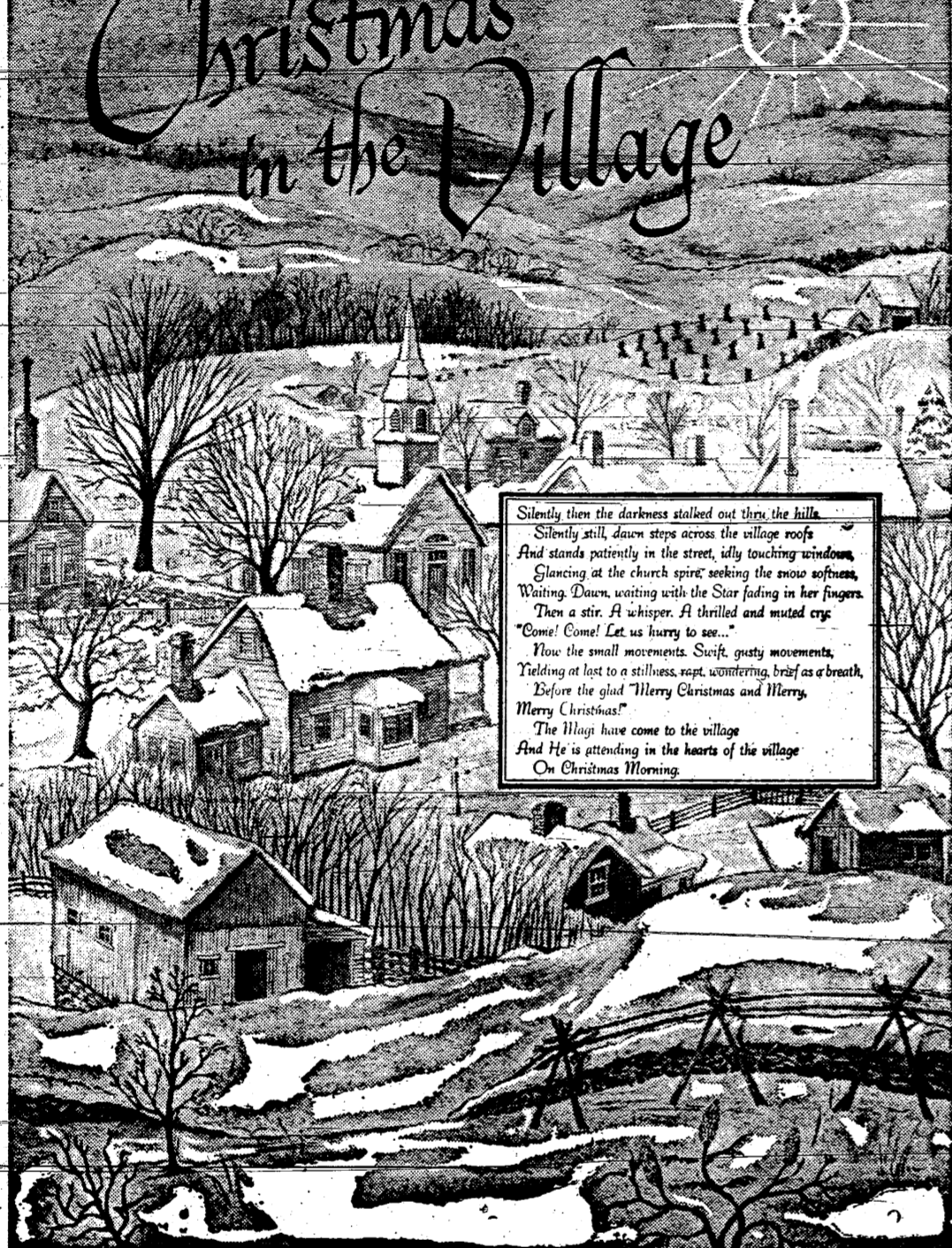

Polio Fund Drive Starts January 2

From January 2-31, Washtenaw county will participate in the national-wide March of Dimes to raise money for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the county chapter of the organization.

Cases of polio were reported in Manchester last year, but 75 persons in the county were stricken every other city and town in the county.

Contributions to the March of Dimes will be used to pay for treatment of polio patients living in the county and to assist in carrying on the research in the cause and cure of polio, which is under the direction of the national organization.

At least 75% of persons contracting polio have to face financial help from the foundation for infantile paralysis, according to figures from the national organization. Treatment in many cases involves long hospitalization, especially for crutches, braces, expensive equipment, and surgery. Each local chapter pays for its own part. When funds are depleted, as they were recently in Washtenaw county because of the epidemic last summer, the chapter then calls on the national organization for emergency funds. The local chapter received \$5,000 of such funds this month to help pay part of its outstanding hospital and medical bills.

When a patient is admitted to the hospital with polio, his family is asked to get in touch with his chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The patient cannot meet without financial strain. Patients are asked to pay what they can because there isn't enough money to pay for everything for everyone. No family is expected to make a financial sacrifice, or to be burdened with financial worries. A resident of Washtenaw county has polio while away from home, the local chapter meets his expenses wherever he is. It would do if he were stricken at home. There was one such case from a town in the county this summer.

Out-patient care is a large item in the county budget. This involves physio-therapy treatments, purchasing crutches, braces, wheel chairs, equipment designed for the individual patient's use, and medical fees. There is no limit on the length of time a patient may receive treatment, or the amount spent on an individual case.

Some of the funds from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis are used to purchase iron lungs and respirators and to transport them. The salaries and transportation of especially trained nurses is also met by the Foundation when necessary. Physiotherapists are trained in the newest techniques used in the treatment of polio patients.

The National Foundation has allocated in the last few years, maintaining a respirator center in Uni-spo spent several hundred thousand dollars in the last few years in United States offering treatment and doing research. Its resources are available to patients in Michigan and several other states. A number of Washtenaw county residents were in this center during the summer and some are still receiving treatment there. These are the patients with breathing difficulties who need iron lungs, respirators or rocking beds.

The chairman of the drive in Washtenaw county is Mrs. Robert S. McNamara of Ann Arbor, who had polio several years ago. Other chairmen include: Mrs. Robert Welsh, Bridgewater; Mrs. Herbert Gifford, Clinton; Leo Leiby, Dexter; Mrs. William Benjamin Selem; Mrs. Edwin Herring and Allan Wisdman, Saline; Erwin Vois, Whitmore Lake; Robert Richter, Whittaker; Terry Salv, Willis.

In Ypsilanti the chairman is Mrs. Harold Bjornstad, whose small daughter had polio two years ago; Mrs. John Goske, whose daughter had polio last summer, Pittsfield Village; Mrs. Carleton Heibron and Frank Stanton, Milan; Mrs. Lee BeGole, Dixboro; and Mrs. John Huss of Ann Arbor, county rural schools.

Christmas Don'ts

Early Yuletide Thought Pagan By Christians

CHRISTMAS, like any other blessed institution has had to fight its battles. The first great enemy of Christmas was the Roman empire whose pagan emperors determined to blot out all kinds of Christian rites.

Then when Roman Emperor Constantine Christianized the empire other enemies of Christmas arose. One course of contention was: Is December 25 really Christmas?

Some said Christ was born on January 6; others held for March 29. Some set April 21 as His birthday. Nobody knew with complete confidence just when to celebrate Christmas. At last, in the fourth century, Pope Julius I settled the matter in favor of our present date. His decision was accepted.

From the first there had been among Christians a certain hostility toward the Christmas festival. The celebration of birthdays in general was considered heathenish and something taken over from the pagans. Nor did the enemies of Christmas fail to observe that many pagan customs had crept into the feasting of the day. Christmas and the days of Advent that go before it occur at the time of the winter solstice, when the days cease to grow shorter, and begin to lengthen—when the sun, having declined its furthest from zenith, begins to climb again. The period was one of festival in many parts of the world, and was held sacred by many religions. Then occurred the Roman Saturnalia, with its wild excesses, and the people of the north, too, had a great midwinter feast with days of hearty eating and deep drinking. From the Saturnalia came banquets and dancing and rioting in masks and the giving of gifts. Our Christmas dinner and Christmas presents and Christmas cards and the wearing of Christmas masks in various parts of the world date back to the Saturnalia. The mid-winter feast of the northern peoples was called Yule, hence our Yuletide and Yule log. The burning of the Christmas log descends from northern tree worship. So does the Christmas tree.

Santa Claus seems to date from later Christmas times. He is good St. Nicholas, of course. The hanging of stockings comes from the legend that the saint, among his other charities, used to provide dowries for poor girls. The older form of the Christmas stocking custom was for poor girls to hang up stockings in the hope that benevolent St. Nicholas would place marriage portions in them.

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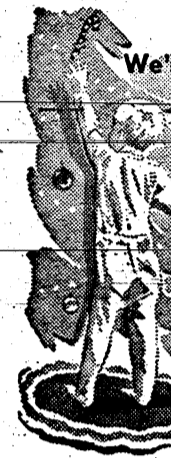

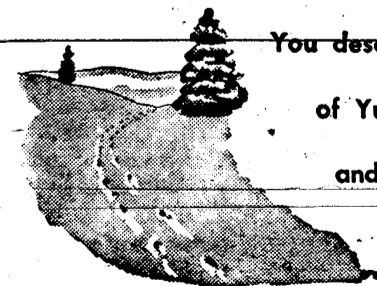

Far-Off Lands Come to Life In Yule Toys

GEOGRAPHY comes down the chimney on Christmas Eve. In the flood of toys soon to spill out into the nation's living rooms will be the touch of many different lands. Beside a teddy bear, replica of Australia's marsupial-furred koalas, perhaps will stand a carved wooden farm scene from German Bavaria, a South American gaucho doll, or a miniature pagoda made in Japan.

Similarly, the United States, now the world's leading toy maker, sends abroad its wild west costumes, its shiny playtime trucks and cars and earth-moving equipment, its small-scale railroads and sky scrapers to delight children all over the globe.

Toy industries in Germany and Japan are on the upswing again. Germany was among the first nations in the world to make tin horses on wheels, engines that ran, animals that walked, birds that sang. Now U.S. buyers go back to cities such as Nurnberg for the output of ingenious middle-aged inventors.

New toys that startle the world often come from Europe. One such is a German duck which, when set on an incline, proudly walks down the slope. Another is a recent gadget from Denmark called a "tippe top," a wobbly sphere about the size of a small apple that suddenly flips upside down and continues spinning on its stem.

Winston Churchill was intrigued by the top when he first saw it. In Stockholm, the King of Sweden, a cabinet minister and an atom physicist, a Nobel Prize winner, got down on their hands and knees at a banquet to study the mysterious flip-flop action.

As a mirror of mankind's culture, toys reflect the progress of civilization. Yet an amazing similarity can sometimes be seen between the toys of long-forgotten eras and the playthings of today.

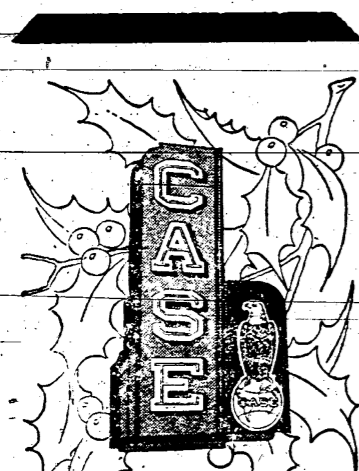

THE "STAR" which signaled the "First Christmas" may be interpreted in many ways. We still speak of "falling stars" or "shooting stars" which we know quite well are not stars at all. But nowhere in the literature or in the folklore of any of the peoples noted as astute observers of celestial phenomena do these references exist.

From this we are forced to conclude the appearance of the star was a sight given only to the Wise Men to see.

Polio Patients Home For Christmas

All polio patients receiving treatment in the respirator center at University hospital, who are able to leave, even for a day, will be home for Christmas. Many patients have reached the stage where they need a respirator only at night, and arrangements have been made for them to take their respirator and pump with batteries along with them. Patients able to be in wheel chairs take these with them.

A respirator is a plastic shell which fits tightly over the chest and part of the abdomen to force breathing. The pump, which can be plugged into an ordinary electrical socket, provides alternating pressure. Batteries are provided to use where electricity is not available, especially during transportation of the patient. The portable pumps weigh about 50 lbs. and measure approximately 36x18x14 inches.

Going home to maintain family ties is part of the treatment for the respiratory patient, according to Miss Ruth A. Locher, medical social worker at University hospital. It also helps the patient's family to make any adjustments necessary, she said.

A Christmas party was held in the center on Thursday, Dec. 18, with cookies, cakes, ice cream, gifts and a quartet from the University School of Music singing carols.

The patient from the longest distance who went home for Christmas, will remain at home. She is Mrs. Nicholas Wehner, 30, from Dickinson, South Dakota. Mrs. Wehner, who came to the center last May, will be united with her two children, Ronnie, 4, and Terry, 7, whom she has not seen for a year.

Mrs. Wehner came to the Respirator Center in an iron lung, by plane, last May. She now uses a respirator for 19 hours out of 24. Careful planning for weeks was necessary to make Mrs. Wehner's trip possible.

Miss Ruth Locher was sent to Dickinson by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to arrange for a nurse and all necessary equipment for Mrs. Wehner's brief stay in the hospital before going home. An iron lung had to be in readiness, respirators, batteries, pumps, a rocking bed, special over-head slings, a feeding table designed for her, hand splints a wheel chair and a chest shell. Everything except the iron lung will be taken to her home when she leaves the hospital.

Mrs. Wehner's husband, who operates a farm in North Dakota, spent two weeks at the Respirator Center at University hospital learning to repair iron lungs and respirators. He is the only person in North Dakota trained in such work and will be on call wherever needed in the state.

Mrs. Idella Fredericks, a former displaced person from Germany where she was a registered nurse, came from her present home in North Dakota, to spend ten days at University hospital learning the techniques needed to care for Mrs. Wehner.

Accompanying Mrs. Wehner on the National Guard plane which came from Bismarck, N. D., to take her home, were Dr. David G. Dickinson, director of the respirator center, Miss Martha I. Boggs, head nurse at the center, and Mrs. Fredericks.

The respirator center at University hospital is one of five such centers in the United States supported by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for research and treatment. North Dakota is one of the states in the area served by the center at the University.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has spent about

\$20,000 on Mrs. Wehner's care, and will spend such additional funds as are necessary for her continued treatment.

Whereas, pursuant to the above mentioned statute this Board did, as appears by affidavits on file with the Board, cause a Notice of said Hearing to be served upon all owners of lands adjoining said road, and posted in three public places in said Township and published in a newspaper having circulation in this area; and

Whereas, the said Hearing was held at the time and place appointed by said Resolution and no objections were raised, and

Whereas, it appears from said Hearing and view of the premises that it is in the best interest of the public that said road be absolutely abandoned and discontinued.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that Walter Road extending from the North Line of Willow Road to the South-Westerly line of Logan Road in Section 19, Bridgewater Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan, be and the same is hereby absolutely abandoned and discontinued as a public highway and, Be It Further Resolved, that Notice of this Determination be given by the Clerk to the proper highway authority of the Township in which the above road is located; to the State Highway Commissioner; the Auditor General of Michigan; and that such Notice shall be published in the Manchester

Enterprise, a newspaper published and circulating in said County of Washtenaw, once in each week for three successive weeks.
