Ordinary nails may be driven into the concrete without difficulty. Corncobs are cut into pellets ranging from 1/8" to 1" thick, which are then thoroughly soaked in water before mixing. Wall and floor slabs of corncob concrete were exposed to weather for 20 months, through 2 winters, and showed no apparent defects.
