the beginning is any criterion, the Drive for funds should be well on its way in the first two weeks and closed by the third. A thermometer of progress will be put up for everyone to view on Main Street so be sure that your most generous portion is painted on it soon.

The Jackson News has come in to the hands of Messrs. Tozes and Child, two practical printers. The form of the paper has been changed back to the folio. We wish the News success.


We are having a splendid spell of weather now, almost as warm as summer during the day but cool at night. The frost is doing it up handsome for the leaves and the forest are looking fine.


Our subscribers should bear in mind that the Enterprise has entered upon a new year, and we expect all who are in arrears for subscriptions will pay up immediately as we must have the money

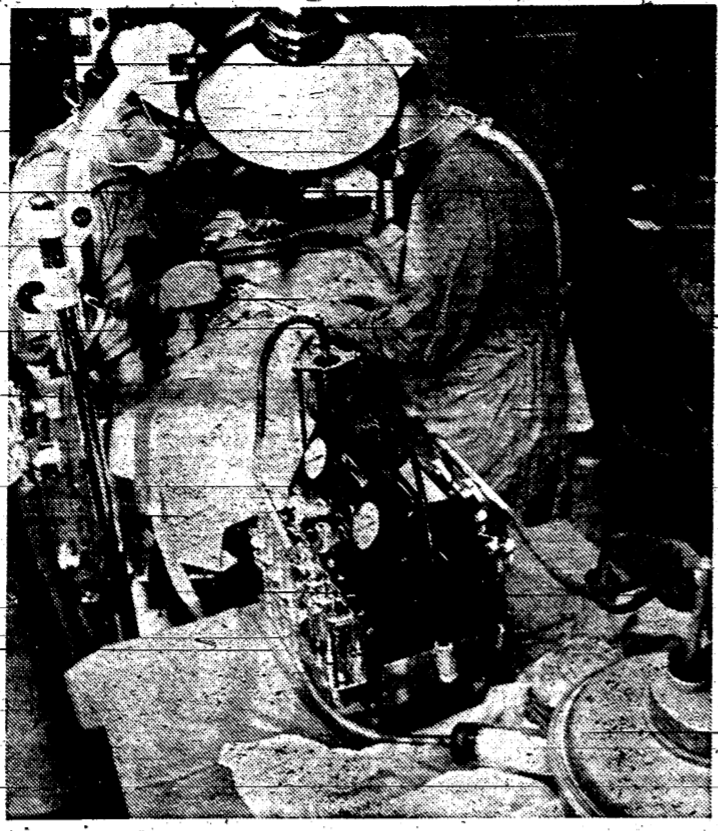

She was milked two times daily.

Detroiters Develop Artificial Heart



An artificial heart, successfully used on a 41-year-old man, was reported Oct. 18 by the Journal of the American Medical Association. The heart pump, shown above in action, was used for the delicate operation at Detroit's Harper Hospital, where it was developed by a Detroit team of medical and engineering researchers.

The cooperative research was sponsored by the Michigan Heart Research Laboratories handled engineering and construction details as a public service.

The medical research team reported that the artificial heart took over "complete function of maintaining blood supply of the body" of the patient for 50 minutes while the patient's heart was opened and worked upon by surgeons. The mechanical device empties the patient's heart of blood and enables surgeons to use direct vision, rather than "blind" sense of touch, in heart surgery.

Medical researchers said they believed this was the first known instance of survival of a patient through use of an artificial heart mechanism.

Code of Manu

Just as the rules of modern warfare protect prisoners of war and outlaw the use of poison gas, India's ancient Code of Manu forbade the use of barbed or poisoned arrows or the killing of an enemy who had thrown down his arms.

Cattle were developed by the Canadian Government in an effort to find animals with the good beef qualities of Aberdeen Angus, Short-horns or Herefords and the ruggedness of the bison, which can withstand severe winter weather.

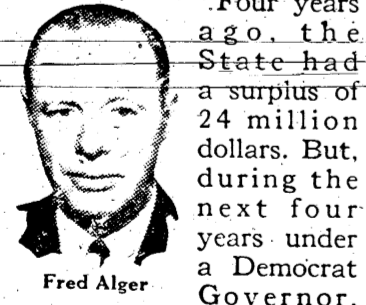

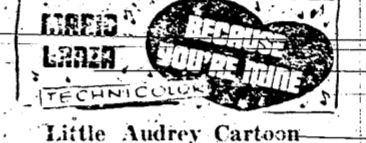

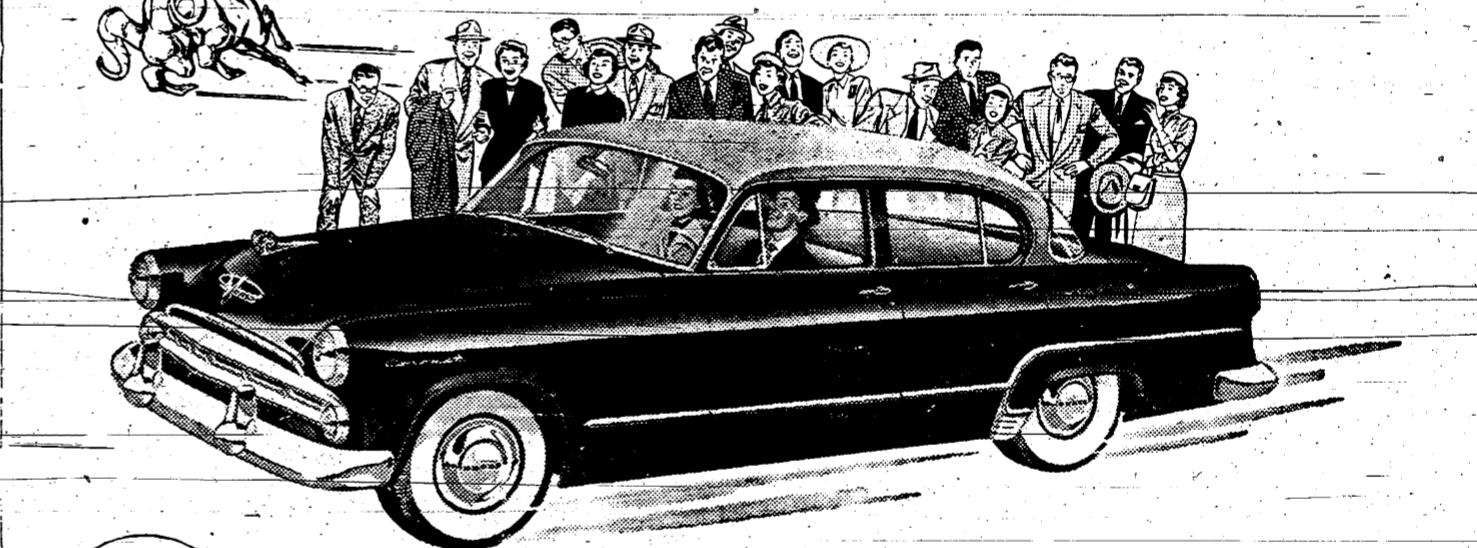
